In addition to making a new supply of irrigation gas available to farmers, Slover said the same gas supply could be purchased by other consumers for home heating, usually in cold winter months when the demand for irrigation and agribusiness was less.

As his third issue, Slover stated the last tax bill passed by the Texas Legislature must dismanteled. He said the bill was created by representatives on a spending spree and out of touch with reality.
