The Taxpayers' Rights, Remeffers. Responsibitities-a guide for Texas property-gives factproperty taxpayers in Texas According to the guide, the ad valorem tax system in Texas is uned by approximately 3,100 taring units which include setionl districts, exties, counties, and special diatricts.
During the 1985 year, taxing units will levy an estimated 8 ? billion in property taxes. Ap . proximately 50 percent of this levy is collected by school distriets, 20 percent by cities, 18 percent by counties, and 12 percent by special districts.

Taxable property values in the Turkey Quitaque school distriet during the 1983 year totaled $\$ 44$ million while the total market
lue for the district was $\$ 109$
million. The difference in the two figures are accounted to surh as homestead and tax relief for farm productivity. Addition ally, state figures from the Tax Board claim that the school Tlistriet levies taxes on approxiimately ke percent of the taxable value thus elaiming less value than the state market value figures. This is considtant with fatewide tallies, especially rural farming areas.
The largest category of property taxes in the school district in 1983 was acreage used for flarming. This acrobunted tor $\$ 14$ million, followed by homeowners at 59 million. Other categuries contributing substantially to the total value were utilities, comrpercial industry, vehicles and
banks.
