Hall Co. Hospital District Seeks Board Candidates

Hall County will elect a Board of Directors for Hall County Hospital District. House Bill 2510 establishes requirements for the election and for the organization of the board. The legislation provides that five directors be elected on an at-large basis. To be eligible to become a candidate, a person must be a resident of the district and a qualified voter. Employees of the hospital district are not eligible. Persons who are interested in filing may obtain petitions from the county clerk or from hospital administrator. the Petitions require signatures of three qualified voters and must be filed with the county clerk. There is no filing fee for this election and the deadline for filing is April 7. Hospital district board members serve without pay; are prohibited from they profiting in any way from their membership on the board. 





Divorce Rate Goes Down

The family that stays together is a lot more common than many Americans have been led to believe, according to the latest na-tional survey. New figures challenge the widely held belief that nearly one out of

held belief that nearly one out of every two marriages ends in divorce. Survey results indicate it's one out of every eight marriages that ends in divorce. "High divorce rates can often be traced to 'Vital Statistics of the United States,' generated by the Usatistics," reports Louis Harris of the polling firm Louis Harris and Associates, Inc., which conducted a nationwide Family Survey on behalf of Philip Morris Companies Inc. "People compare the 2.5 mil-lion new marriages reported each year with the 1.1 million divorces to year with the 1.1 million divorces to conclude that roughly half of all marriages are breaking up. 

But we can do something about it. When you hear some thing bad about a fellow human be ing, instead of adding fat to the flame - kill it - by saying you don't believe it. Judge Forbis said he says, vehemently, "that's an outright lie! And there's not a lick of truth in it!" -- whether or not the statement might be true, he said he doesn't know, but that response usually stops the slandering remarks.

Workers in the local area suffering from a physical impairment which prevents them from working should consider applying for Social Security disability benefits when it appears the impairment will last 12 months or longer.

Social Security disability benefits can be paid to workers under 65, disabled before reaching

Under Social Security, a person is condidered disabled if he or she has a severe impairment which prevents him or her from doing any substantial gainful work and is expected to last for at least 12 months or result in death.

No payments can be made to a disabled worker, widow, or widower for the first 5 full months of disability. disabled

Before a person applies for disability benefits it will be helpful

if he or she gathers certain information. This will help speed the application process. This includes:

The person's Social Security

-Military service serial number, dates, and VA claim number if available.

-List of kinds of jobs performed in previous 15 years. -Names and Social Security

Presidio La Bahia - Built in 1749 to protect nearby missions, Presidio Santa Maria del Loreto de la Bahia became the most fought over fort in American history, participating in six wars for independence. In 1836, the vacatic site was dubbed Fort Defiance by 443 Worth. Texian soldiers, who surrendered, then were executed in the largest loss of life during the Texas Revolution. Among many other superlatives, this is the only fully restored Spanish Colonial presidio in the country that includes its military, religious and civilian components.
