The Hall County Commissioners Court met in regular session Monday morning to tion Judges for the General and Special Election coming up in Hall County for the next term.

Salaries for the judges was set at \$5.00 per hour with the presiding judge receiving \$25.00 for the returning of all election materials back to the County Clerk's Office after the election.

It was recommended by the Commissioners that no Election Box hire more than three Election Clerks including a Spanish Interpreter to work unless the Commissioners Court authorized the Box otherwise.



Lubbock, Texas

After watching the recent Breyer confirmation hearings, my wife, a high school government teacher, raised an interesting question. Why do we allow strangers to control our lives?

Each year she quizzes her students on the names of our elected leaders. Apparently, few have problems recalling their mayor, state representative, senator, governor or president. Many can even list some county commissioners, city council members, and school board trustees. Yet, when it comes to naming members of the judiciary, there's generally nothing but silence.

To test whether this lack of information was restricted to school students, I conducted my own little survey. The results were quite amazing. Upon being asked to name at least three members of the Texas Supreme Court or Texas Court of Criminal appeals most adults, regardless of age, could not. Nor could they generally recall who sat on their regional court of appeals or district and county

This was truly disturbing given the power judges wield. Excluding the numerous lobbists and special interests involved, it takes 21 senators, 76 representatives and one governor to make a law, but only one judge to throw it out. More importantly, judicial decisions escape public debate or critique before they are rendered. Indeed, a judge is prohibited from so revealing potential ruling. Thus, whether to strike down a school finance law, release a convicted murderer into our community, create new grounds to sue someone, interfere in the operation of the public schools and prisons, deprive parent's of their right to raise children, or do anything else is generally up to each judge's personal view of the

Admittedly, the independence courts enjoy is important, but that very same independence creates a chance for abuse. So, the risk must be minimized. The easiest way of doing this is through the exercise of care in selecting judges. At the very least, we should find out who they are. The extent of their real life experience, legal intelligence, and integrity are also important factors to investigate.

Texans are wary nowadays of strangers. Unlike Issac, in the Bible, we shouldn't let people trick us into believing they are something they are not. Nor should we allow strangers to control our wallets, our taxes, our jobs, our families, our homes and our

New Price Changes For The 1994-95 Fishing and Hunting License

The license fee on the Temporary (14 day) Resident Sportfishing License has been increased from \$5.00 to \$10.00.

The license fee on the Temporary (5 Day) Non-Resident Fishing License has been raised from \$10.00 to \$20.00 and the fee on the Non-Resident Fishing License has been raised from \$20.00 to

A new "Trophy Redfish Tag" will be included on the following licenses without any additional costs: Resident Combination Hunting and Fishing, Resident Fishing, Special Resident Fishing, Non-Resident Fishing and Fishing Duplicate. This tag will allow the license purchaser to keep one redfish over 28 inches in length provided the tag is properly completed and attached to the tail of

the redfish. A new Muzzleloader Hunting stamp (Fee: 10.00), will be required for those individuals who hunt during the special muzzleloader season from January 7, 1995 through January, 1995. This season will be for antlerless deer only and will be held only in the following counties: Bandera, Brown, Coke, Coleman, Concho, Edwards, Gillespie, Ition, Kendall, Kerr, Kimble, Kinney (north of US HWY 90), Menard, McCullough, Mills, Real, Runnels, San Saba, Schleicher, Sutton, Sterling, Tom Green, and Uvalde (north of US HWY 90). This stamp will not be required for those hunters using muzzleloaders during the "general" deer hunting season.
