Area Sales Tax Shows Increase for This Month

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said that payments to cities that collect local sales tax continued to show an increase this month, with July payments up 14.3 percent over those sent in July last year.

"The gaining strength in our state economy is being reflected on a local level, and local governments can continue to expect a steady increase in their share of sales tax collections," Bullock said.

Statewide, year-to-date payments are 10.8 percent higher than the same period last year, according to Bullock.

Quitaque's payment was up 32.08 percent, Turkey's up 37.79 percent, and Silverton's

up 41.22 percent over last year's allocation. Bullock said that 915

In addition to these credits, a person's earnings after 65 may also result in a larger check than would have been payable at 65.

Wayland Gives 16 Month Degree In Electronics

today's most marketable fieldselectronics technology- can be completed in just 16 months through the Vocational-Technical Division of Wayland Baptist University.

The program is designed to move the nontechnical student into today's state-of-the-art technology by combining theory with hands-on experience, according to program director

The degree prepares students for employment in fields that already exist or will soon be

developed.
"Graduates of the program are prepared for employment as engineering assistants in production, maintenance and research and development in the electronics field," said Haigood, a member of the Wayland faculty

for the past three years.

Wayland is one of the few liberal arts institutions in the nation where a vocational-technical degree is available, Haigood added.
Students in the program may

earn the associate of technology (A.T.) degree in as little as 16 months, and their work may also be applied toward Wayland's four-year bachelor of science in ccupational education (BSOE)

The A.T. degree requires a total of 62 semester hours of course work, including 16 hours of academic foundations (English, psychology, computer science, etc.).

A total of 36 hours of specialized electronics courses is also required in such areas as basic electrical theory, computers and robotics. Ten hours of elective course work rounds out the degree

requirements. The program offers credit by examination to qualified students, and previous training or experience in the electronics field may also be applied as credit toward the degree.

Students from any of the 24 counties surrounding Plainvew also receive a tuition credit per semester hour in the electronics

program.
