Solid Offense Credited With Win Over Harrold

A stingy defense and a solid offensive performance helped lead Valley past Harrold 60-34 in the opening game of Dist. 2-A 6-man season.
Valley scored twice in the first period, the first on a 4-yard run by Clay Edwards. Chad Calvert's kick was good for an 8-0 lead.
Bradley Price then stepped in front of a Harrold pass and returned it 40 yards for a TD. Calvert's kick was good, extending the score to 16-0.
Harrold came back on a 44 yd touchdown run to cut the lead to 10 points.

Valley hit the scoreboard quickly on a 45-yd touchdown run by Kirk Garner. Chad Powell threw the lead block to clear Garner untouched for the touchdown. Calvert hit his third PAT to increase the lead to 24-6. Valley hit the scoreboard again with a 50-yd run by Edwards. The kick was no good and Valley took the lead 30-6.
Harrold was able to put 6 more points on the board with a 40 yd run by McNeil, but Valley went in at the half with a 30-12 lead.
Harrold came out the second half and scored on a 1-yd run by

Micheal Hopkins. The PAT was good, and Harrold had closed the gap to 10 points.
Valley's Edwards opened things up with the spread offense and scored runs of 19, 18, and 10 yards. Tommy Pinkerton took a 6 yd pass from Price and Clardy scored on a 7 yd. run.
Harrold scored on a 40-yd touchdown pass and a 70-yd kickoff return.
Leading the offense was Edwards with 22 carries for 204 yds and Kirk Garner with 15 carries for 117 yds, 1 touchdown, and 2 receptions for 26 yds.
Bubba Clardy had 75 yds on 13 carries, Bradley Price was 3-6-35 yds and 1 touchdown. On defense Manuel Silva had 1 interception, 2 fumble recoveries and 6 tackles. Price had 15 tackles and 1 interception. Jason Smith made 15 tackles and 1 fumble recovery. Also having a good night on defense were Kirk Garner with 10 tackles and Cory

Regulations Given For Packages To U. S. Troops in Middle East

Each day as the time draws closer to Christmas, thoughts rapidly go to the troops in the Middle East.

On October 29, 1990 a group will be meeting at the bank room to pack gifts to go to the troops in the Middle East.

Certain regulations because of the heat and strict rules in Saudi Arabia must be taken into consideration. Do not send anything that will melt in the heat, such as chocolate chips or frosting on cookies. It is best to use butter flavored shortening rather than butter or margarine as they may get rancid. Nuts may be used but again use very fresh ones. Nuts that have been frozen are drier than fresh ones and will get even drier in the heat.

Refrigerator cookies, Christmas cut out cookies (un-iced), and oatmeal cookies are good choices to send to the Middle East. Other

Valley Gets Texas Tech Student Teacher

The Valley High School agricultural science department will host a student teacher from Texas Tech University for the next two months. Jeff McGinnis, a senior agricultural education student at Texas Tech, will arrive at Valley High School on October 8, 1990 to start the final portion of the student teaching program. McGinnis will be given the opportunity to instruct the agricultural science classes and to help train some leadership teams under the supervision of Jon Davidson, local agri-science instructor. During the eight weeks, McGinnis's supervising teachers from Texas Tech will also visit to evaluate his teaching.

McGinnis said, "I'm excited to go to Valley High School and work with the excellent quality students and staff. These students have proven themselves across the state, and I look forward to working with them."

McGinnis graduated as an honor graduate in 1987 from Monterey High School in Lubbock, Texas. He then went to Texas Tech University to pursue an Agricultural Education degree. As a collegian, he is very active in The Agricultural Fraternity, Alpha Gamma Rho, and many other organizations across the Texas Tech campus. He plans to graduate in December, and obtain an Agricultural Science teaching position or an Agricultural Extension Service position.

Guaranteed Loans Available For College Students

Texas parents have been slow to take advantage of a federal loan program designed to help them pay their child's postsecondary educational expenses, according to Joe McCormick, President of the Texas Guaranteed Student Loan Corporation.

The Parent Loans for Undergraduate Students (PLUS) loan program is one of three federal loan programs offered by the U.S. government to assist students and parents in paying for college or vocational school expenses. Unlike other financial aid, parents applying for these loans do not have to be certified as being financially needy.

The current interest rate for the PLUS loan is 11.49%, set by the Department of education. Other attractive features of the PLUS loans are a repayment period of up to ten years and the ability to postpone payments during the time the child is in school.

Edwards-Garner Share Duties Of Running Back With Good Humor

The laughing from Valley's huddle doesn't originate from a joke told by one of the linemen. Instead it's a good-natured argument between running backs Clay Edwards and Kirk Garner.

No, there aren't any fisticuffs in the Patriot huddle. It's just a willingness to share the running load.

"I'll say, I'm tired of carrying the ball, why don't you carry it some," Garner said. "Then Clay will come back and say 'No, I'm tired of carrying it, you carry it a while.'"

And off Garner and Edwards go, when one isn't running, he's blocking for his backfield buddy. In two weeks, Edwards has accumulated 565 yards and nine touchdowns, and Garner has accounted for 417 yards and seven scores.

In a 72-36 win against Higgins, Edwards rushed for 282 yards and scored five times, and Garner added 210 yards and matched his touchdown total. In last week's 54-44 victory against Miami, the dynamic rushing duo was back in action, again eclipsing the 200 yard barrier. Edwards gained 283 yards and Garner added 210.

"We had run the I-formation most of the time, but we recently started to go more with the split backs to allow both of them to get a chance to run the football," said Valley head coach Cliff Gilmore. "You've really got to carry the ball about 16 times just to get going. These guys can get going in a hurry."

Edwards, a 5-foot-10, 144-pound junior, gained 1,467 yards and scored 23 touchdowns last season on a team that averaged 55.6 points a game.

This year he already has 816 yards and 10 scores. Garner, almost identical in size at 5-foot-10, and 148 pounds, has 654 yards and is averaging 11.1 yards a carry in 1990 after playing in only four games last year because of a severe thumb injury. A third back, Bubba Clardy, had 680 yards as a junior, but he has spent most of his time on defense this season.

Edwards and Garner avoid talking about the issue of who carries the ball more. Instead, they point fingers at their offensive line and offer high praise.

"Our line blocking has been tremendous," Edwards said. "They are a well-tuned group."

Passing, not rushing, was formerly the staple of Valley's offense. In 1986, quarterback Kirk Saul fired a Texas high school record 54 touchdown passes for the Patriots. But the offensive tide has shifted to the ground attack, with Edwards and Garner at the forefront.

"These two guys are competitive and smart enough to know that they should thrive off each other," Gilmore said. "They know if one guy isn't carrying out his fake while the other has the ball gong the other way, then the play won't be a success. And they're totally unselfish about it."

New Diabetes Drug Study Underway

HOUSTON -- Researchers at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston are studying a drug that could prevent significant disability -- and even leg amputation -- in thousands of diabetics.

According to Dr. Yadollah Harati, an associate professor of neurology at Baylor, the drug, a new aldose reductase inhibitor (ARI), is thought to prevent the formation of nerve-damaging sugars from the excess glucose common to diabetics.

They also hope ARI will benefit all diabetics suffering from foot pain, often severe, as well as numbness, tingling and a burning sensation. And they want to learn if ARI will be free of harmful or unpleasant side effects.

But, even if ARI is found to be of value, Harati said, effective treatment for diabetic peripheral neuropathy is probably two to five years away.

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
