**College Is Extended Challenge**

Clarendon College has been extended a \$100,000 challenge grant for its proposed Ranch and Feedlot Operations facility by an anonymous donor. The college must raise an additional \$410,000 by May 1, 1992. A significant portion of the challenge must be met by the community and former students.

The new building will allow Clarendon College Ranch and Feedlot Operations program to expand from a current enrollment of 25 students to 40 students. The program, directed by Jack Moreman and assisted by Jerry Gage, offers students who are interested in a ranch or feedlot career the opportunities to gain new knowledge and technical skills to meet the needs of coping with today's complex agricultural problems. Extensive field work conducted on ranches and feedyards offers a practical approach to the problems in the ranch and feedlot industry.

Dr. Jerry Stockton, President, Clarendon College, said, "We are pleased to accept this generous challenge grant and the college will begin immediately to raise the necessary funds to meet the challenge. The new facility will enable us to better serve our students and the needs of the area."

**Youngsters Want Environmental Protection**

(NU) - How does the next generation feel about the environment? A recent survey of fifth and sixth graders across America found that most (95 percent) of the 1,011 students queried consider protecting the environment "very important." About two-thirds (68 percent) classified themselves as "environmentalists."

The survey, conducted earlier this year, was commissioned by the Arm & Hammer Division of the Church & Dwight Co. Inc., a pioneer in environmental causes since the turn of the century.

**Drive Carefully On The Fourth**

As many as 12 persons may be killed on Texas roadways during the 30-hour July 4th period, according to Department of Public Safety estimates.

DPS Director Colonel Joe Milner said the summer and vacation traveling holiday times will challenge motorists to avoid driving risks.

"The DPS and other law enforcement agencies throughout Texas will be working together to keep dangerous drivers off the local and rural streets," according to Colonel Milner.

During July 4th last year, which was also 30 hours in length, the DPS tabulated 15 deaths. Deaths due to critical injuries raised last year's final count to 19. This year's counting period begins at 6 p.m. Wednesday, July 3 and continues to midnight Thursday, July 4.

"In 1990, 89 percent of fatalities during July 4th occurred in accidents where speeding over the limits or driving while intoxicated was a factor in this state," Milner added.

Of the 19 traffic deaths, 13 were persons in vehicles where seat belts could have been used.

Milner said additional troopers will be working in areas where high volumes of traffic could be anticipated.

"DPS officers will be watching for intoxicated drivers and speeders, the leading traffic death elements in Texas," Milner stressed.

### Fireworks Injure About 10,000 People Per Year

Fireworks injure nearly 10,000 people every year. A physician at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston says statistics show that many of these injuries are preventable.

"Most injuries from fireworks occur in teenage and pre-teen boys," said Dr. M. Bowes Hamill, assistant professor of ophthalmology at Baylor. "The injuries we most often see, to the hands and eyes, can be prevented by proper, adult supervision."

Children frequently throw firecrackers at each other, causing injury as severe as blindness or deafness when they explode in midair near the head. Injuries to the hand and face occur when fireworks with short fuses go off while they are still being held.

"I recommend that parents take their children to organized fireworks shows, but if they do purchase fireworks, it is important to know how to use them safely and properly," Hamill said.

Never allow fireworks to be used without adult supervision. Never use fireworks in prohibited areas. Always place firecrackers on the ground before lighting them. Never throw firecrackers. Rocket-like fireworks should be launched from the ground, not the hand, and pointed away from people.

Select an open field away from buildings to launch fireworks. Carefully read the instructions and warnings on fireworks.

Hamill says anyone planning to use fireworks should know first aid measures should injuries occur.

Minor burns, the most common injury, should be treated by running cold water over the site immediately. Apply a cold water compress until the pain subsides and cover with gauze or similar material.

If the eye is injured, inspect the area for any foreign object on the eyeball or the eyelids. If it is embedded in the eye, if there is bleeding, if sight is diminished or the pupil is not round, attempt no treatment and take the patient to an emergency room immediately. Otherwise, gently rinse the area with clean water until the object is removed.

In case of an explosion near the ear, perforation of the eardrum is possible. Cover the ear with a clean, dry pad to prevent infection and have a physician examine the area.

A first aid kit is recommended for any outing involving Fourth of July fireworks.

**Spanish Style Mustard Sauce**  
4 tbsp spicy mustard  
2 shallots, peeled and chopped  
2 tbsp extra-virgin olive oil from Spain  
1 cup dry Spanish sherry  
1 tsp chopped fresh tarragon  
4 tbsp mayonnaise

In a microproof glass dish put the oil and the shallots. Microwave for 4 minutes at maximum power. Add the sherry and the tarragon and microwave for 1 minute more.

Transfer to a blender or processor and beat well with the mustard and the mayonnaise. Serve cold, with meat or fish dishes. Serves 4

**Summer Cooling Tips From The Texas Energy Extension Service**

Summer is here and the temperatures have already started soar. If you're not careful, your energy bills can soar, too. Keeping your cool this summer can be a breeze, however, if you use natural cooling methods.

Shading is one way to keep your house cool. Windows are most effectively shaded from the outside because exterior shading devices block heat from entering the house. In addition, any heat absorbed by the shading device is dissipated outside rather than inside.

Trees, shrubs, vines, solar screens, awnings, and shutters are all good sources of outside shade. Although less effective, curtains, venetian blinds and pull-down shades may be used on the inside of windows.

To save money, you can make your own shades and screens. Solar screen material is available at your local hardware store. Also, you can simply tape aluminum foil to the inside of the window pane to reflect the sun's heat.

Proper ventilation will help you make the most of your shade. By opening shaded windows you can create a breeze through your home. Try opening different combinations of windows and doors to get the best air flow. For instance, opening windows located on opposite walls will create the best ventilation.

On days when there is no breeze, you can create a breeze with fans. The moving air that fans provide

cools the body without adding a significant cost. In fact, a fan costs only about 8 cents to run 10 hours, and you can buy a fan for as little as \$10.

Fans and ventilation will allow you to use your air conditioning less. However, when you do use air conditioning, set the thermostat between 78 and 80 degrees when you are home and 80 to 85 degrees when you will be out of the house for several hours.

There are several ways you can keep cool while working inside your house. Dabbing, clothes-washing, ironing and other heat-producing jobs in the early morning or in the evening. Dry clothes and cook outdoors. Also, remember to dress in cool clothing and drink plenty of liquids. A shower or sponge bath can help refresh you.

These tips will help you stay cool as well as save you money. ### Solar Eclipse Visible In U.S. July 11

A partial solar eclipse will be visible throughout the Southwestern United States on Thursday, July 11. In those states, the moon will cover about 60 percent of the sun. A full eclipse will be visible in Hawaii, making this the last total solar eclipse visible from the United States in the 20th century.

"Never look directly at the sun, not even for a second," warns Wayne E. Fung, MD, an ophthalmologist and spokesperson for the American Academy of Ophthalmology.

"Staring at the eclipse can burn the retina, the membrane at the back of the eye that senses light," Dr. Fung said. "Though you won't feel any pain, you may be permanently damaging your sight."

Dr. Fung likened the retina to film in a camera. Once the film is damaged, no pictures can be taken. "There is no treatment for the vision-impaired scarring and permanent blind spots that result from staring at the sun," he said.

He stressed that sunglasses (with or without ultraviolet-blocking coating), welding goggles or smoked glass WILL NOT protect the retina. Viewing the eclipse directly through a telescope or binoculars is even more hazardous, since these devices increase the intensity of the light.

Watching the eclipse on television may be the safest way to enjoy this natural phenomenon, Dr. Fung said.

The eclipse will last approximately two and a half hours. At maximum eclipse, the sun will appear as a crescent, with his "horns" pointing south.

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
