Quitaque City Council Adopts New Policies

The City Council for the City of Quitaque met in a regular meeting December 13, 1993. The Council would like to inform the public of two new policies adopted at the meeting which become effective immediately. The following are copies of these policies.

Policy Number One: Solid waste policy for the City of Quitaque effective December 13, 1993. The following are items that will not be accepted by the City of Quitaque.

- 1. No automobiles or parts of automobiles.
- 2. No washers, dryers, stoves, etc.
- 3. No refrigerators, air conditioners, and freezers.
- No microwave ovens, electronic equipment, fluorescent light ballast and fixtures.
- 5. No hazardous chemicals or containers such as batteries, pesticides or herbicides, acids, motor oil or containers, freon or containers, oil or fuel filters, antifreeze or container, medical
- 6. No tires
- 7. No asbestos waste of any kind.
- 8. No dead animals.
- 9. No concrete, shingles or roofing materials.
- 10. No dirt, rocks or sand.
- No tree limbs and grass clippings.
 Policy Number Two: Water policy guidelines for the City of Quitaque effective December 13, 1993.
- 1. Utility bills must be paid within 30 days or reminder is sent. $2.\,Utility\,bills\,that\,are\,not\,paid\,within\,60\,days\,are\,served\,72\,hour$ notice of disconnection by either certified mail or hand delivery.
- Services are disconnected within 1 working day of notice
- 4. Accounts not classified as good customers only have 30 days to remit payment then 72 hour notice is given.
- 6. There is no variances from the above rules unless it is determined by the city to be a health hazard for the customer. (example person not able to go to store to purchase water.)

Decorate The Holiday Season With Safety

The year's largest and most festive holiday season is upon us. In addition to the celebrations and family gatherings, safety should be a priority when decorating the house or planning the perfect party. Electrical safety is especially impor-tant during the Christmas season due to the many decorative lights draped through trees and aroundhomes. West Texas Utilities Company encourages everyone to observe the following precautions for holiday decorat-

"Use only Christmas lights which are safety-certified by a recognized testing agency such Underwriters Laboratory (UL). Check your tree lights and outdoor lights for damage each year before you use them. Look for frayed wires, loose connections and broken or cracked sockets. Throw away any set that is damaged," said Paul Valdez, Safety Coordinator at WTU

Follow the manufacturer's instructions for using tree lights. All lights should be fastened securely with string, ribbon or rubber bands, but never with conductive wire. Bulbs should not come into direct contact with needles or branches on natural trees. Though bulbs do not emit much heat, it could eventually be enough to dry out the tree

Select lights appropriately and never use indoor lights outside, because they are not designed to be waterproof and could short circuit. Outdoor lights are usually hotter than indoor lights and could pose a hazard if placed on an indoor

Although Christmas lights do not consume a great deal of power, it is important not to overload wall outlets or extension cords. Never run electrical cords under carpets or rugs where daily walking and wear could cause fraying and overheating. Unplug all unneces-sary electrical equipment before restoring power if fuses blow or circuits trip in the home.
