

Warren, a gerontology specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service, notes that special ways to pass on traditions have been around for a long time.



joy learning about the funny incidents and occasional trouble that their parents got into when they were young," Warren adds. The specialist says that the



#### Microwave Cooking **Teaches Children Essential Skills**

Learning fundamental kitchen skills and basic food preparation techniques is an excellent way for children to exercise both creativity and common sense. Following a recipe and being rewarded with a delectable outcome, or devising and enjoying a new concoction, will bring a sense of accomplishment and fulfillment. Measuring ingredients and assessing proper cooking times reinforce math skills and teach valuable lessons in logical think-ine.

adult supervision is beneficial during a child's initial cooking experiences. Pointers on organization and safety should be discussed prior to the project being un-dertaken.

#### Avoid surprises

Reading the entire recipe and assem-bling all ingredients and utensils before beginning will help avoid surprises and ensure that all will go smoothly.

A reminder on the importance of main-taining a clean work area — and hands — and perhaps a short lesson on cleaning techniques are important for assuring sani-tary conditions.

techniques are important for assuring sani-tary conditions. Helping a child choose an appropriate project will increase the likelihood that it will be completed successfully. Youngsters who have previously acted as "assistants" to adults, or who are old enough to read well and have well-devel-oped motor coordination, will be able to handle a recipe of greater intricacy than will a younger child with limited experi-ence in the kitchen.

For child cooks of all ages, microwave cooking has particular advantages. Be-cause there is no exposed heat source, the risk of fire and burns is reduced and, be-cause foods heat quickly, immediate results will delight children with short at-tention coast.

cause foods near quicky, infinitedual delight children with short attention spans. 
