Kenneth Helms were recognized and received this honor.

## Some Taxpayers Right! Internal Revenue Wrong?

According to "U. S. News and World Report," May 15, 1989 even taxpayers who did it right did it wrong. That's what the Internal Revenue Service is about to tell people who had to pay the alternative minimum tax a year ago when they filed 1987 income-tax returns.

Everyone who paid the minimum tax, which limits the extent to which upper-income people can use deductions to slash their tax bills, now owes more money. Here's what happened: As part of the 1986 tax-reform package, Congress unintentionally allowed people paying the minimum tax to claim personal and dependent exemptions. Realizing their error, the lawmakers retroactively revoked the exemptions in late 1988.

People who followed instructions and claimed exemptions owe back tax of \$399 for each one taken. But taxpayers who claimed no exemptions, figuring that a correction was coming, got refunds for "overpaying" their tax. And

now the IRS wants those refunds back.

Affected taxpayers will get the bad news by mail next month and must file amended returns on Form 1040X. People returning refunds won't be charged interest if they adhere to the procedures outlined in the IRS letter. Those who took exemptions must pay up to 12 percent interest on the tax they owe. To keep from accruing interest, they can file an amended return without waiting for the IRS notice.

The Board of Directors of the Hall County Hospital in Memphis has recently announced a new concept their facility has to offer area citizens.

The new program is "Assisted Living Services" and is exactly what the name implies. It is designed to meet special needs to those faced with a problem, need or circumstance relating to personal accommodations.

The program, approved by the board members, addresses the needs of those who, because of advancing age, makes living alone very difficult. This offers an option for those who are determined to be as independent as possible while at the same time needing to feel secure and comfortable in

their choice of lifestyle and surrounding.

It is designed to assist a family with a homebound member, who because of debilitating or a long rehabilitative process requires constant care.

There are three levels of assistance offered. Level 1 includes an assigned room, television, appealing meals, immediate access to health care assessment, periodic nursing care by staff nurses, and the freedom to come and go at will. Levels 2 and 3 are capable of delivering more direct assistance on a daily basis in order to meet partial or total needs of the client.

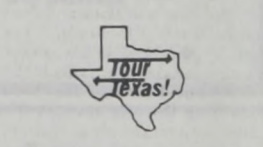

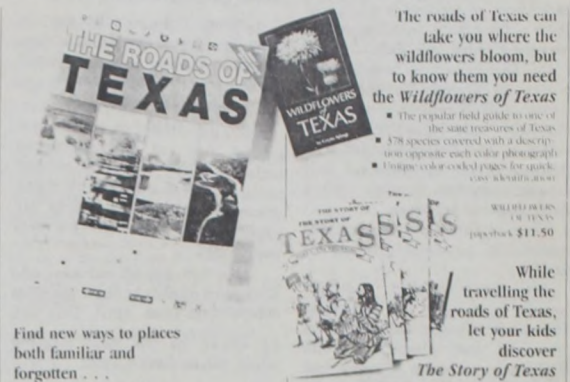

**SOCIAL SECURITY NEWS**

Direct deposit of social security benefits to an account in a bank or other financial institution is becoming very popular. Presently, \$8.4 billion in benefit payments go directly to the bank accounts of 18 million retirement, survivor, and disability beneficiaries. And it is predicted that 80 percent of all beneficiaries will receive benefits through direct deposit within ten years.

Why is the popularity of this method of payment growing so fast?

For many reasons: Safety - beneficiaries have the assurance that their benefits will arrive on time to their bank accounts without any chance of being lost or stolen; Freedom - the beneficiary can be out of town without having to return home earlier out of concern for the safety of the check; Convenience - the money will be safe in the bank account, available to be used at any time from any place; Time saving - the beneficiaries don't have to go to the bank to deposit or cash their checks.

With these advantages, there is no reason for the beneficiaries to worry if the check doesn't arrive on time, or if they have to be out of town while the check is sitting in the mailbox.

To the Social Security Administration, direct deposit means savings in time and cost. Studies show that it costs 30 cents to prepare and deliver a check and that it costs four cents to process the same benefit through direct deposit.

Beneficiaries have to keep social security informed of any change of address. In case of the death of a beneficiary, the family of the deceased should notify social security. With direct deposit it is more difficult to keep track of beneficiaries if they do not notify social security of their whereabouts. If notices mailed to a beneficiary are undeliverable, and the search to locate is exhausted, the payment of benefits may be suspended.

Enjoy the advantages of direct deposit of benefits, but keep social security informed of your present address; this way both can benefit from this method of payment.

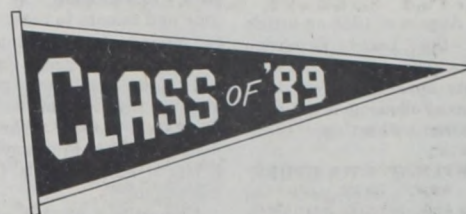

Citizens from Quitaque and Silverton met May 16, 1989, to evaluate the Media Day held May 6, 1989, by Briscoe County.

Mr. Wayne Hughes from the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission was present to offer his view of the success of Media Day and to make suggestions on how to expand our efforts to promote Briscoe County, Texas to the World.

Hughes noted that the Media Day defines some of the future tasks facing the people of Briscoe County. He made two suggestions:

"There is no one perfect solution for rebuilding dying rural communities!" We must support and improve existing businesses, bring in industry, develop tourism potential, start new businesses and improve the looks of the communities in the county.

All of the projects mentioned must have people willing to take the first step of faith, commitment of their time and talents to the project or projects which interest them most. Briscoe County has many talented people already involved in each of the listed projects. What we need now more than anything is lots of willing people. Could this be you?

Change is a must if we are to survive! Those who look at change only from the standpoint of how it affects them as an individual rather than what is good for the people of Briscoe County can do great

harm to any efforts to put Briscoe County back on the map.

Briscoe County has many people who are strong individuals and very successful in their chosen careers; businessmen, farmers, teachers, ranchers, government employees and clergy. ## Believe It ... Or Not

Editor's note: The following was taken from the Jacksboro Gazette recently.

Counts' Corner

I have known of several churches being bought, moved some distances, relocated, restored and proud of. These isolated and almost forgotten houses of God. People that have a yen for these churches are also proud of their possessions and their handy work of restoration. This must be some comforting, warming thing to know you have succeeded in the great effort.

People have moved off, passed on, and getting too old to do the work that would be required, also a longing to do these things and keep the church alive. But a lost cause for them.

People call this story an "Act of God" - what or who else?

There are only two possible explanations for what you are reading. It was either the most phenomenal coincidence that ever occurred or it was an Act of God. Literally. There are a stack of sworn statements and legal documents say it is so. This happened on a rainy Thursday afternoon one hundred summers ago.

There was just one problem with Swan Quarter, North Carolina. It was a low land, so naturally the choicest real estate was on higher ground. In the event of heavy rain the closer you were to sea level, the harder you were hit.

A little more than a hundred years ago the Methodists of Swan Quarter had no church, the only lot available on which to build a church, was a plot of low lying property on Oyster Creek Road.

This being far from an ideal location, but they had acquired the land and construction began.

The church was to be a white frame, small but sturdy, propped up on brick pilings. In 1876 the building was completed and on Sunday, September 16 a joyous dedication ceremony was celebrated. Three days later, on Wednesday, a terrible storm lashed Swan Quarter. The wind howled and the rain came down in gales.

By night fall devastation. Much of the town was flooded; many homes destroyed, homes ripped apart. The storm raged all through the night and into bleak morning.

By Thursday afternoon the wind had subsided, the rain stopped. For the first time in more than a day, there was almost an eerie calm. One by one the citizens of Swan Quarter threw back their curtains and shutters and peered at what was left of their homes.

Most saw only desolate waterscape, a community ravaged by water. But those within sight of Oyster Creek Road could not believe their eyes.

The Church, the Swan Quarter

Methodist Church-the whole building, intact-was floating down the street! The flood waters had gently lifted the structure from the brick pilings, and had sent it off slowly, silently, down Oyster Creek Road.

Within minutes, several concerned town folks were slashing around in the creek, waist deep, trying desperately to reach the still moving church so they could moor it with rope.

The ropes were fastened, but in vain. There was no stable structure secure enough to restrain the floating chapel.

As the building passed by, more attention was attracted, more aid was enlisted. To no avail, the church moved on.

By now the building had made it to the center of the town, still on

Oyster Creek Road. There are dozens of amazed, helpless people watched, the Swan Quarter Methodist Church, still floating, made a sharp inexplicable right

turn and continued down that road as if the chapel were alive - a mind of its own.

For two more blocks the towns people held on fighting the ropes to hold it back, unsuccessfully. And then, in the same decisive manner with which it had moved,

the church veered off the road, headed for the center of a vacant lot - and there - stopped.

While the flood water receded, the church remained and is there to this day.

Over one hundred Septembers have passed since the little white frame church removed itself to the most desirable property in Swan Quarter, North Carolina.

In the process of making up your own mind as to what happened and why, you need to know the choice highland lot where the chapel settled was the first choice of the town Methodists for a sight of their church to begin with. And the shrewd, prosperous

landowner whose property it was originally turned them down.

The next morning after the flood, after discovering the church in the middle of his lot, that same land owner went to the Methodist minister and with trembling hands, presented him the deed.

\*\*\*\*\*

It's always happening to Methodists, remember the church that slid down from the top of the mountain?

Guess God is going to see that we stay in a church to worship regardless-and we intend to.

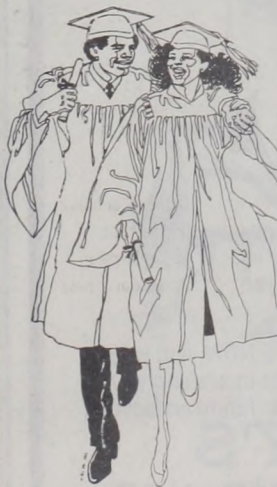
**MELINDA MARTINEZ**

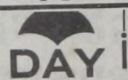
