





Metzer is the areagronomist-cotton with the Texas gricultural Extension Service. he says, The resu cleanout at delinting plant. btain acceptable seed or plant-

yields. High quality seed will contribute to more rapid seedling emergence, uniform stands which can better tolerate cold, wet con ditions associated with seedling lecay organisms.

"In many instances, producer have no choice but to plant lower than desired quality seed," Met zer adds.

"In this case, he should plant his best quality seed first when veather conditions during early spring are more favorable for seedling emergence. As the planting season advances and soil be-comes warmer, the grower can use seed has been exhausted."


