## Flight For Life Visits Silverton

**Note: Article from Briscoe County News.**

Flight for Life, the Spirit of St. Mary, was in Silverton for a brief public relations visit on Tuesday April 14. The emergency medical services helicopter is based at St. Mary of the Plains Hospital in Lubbock, and its crew is composed of a paramedic, flight nurse or doctor and pilot.

The flight crew is on call at the hospital 24 hours a day, maintaining a five-minute liftoff time. Members of the crew work in critical-care units at the hospital while they are on call. The helicopter pilots - there are three of them - have sleeping quarters at the hospital.

The pilots all have served in the military, and have a combined 25,000 hours of experience flying helicopters.

A mechanic is part of the emergency airlift team, and he goes over the helicopter carefully after every flight to make sure that everything is maintained for optimum safety.

Flight for Life's service area usually includes about a 125-130 mile radius from Lubbock, serving 43 counties. If this distance is maintained the helicopter can go out and back without refueling, but they do fly outside their service area if they are needed, and in this instance the pilot takes the helicopter for refueling while the patient

is being prepared for transport.

The helicopter is a French-made Alouette III jet-powered craft, and can carry two patients in bunk-type stretcher compartments - up to about 600 pounds total weight - at one time. Its speed is 95-100 knots - about two miles per minute - fully loaded. It is 60 nautical miles from Lubbock to Silverton, and the flight normally would take 35 minutes.

The helicopter requires a 60 x 60 landing area by day and a 100 x 100 area at night. Richard Pope, flight paramedic, emphasized that they work closely with the ground crew - make up of the

## Turkey Bank Reopens As Memphis State Bank Branch

**Note: The following information was compiled and story written by Globe-News Business Editor Phillip Fiorini.**

Memphis State Bank reopened the failed Peoples State Bank in Turkey as a branch, the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp.

Despite an impassioned plea over the last several months by the bank's president to save the bank, the Texas banking commissioner declared the \$6.8 million Turkey bank insolvent at 3 p.m. Thursday.

A preponderance of bad agricultural loans to local and out-of-town borrowers

caused the bank's demise, said Maurice Houlihan said.

"Liberal and ill-advised lending practices" also contributed to problems in the Turkey bank's loan portfolio, Houlihan said. "Collection efforts were lax."

Houlihan said 62 percent of the bank's \$3.36 million in loans were in agriculture.

Recent efforts by the bank's officers to recapitalize the bank were unsuccessful, he said.

Bank president Jim Cade, who came aboard in January, sensed problems at the institution in March and went public, seeking support to save it.

Houlihan said those efforts proved futile.

Memphis State Bank will assume about \$5.9 million in 1,150 deposit accounts, Houlihan said. Peoples had total assets of \$6.8 million.

People's depositors automatically became customers of the new bank, he said. Memphis is about 40 miles northeast of Turkey, both in Hall County.

Houlihan said the Memphis bank paid a \$5,001 premium for access to the bank's assets, which included the bank's deposits and about \$1.4 million in loans.

FDIC will retain all classified loans, valued at about \$1.9 million, he said.

The Turkey bank was one of two banks in Texas to be closed by regulators Thursday.

Bob Carman, liquidator in charge assisted by Jimmy Carrick both of FDIC stated Monday that they had completed all the closing functions over the weekend.

The bank had closed Thursday, April 30 but had immediately been reopened Friday May 1. Everything is now in order for the Memphis State Bank, Turkey Branch to continue with business as usual. The new President, Bob Nicks, will list the new officials as soon as possible.

## "Turkey Fire Dept. Special"

The Turkey Fire Dept. was organized in 1927, 1977 being the 50th anniversary. In 1927 the following men met in the old Theater building on the south side of main street: Claude Gipson, Drew Holcomb, Lestos Perrin, Curtis Tunnell, R.D. Rivers, Bruce Gibson, Joe Baber, and Henry Green. Also at the meeting were the city officials, Tom Colvin-Mayor and theater owner and J. R. Miller and Jess Jenkins, Councilmen. Claude Gipson was elected the first Chief and Charley Humes was the first Fire Marshall. The city had purchased a 1927 Dodge truck to carry the hose. The truck had no cab, no windshield and no pump, making it very cold to ride in the winter. One night a call was received from Flomot to fight a fire and the temperature was 5 degrees above zero. I drove and R. D. Rivers rode on the back of the truck with the other firemen in a car following. We managed to get the fire under control with fire buckets and water from barrels inside the gin. Then we had to face the cold wind back to Turkey. The next day we got an old windshield from the wrecking yard and had it welded on the truck, which helped a lot. I'm the only Charter member living at Turkey, being active member for 30 years.

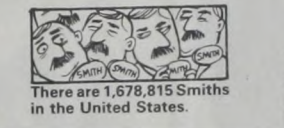
All life support equipment carried in the helicopter is portable, and includes IV pumps, external pacemakers, units that can send EKG telemetry to the hospital or cardiology group, and other equipment regularly carried in advanced life support units.

Lift-off fee charged for helicopter transport is \$180, and there is a mileage fee added of \$10.00 per mile.

On landing at St. Mary's or Lubbock General (they will transport the patient to whatever Lubbock hospital is required, but only these two now have helipads), the patient by-passes the emergency room and is taken directly to whatever critical-care unit is required of to surgery.

### Southern Asia Studied By United Methodist Women

The United Methodist Women met in the Church chapel Monday at 4 p.m. with president Mrs. Marcella Patterson beginning a new mission study "Crossroads Southern Asia."

On this part of the continent are five countries, the largest being India. Others are Srilanka, Nepal, Pakistan and Bangladesh.

The program was opened with prayer by Mrs. Virginia Degan. Minutes were read by the recording secretary Mrs. Wilma Wedge, Mrs. Kathleen Green gave the treasurer's report. Plans for the Rummage Sale were tabled until a later date.

Mrs. Patterson presented some Map'n'Facts about Southern Asia. Mrs. Freda Fuston presented some history facts; there were no nations until the 18th century; each region was an individual political unit, except when a neighboring ruler temporarily extended his control over a nearby town or towns.

For centuries, these rulers had been Hindu aristocrats who had fled from Muslim rule.

A bloody massacre took place in Nepal in 1846 after a period of irritability and strife under weak kings who were unable to rule firmly.

Mrs. Green gave information on the economy - Nepal is an agricultural country. Two crops can generally be produced in a year. Rice is grown in the wet monsoon, and other grains in the drier season. Livestock is also raised.

The main source of energy for cooking, heating is firewood. So many trees have been cut from the mountains that there is now massive erosion. The geography of this area stressed that the area has the lowest elevation and the highest elevation in the world.

Tourism has become important in the last few years. The high mountains, notably Mt. Everest, are the main attractions.

Some of the most valuable reading consumers can do is on the labels of food cans, jars and packages. Labels on products can tell you what you're really buying and whether the contents are worth the cost to you. They may also help you avoid health problems for those on special diet restrictions.

Some labels tell when the product was made, which might affect its life span at home, and its quality. It pays to familiarize yourself with the codes on the packages. If government Food and Drug inspectors find a packaged food faulty, they will identify the package to be recalled by its stamped code.

Ingredients are listed on the labels of all food products in order of the quantity in the product. Exceptions are those products made according to a Standard of Identity, which is a prescribed general formula, such as that for peanut butter or pork and beans.

Reading the ingredients list helps you use that particular product more advantageously. If curbing your intake of an ingredient is your target for health or diet reasons, you can look for another product which lists that ingredient lower on the scale or doesn't use it at all.

A recent ruling by the Food and Drug Administration will help consumers analyze the sodium content of foods. According to the FDA, those foods that are advertised as being low in sodium must now indicate the percentage of sodium in the product. This will be especially helpful to those who have a sodium-restricted diet.

For all foods claiming to be "enriched" or "fortified" or for which any nutritional claim is made, nutrition labeling is now required. Otherwise, nutritional labeling is optional. Where

nutrition information is given, it must be law include the number of servings per package; the size of a serving; calories per serving; amount of protein, carbohydrate and fat in grams per serving; and the percentage of the U.S. Recommended Daily Allowances of various nutrients to be found in each serving. These include protein and seven specific vitamins and minerals.

The information required on food packaging is for our

information and is provided to help us make wise food and dietary choices in food preparation and meal planning. Since this is National Consumers Week, resolve to be more aware of the labels on food products, as well as other products, and use them to make informed choices in the marketplace.

Wheat producers with fields damaged by the Spring freeze face several immediate and important decisions, says an agricultural economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"The producer must first determine the extent of damage to his wheat, the remaining yield potential, and the remaining costs of production to salvage the wheat for grain," said Dr. Jackie Smith, Extension economist and management specialist. Then he must quickly compare costs and benefits of three alternatives to harvesting the remaining grain, Smith said.

The alternatives are: to graze the field with livestock, cut and bale the damaged fields for hay, or plow the wheat under and replant with another crop. There are important factors to consider with each alternative, Smith stressed.

Abandoning damaged wheat fields may be the best alternative for many farmers, the Extension economist said. He said such fields should be plowed under as soon as practical to conserve moisture for alternative crops.

Damaged wheat acres may be replanted with another farm program crop without losing farm program benefits, the economist said.

But he stressed that certification by the county Agricultural

Stabilization and Conservation Service office must first be obtained and several technical requirements must be met. This applies to haying or grazing as well as replanting, he said.

"Farmers should check with their local ASCS office to obtain specific requirements," he said.

"If fences and livestock are available, stocking wheat pastures with stocker cattle may be a favorable course of action," the economist said. Using already owned livestock or leasing the fields for grazing would have the least out-of-pocket expense to the wheat farmer, he noted.

But he cautioned about the possibility of nitrate poisoning, and urged farmers to have the forage tested. And he noted that calf prices are high and said that before buying cattle to put on the fields, wheat growers should budget the costs and benefits, including an estimate of calf losses and the cost of borrowed money.

Cutting and baling the damaged wheat will add costs and risks unless farmers need the hay or are able to market it profitably, Smith said. Cutting, baling, hauling, and storing will cost up to \$1.25 for a 60-pound square bale or about \$20 to \$30 for a 1,200 pound round bale, he estimated.

An abundant hay supply is expected in 1987, so the profit margin will be a very tight, Smith cautioned.
