IMPORTANT THAT ALL VOTERS GO TO THE POLLS

This is a very important time in all of our lives, and this could possibly be the last time we have the FREEDOM OF VOTING for the one of our choice.

Many in our voting area buy the Amarillo newspaper, but some probably do not. The Democratic Party doesn't have the money that the Republican Party has access to. That has been proven over the years. It has come to the place where the position or office in our state and our nation is bought, and many times, the vote of the people is not recognized.

There are so many who have stated they will not vote for incumbent Governor Mark White, but that doesn't mean we should pick a governor at random. VOTING IN BOTH DEMOCRATIC AND REPUBLICAN PRIMARIES TABOO

Voting in both the Democratic and the Republican primaries is a "no-no." Not only is this practice in defiance of the Texas Election Code, but it is also a Class "C" misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of up to \$200.00.

In addition, one who has voted in the primary of one party may not vote in a primary runoff of another party.

Since the poll lists of both Democratic and Republican primaries, showing who voted in each such primary, will be filed in the county clerk's office, it will be a simple matter to determine if any person voted in both primaries.

If anyone wants to vote at all in the General Election, he or she must decide before Saturday if he wants to vote Democratic or Republican.

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Pre-Kindergart Survey Being

The Turkey- Quitaque now taking applications to determine the necessity of providing a pre-kindergarten program next year. Applications will be accepted until June 1. Parents who are interested in such a program should also establish the necessity of providing a pre-kindergarten program for their children eligible to participate.

Texas school law now requires school districts to provide pre-kindergarten for children who are four years of age and who are unable to speak or understand the English language in a free pre-kindergarten program. Additionally, children who are eligible for the program must have a family income that is less than the state standard set for the program. State funds are provided to educate children unless these guidelines are met.

Attendance in the pre-kindergarten program is voluntary upon parents but a child who is in the program is required to attend if fifteen children are identified as eligible for the program. Valley School will not accept more than four-year-old program children or more than one child per family. Classes will be on a half-day basis and transportation home must be provided by the parent.

Applications for the program are available at Valley School. Parents must provide proof of their child's age (birth certificate) and family income information at the time of the survey. Immunizations must be current before enrollment time. Please respond no later than May 9.

Pre-Kindergarten Survey Being Made

The Turkey- Quitaque ISD is now taking applications from parents to determine the feasibility of providing a pre-kindergarten program next year. The applications will survey the interest in such a program and also establish the number of children eligible to participate.

Texas school law now requires school districts to provide pre-kindergarten for children who meet eligibility guidelines. According to House Bill 72, any child who is four years old and is unable to speak and comprehend the English language may enroll in a free pre-kindergarten program. Additionally, children are eligible for the program if the parents' income is below the standards set for the free lunch program. State funding is not provided to educate children unless these guidelines are met.

Attendance in the pre-kindergarten program is not compulsory upon parents but the school district is required to provide the program if fifteen or more children are identified as meeting the eligibility guidelines. Valley School will not conduct a four-year-old program unless fifteen or more students enroll. Classes will be operated on a half-day basis and transportation home must be provided by the parent.

Applications for the survey are available at Valley School. Parents must provide proof of the children's age (birth certificate) and family income information at the time the survey is taken. Immunizations must be complete before enrollment time next fall. Please respond no later than May 9.

Turkey Baptists Honor Valley Seniors

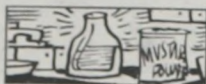
The Seniors of Valley High School were honored by members of the First Baptist Church in Turkey with a Mexican Fiesta Monday evening, April 28.

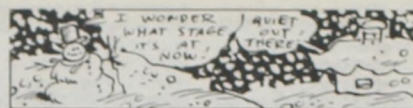
After enjoying a sumptuous meal served in the manner of a Mexican Stack, the group was entertained by Jimmy Burson, who played his guitar and sang

I hear numerous complaints that many cases of alleged criminal activity do not get to the point of being considered by the grand juries. If elected as your District Judge I will be sure that the grand jurors understand that they have the right to consider alleged criminal violations regardless of whether or not the District Attorney agrees or disagrees that such matters should be considered, that the Grand Jury understands that it has subpoena powers and may on its own motion cause witnesses to appear before it for questioning on the matters before it. The grand jury foreman may notify members to appear and consider matters that come to his attention and to the attention of other grand jury members. The District Attorney has no right to dictate to the grand jury as to the witnesses it questions, the matters it may consider, the time when it meets or the time it spends considering alleged criminal activities, and the particular charge in the indictments. The Grand Jury has a right to consider matters with or without the District Attorney being present. It has a right to notify the District Attorney and the District Attorney has an obligation to assist the Grand Jury if called upon to do so.

I have already told the District Attorney of this District that he may not expect me to go along with every plea bargain arrangement that he might suggest and I intend to consider the circumstances of each individual case before approving or rejecting a plea bargain proposal. Plea bargaining has its place in the system but is not appropriate in many cases. Those persons who sell illegal drugs should be dealt with harshly for

the reason that such sales totally ruin the lives of many of those persons using the illegal drugs and causes many crimes on their part to be committed in order to obtain the money with which to pay for the illegal drugs.

Rule 3 B(4) of the Code of Judicial Conduct provides that, "A judge should not make unnecessary appointments." In keeping with this rule unnecessary appointments will not be made. Floyd County is the only county in the judicial district which has an auditor appointed by the District Judge. Under the provisions of our laws (Article 1645 V.A.C.S.) an auditor is not mandatory for Floyd County. Therefore, unless requested to appoint an auditor by a duly passed resolution by a unanimous vote of the Commissioner's Court an auditor will not be forced on the taxpayers of the county. As these are troubled economic times the taxpayers should not be burdened with unnecessary expenses. Under the provisions of the law all counties must have an outside audit each year by an independent auditing firm and such independent audit is sufficient. Contrary to what Judge Miller told the gathering in Lockney on the evening of March 31, 1986 at a meeting of the candidates the Commissioner's Court of Floyd County DID NOT request Judge Miller to appoint an auditor. The cost of maintaining the auditor's office has almost doubled in the term of the incumbent District Judge.

The District Judge has been authorized by law to order the Commissioner's Court to pay certain expenses. This is a broad power of discretion empowering a District Judge to spend taxpayers' money even when such expenses are not necessary in the opinion of the County Commissioners. I intend to consult with the Commissioner's Court of the Counties before arbitrarily ordering them to spend the taxpayers' money. This is a departure from the policy of the incumbent judge who has ordered the Commissioners to pay certain expenses without consulting the Commissioners.

It is the duty of a District Judge to see that the rules of Civil Procedure are followed in the trial of cases, to see that rules of law are properly applied, and in case of jury trials to properly instruct the jury. I will perform

these duties by studying the rules of law and the interpretations of these laws which are contained in Court decisions in order that errors on the part of the Court will be avoided.

The people of this District are entitled to a District Judge who devotes full time to the duties of the office and does not engage in extrajudicial activities in violation of the Code of Judicial Conduct.

In regard to crime and punishment, it is my opinion that appropriate punishment is a deterrent to crime. I believe that the rights of law-abiding citizens should be protected by the imprisonment of those perpetrators of serious crimes who constitute a threat to society.

Probation has a proper place in our system of punishment but I believe it should be used sparingly and only where it appears that a person deserves a second chance to show that he will straighten out his life and be obedient to the laws. In cases where a person on probation violates the conditions of his or her probation then probation should be revoked and the violator should serve his sentence.

If elected as your District Judge I will impose a sentence that will be at least as harsh as what I believe a jury would have assessed in the same case. I do not intend to impose light sentences for serious crimes. I hope such a policy will make criminals more inclined to elect to be sentenced by a jury so that some of the people of this District will have the opportunity to decide what punishment should be inflicted on people who commit crimes.

I realize the tremendous duty placed on a District Judge and if elected I will make a diligent effort to fairly, correctly and efficiently perform those duties. I ask for your support during the course of this campaign and for your vote on May 3.

DEAR EDITOR:

In Mr. Hollums' letter to you dated April 24, 1986, he made numerous statements which are false and are known by him to be false. As Mr. Hollums well knows, the information published concerning Judge Miller's numerous, inexcusable, reversible

errors is well-documented and is true and correct. In addition to this, the files on the W. A. Massie estate are matters of public record in Floyd County in Mrs. Collier's Office. She is required by law, as she well knows, to permit these records to be inspected by anyone who desires

to do so.

I think the people know that if any of the public papers which have been published by me were not true then certainly Mr. Hollums, in view of his attitude or Judge Miller, would have found such errors and certainly pointed them out. This they did not do. It is clear that the public papers of my campaign contain no false statements.

Mr. Hollums falsely states that at the time of the trial of the Fortenberry murder case from Motley County there was no law to instruct the judge as to the charge that was to be given to the jury. This is not the truth. As pointed out by the Court of Criminal Appeals, the statute which Judge Miller should have followed and Mr. Hollums should have known about was adopted in 1925 by the Texas Legislature. This blunder on the part of Mr. Hollums and Judge Miller was the key topic of conversation among the lawyers, peace officers and others in this whole area after the trial. These false statements by Mr. Hollums are an attempt by him to cover up the blunders which were made by him and Judge Miller. The long chain of cases cited by the Court of Criminal Appeals in its opinion reversing Judge Miller's judgment go all the way back to the 1930's and all prove that the law

has been the same since 1925.

Mr. Hollums and I strongly disagree on how Grand Juries in the district should be handled. The problem is that Mr. Hollums thinks that he, as District Attorney, should dominate and dictate to the Grand Juries, decide what matters should be considered, what witnesses should be called to testify, what questions should be asked and what charges should be handed down.

The problem with Mr. Hollums' position is that it is in conflict with the Constitutional and legal right of the people to have a citizen's group (the Grand Jury) to go to with alleged criminal complaints without interference from any public official, including Mr. Hollums. This includes having a Grand Jury in existence at all times. Judge Miller has not promptly selected the Grand Juries at the beginning of each term of Court but instead has selected them when Mr. Hollums decided he had something for the Grand Juries to consider.

The failure of Judge Miller to promptly appoint the Grand Jurors at the beginning of each term of Court denies the people their Constitutional right to take criminal complaints directly to the Grand Jury Foreman so he may call the Grand Jury together

for consideration of these complaints. This Constitutional right of the people to go directly to the Grand Jury foreman was clearly adopted to prevent District Attorneys like Mr. Hollums from arbitrarily deciding which matters will or will not be presented to the Grand Juries.

Mr. Hollums would have the reader believe that somehow Judge Miller is interested in the dignity and integrity of his office. For almost five years Judge Miller violated the Code of Judicial Conduct on a daily basis, took from the Massie Estate thousands upon thousands of dollars that the laws do not permit him to take, and swore under oath in an official proceeding that he maintained a family type relationship with Mr. Massie when the public records of Floyd County reveal that he was not related either by blood or marriage to Mr. W. A. Massie. Mr. Hollums' office is located next door to Judge Miller's office in the Floyd County Courthouse. Mr. Hollums knew about Judge Miller's improper conduct regarding the Massie Estate. Mr. Hollums did not report the Judge's improper conduct to the bar association or the proper officials of our government as directed by the laws governing attorneys nor did he do one single thing to stop Judge Miller from serving as the Executor of the W. A. Massie estate. It appears that Mr. Hollums adheres to the philosophy that right means a covering up a wrong and hiding it from the public view and the Grand Jury. There can be no dignity or integrity in making false statements under oath, nor in violating the Code of Judicial Conduct. Dignity and integrity comes from being honest and obeying the laws, not from making false statements and failing to prosecute officials who violate the laws.

NO PUBLIC OFFICIAL IS ABOVE THE LAW and YOU, THE PEOPLE, have a right and a need to know the truth regarding misconduct of a public official.

"FHA/HERO: A Texas Tradition" was the theme of the 1986 meeting held in the Dallas Convention Center April 25-26.

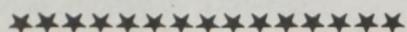

Second Conservation Reserve Program Signup Announced

The USDA Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service today reported that a second sign-up period for the new USDA Conservation Reserve Program will be held from May 5 through May 16, 1986.

Farmers will be offered the opportunity to bid for a Conservation Reserve Program contract for either the 1986 or the 1987 crop year. First Silver Haired Legislature to Be Elected

The Texas Silver Haired Legislature is an elected, representative nonpartisan body of citizens 60-plus years of age. The first Texas Silver Haired Legislature will be elected on May 30, 1986 and will meet this fall in the Texas Capitol for the purpose of considering and voting on legislation that concerns the needs of older Texans. The mock legislative session will closely resemble that of the Texas Legislature. At the close of the session, the Texas Silver Haired Legislature will select several issues which it feels are priority concerns of the elderly and present these to the Texas Legislators.

Although the Silver Haired Legislature is new to Texas, the concept is not new. Many other states have organized and convened a senior legislature with great success.

The legislature, which will debate bills and pass recommendations to the 1987 Texas Legislature, will be made up of 116 Texans over the age of 60. Each of the state's area agencies on aging will sponsor at least four delegates. Five will come from Tarrant, Dallas, Harris and Bexar counties because of their large senior populations.

The Silver Haired Legislature will meet every other year to debate and approve priorities important to senior citizens. The delegates are elected to two-year terms and may be re-elected once.

Why did the Texas Legislature offer this opportunity?

1. To provide older Texans an opportunity to become knowledgeable about the legislative process through involvement.

2. To develop a forum for older Texans for discussion of senior citizens' issues and establishing legislative priorities for the Texas Legislature to consider.

3. To provide advocacy training enabling delegates to continue their role within the commun-

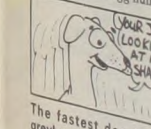

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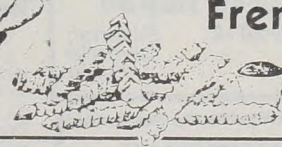
