## Merrell Family To Hold Century Mark Celebration July 15

Final plans are underway for the 100th year celebration for the Merrell Family. The celebration will take place on the old Merrell farm place in Floyd County, where family members will receive recognition from the State of Texas for owning and operating a family farm for a century. Truman and Melba Merrell continue to live on and maintain the homeplace.

Alex and Mary Francis Merrell settled in Floyd County, 14 miles south of Quitaque, in 1889.

What started out as an annual family reunion has developed into quite an event for local family and friends, as well as descendants and friends from all over the country. The celebration will take place Saturday, July 15, 1989.

A big attraction will be the Plum Creek Brigade. They

are a Mountain Man Club, complete with dress, weapons and entire camp era pre-1840. They will be dressed in buckskins and their camp will consist of teepees and other shelters of that time.

Demonstrations of Tomahawk throwing and rifle firing are scheduled. Their weapons are authentic, as is their entire camp. They will arrive on Friday evening, and leave on Sunday.

Registration will be from 9 to 10 a.m. at the picnic grounds, followed with a program from 10:30 to 11:30 a.m. Lunch will be served at noon, catered by Roy Pigg.

The menu will consist of brisket with all the trimmings. Tickets for the noon meal may be purchased from Florene Cobb at Merrell Grocery, at the First National Bank or from Truman and Melb Merrell in Quitaque.

A pot-luck supper is planned for 7 p.m. Saturday. Cold drinks will be available from the horse tank.

Friends of family members are urged to come out and view the displays of arrowheads, pottery, the Merrell Family Bible, coffee grinder, baby cradle, genealogy records, and other artifacts that a family might collect over a period of one-hundred years. Family members are reminded to bring old pictures, especially of past reunions.

## Family Of Six Injured In Rollover

Six people were injured, five of which were seriously injured in a one-vehicle roll over accident about 7:45 a.m. Monday, July 3, 1989.

A Borger, Texas family according to DPS officer, Dude Speed, was traveling on Texas Highway 70, 8 miles north of Matador at the White Flat community when their vehicle left the roadway on the east side, hitting a concrete header and overturning.

Three of the four children were ejected from the 1987 Chevrolet, while the fourth child remained strapped in a seat belt.

The mother, father and one child were transported to Lubbock General Hospital by Care-Link Air Ambulance. The remaining three children were transported to Lubbock General by Motley County Ambulance.



## 1990 Citizen Count Launched By Bureau

The Census Bureau will soon be sending 31,000 temporary workers into neighborhoods across the country to complete collection, checking and rechecking of housing unit addresses in preparation for the 1990 Census.

Census Day is April 1, 1990. About 100 million questionnaires will be delivered to housing units nationwide by late March 1990.

Accurate address lists are vital for prompt delivery and to monitor the return of completed census forms through and beyond Census Day.

In mid-May census employees begin working in selected large cities to verify residential address information and the number of housing units at each address. This operation ended in late June.

S. Postal Service. Census employees also will update the address list and check for any additional living quarters. All Census Bureau workers will display official red, white and blue identification badges. Residents are asked to cooperate with them. Public cooperation will mean a better, more accurate, and complete address list will be available for the delivery of the 1990 census questionnaires.

Silvertown and other area taxpayers who can't attend the courthouse seminar can still get individual tax assistance by calling the Comptroller's toll-free telephone number, 1-800-252-5555, from anywhere in Texas.

The Amarillo office, headed by Mort Watson, serves twenty-five counties in the Texas Panhandle, including Briscoe County.

## Brucellosis Could Be Problem In West Texas

In West Texas, ranchers are apt to be more concerned about "drought" than "brucellosis." In these parts, there's more occurrence of dry, hot weather than of brucellosis, or "bang's," an incurable bacterial disease that can cause cows to abort, deliver weak calves, or produce less milk. What may come as a surprise, however, is the link between "drought" and "bang's" in this arid section of the state.

"Drought plays a key role in brucellosis infection in West Texas," said veterinarian Jimmy Dusek of the Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC), the state agency charged with eradicating the disease.

Dusek, director of TAHC's Area 2, and his staff of seven animal health inspectors work with ranchers and livestock markets in 32 West Texas counties. They have found two basic drought-related factors that contribute to brucellosis infection.

Dusek explained that during a drought, ranchers typically sell off cattle they can't feed or water. When the weather eases, producers have to buy "replacement" breeding stock. These heifers or cows may come from other states or areas of Texas where brucellosis infection is more common.

"Producers mix new animals into their herd, and then get the nasty surprise of finding these new cows and heifers were infected—and spread the disease," he said.

"We've been spared the higher rates of infection found to the east," Dusek said. "But this is no time to become complacent about protecting herds, if West Texas is to remain 'clean.'"

Dusek said only seven herds in Area 2 are under quarantine because of brucellosis, compared to 832 herds throughout the rest of the state. Area 2 includes a portion of the South Plains and North Central Texas.

"West Texas has been able to maintain good control of brucellosis because of the awareness and concern of producers and their cooperation with the TAHC," Dusek said. "Years of vaccinating replacement heifers have resulted in a population of adult cows with a high degree of immunity to brucellosis."

"Brucellosis infection can be

prevented, particularly in West Texas, where infection rates are already low," Dusek said. "Taking a few precautions can provide added protection for a herd."

Dusek recommended producers purchase heifers and cows only from herds certified by the TAHC to be brucellosis-free. In Texas, 2,113 producers have earned this certification by having their herds tested annually with no indication of infection. Dusek also suggested ranchers buy heifers that were vaccinated against brucellosis when they were between the ages of four and eight months.

"Make sure that any cattle purchased have been tested for brucellosis. Keep these additions to the herd isolated for 60 to 120 days, then retest them before mixing them with the main herd," Dusek said. He noted that producers should insist on receiving documentation proving that animals have been tested within 30 days prior to their sale.

"Keeping fences mended protects herds," Dusek remarked. "Cattle that wander into nearby pastures could contract brucellosis and other diseases from infected animals."

Dusek advised ranchers to manage breeding in herds so that calving is completed in a three- to four-month period. That way, if an abortion occurs, it's more likely to be noticed. If infection does exist

in the herd, there's also less chance the disease will be spread year 'round, since the bacteria is most often transmitted during calving," he said.

### Ginger Ale Sherbet

The special blending of juices and ginger ale create an iced treat you'll want to eat often throughout the summer. Go ahead and enjoy — it's low-salt, no cholesterol and has only a trace of fat.

1/2 cup water	1 cup orange juice
1 1/2 cups sugar	1/2 cup lemon juice
4 egg whites, stiffly beaten	1/2 cup pineapple juice
	3 cups ginger ale

In a saucepan, heat the water and 1 cup of the sugar to the boiling point and cook until the syrup reaches the soft-ball stage — 234° F. to 238° F.

Beat the egg whites until stiff. Continue beating while gradually adding 1/2 cup of the sugar. Slowly pour the hot syrup into the egg whites, beating constantly until mixture has cooled. Then gradually beat in the ginger ale and fruit juices.

Place in the freezer until partially frozen, then remove and whip quickly. Pour into freezing trays, cover and return to the freezer. The texture should resemble that of an Italian ice.

Yield: 8 Servings

Cooking Tip: Raw eggs separate more easily when they are cold, but to get maximum volume from egg whites, beat them when they are at room temperature.
