

ratio in grades three and four. The current law, if allowed to remain, will go into effect at the beginning of the 1988-89 school year. It is es-

timated that the state wide annual cost for this provision will be from \$300 - 400 million in LOCAL expenditures, which is not state-

The Valley School Board has adopted a wait-and-see position on this issue before committing funds this issue before committing funds necessary to meet the new requirements. It is anticipated that some changes in the law will be made. Current first and second grade classes will be the first group of students affected by the decreased teacher/outil ratio. decreased teacher/pupil ratio. Presently, there are 30 students enrolled in each of these grades and it is estimated that near that number will exist when September

number will exist when September 1988 rolls around.

Kindergarten, first, and second grades at Valley are currently complying with the law which went into effect for those grades last year. The kindergarten class has 23 students enrolled - one above the required 22 maying. has 23 students enrolled - one above the required 22 maximum but is still acceptable. The first grade is divided into two classrooms and one teacher is assigned each class. The second grade has 30 students enrolled and all students are located in the same classroom with two assigned teachers in a team teaching






