## Childress Man Is Candidate For State Office

Eddie J. (Ed) Leary of Childress has officially announced his candidacy as a Democrat for State Representative for District 66, Collingsworth, Donley, Armstrong, Wheeler and Gray counties.

Leary is 42, and is married to the former Wanda Graham of Matador, Texas. She is employed with the First National Bank of Childress. They have a daughter, Susan, 15, a freshman in Childress High School, and a son, Marvin Curtis, 11, who is in Childress Junior High School.

Leary is self-employed in automotive business in Childress and has family farming and ranching interests in Motley and Hall counties. He also has some 12 years experience in all lines of the insurance field.

He attended school at Northfield, Tell and Estelline, and attended Texas A&M and Texas Tech. He is an overseas veteran of the U. S. Army. Leary has been very active in community and civic work, being past-president of the Ambassadors Club, past director of Rotary, director in the Childress Chamber of Commerce, president of the Little League Baseball for the past two years, a past director of Little League Football, a past Cubmaster of Pack 67, member of the VFW, American Legion, Elks 1113 of Childress.

The Learys are members of the First United Methodist Church of Childress, and Mr. Leary is past-president of the Fellowship Sunday School Class.

Mr. Leary is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Leary of Childress and is the grandson of the late J. M. Bell of Estelline and the late F. E. (Ed) Leary and Mrs. Leary of Estelline.

In his announcement he said, "I feel that our district is in need of constructive and active representation which is necessary for the future growth of our district, and not for down-state big-city interest.

"Today our state is faced with many problems, not the least of which is the legislature itself. It is my opinion that actions and judgments of the last legislature must be replaced with a greater degree of concern if we hope to contend with the serious tasks which lie ahead.

"I feel that we should have budget restraints, and action to maintain local control over school districts. We must devise a more acceptable welfare program, yet providing the needs necessary for our people.

"We must work toward more industry for our area and better agricultural and water control practices to help our area grow.

"I feel that I can bring to this office a wide range business background, with good common sense, mature judgment, and experience necessary to provide this district with real representation. I believe that patriotism and honesty in government is not old fashioned.

### District Tournament Starts Thursday

The District 4-B Basketball Tournament starts Thursday afternoon at 4:00 p.m. in the Childress High School Gym with the Quitque Pantherettes facing the Estelline Bearettes in the first game of the tournament. The Hedley Owls take on the Estelline Bears in the second game, that one scheduled to start at 5:30. The boys and girls tournament is being held at the same time this year for the first time in several seasons.

The Hedley Owlettes and the Lakeview Eaglettes tangle at 7:00 p.m. Thursday evening and at 8:30 p.m. the Turkey Turks and the Quitque Panthers square off against each other for the last time ever. The two schools will be consolidated next season and will be teammates in the future.

In the girls bracket the winner of the Quitque-Estelline game will meet the winner of the Lakeview-Hedley game on Friday night at 7:00 p.m. for the tournament championship. If Quitque wins the tournament, they are the district champions, but if anyone other than the Pantherettes win the tournament, then the tournament winner must have a playoff game against the Pantherettes for the district title because the Pantherettes are the round robin winners. That happened last year as Lakeview was the round robin winner and Hedley won the tournament, forcing a playoff between the two teams with Lakeview winning the playoff and the district title.

The same situation, of course, holds true in boys action with the Hedley Owls owning the round robin championship, being undefeated in district competition. They will be heavily favored to win the district title without a playoff.

The last place teams in the round robin portion of district play were eliminated from the district tournament. The Turkey Turkettes and the Estelline Bearettes were tied for last place in the final standings and were forced to playoff for fourth place, that game being played Monday night at Hedley and Estelline winning it 42-26.

Final standings in district play were Quitque in first place; Lakeview, second; Hedley, third, and Estelline, fourth.

In the boys bracket the Hedley Owls are in first place; Turkey, second; the Quitque Panthers, third, and Estelline Bears, fourth. If a playoff game or games should be necessary, they will be Saturday night.

### Quitque Splits Games At Hedley

The Quitque High School Basketball teams drove over to Hedley Friday night of last week to play a pair of district games and wind up the regular season's schedule, and after the firing was over the Pantherettes had squeaked by the Owlettes to win the round robin title and the Pantherettes had given the Owls a bit of a scare bowing out.

The Pantherettes won a very satisfactory victory, and a spintangling affair over the Owlettes, a 36-32 win that went down to the very final buzzer before the winner was apparent.

Hedley scored first, a free throw, then led all the way until five minutes deep in the fourth period when the Pantherettes went ahead 29-28, and the Owlettes couldn't quite catch up again. The officials were calling a very tight game and the Pantherettes were drawing a lot of calls against them and the Owlettes were making the most of them, managing to stay out in front of the Pantherettes, who were getting plenty of shots but couldn't get them to stay down. Hedley led 6-5 at the end of the first period and 25-14 at halftime. Quitque's hard-working guards held the Owlettes to a single field goal in the third period and managed to cut the lead to 20-27 at the end of three periods. With three minutes left to go the Pantherettes went ahead to stay. Ironically, it was free shots that wrapped up the win for Quitque, with Cheri Brown hitting for three and Mary Brunson tossing in two in the final two minutes of action. Eva Cheatham hit a fielder with two minutes left to give the winners a three-point margin and put the pressure on Hedley and they had to foul in trying to get the ball away from the Pantherettes. Quitque's guards did a terrific job on the Owlettes, allowing them only six field goals in the entire game, and limiting them to seven points in the last half of play. The Owlettes were outstanding at the free throw line, however, sinking 20 of 23 chances. The Pantherettes, who had a very poor shooting percentage, still dumped in 12 field goals. ### Lake Theo Re-Stocked With Big Fish

Lake Theo, nestled in the picturesque Caprock country approximately four miles north of Quitque, was restocked with about 2,000 pounds of large fish Monday morning. Of this number, there were 1,500 pounds of two- to eight-pound channel catfish, about 250 pounds of which were the unusual albino catfish which some believe are the best for eating; 250 pounds of one-pound size crappie, and some five- to six-pound bass. The lake already was stocked with channel catfish, bass, crappie and sunfish. Some of the fish

were tagged, and prizes will be awarded the fishermen catching them.

The fish were delivered by Wade Finley from Lone Oak, Arkansas, to 138-acre Lake Theo, which is brimming full to 65-foot depth.

The lake is under new management, with Charles (Mule) Grantham in charge. He and W. H. Brooks are now selling permits for fishing by the day or yearly family fishing permits, and are also selling live fish. After March 18, the office at Lake Theo will be open 24 hours a day. Until then, Charles Grantham can be contacted at his home in Silvertown at night by calling 806-823-4911.

Since live fish may be purchased at Lake Theo, there is no need for any fisherman to go home empty-handed. "If he comes to Lake Theo with any money at all," Grantham laughs, "there is no need for him to go home without any fish. With the lake restocked with big fish, the fishing should be excellent, but if he fishes all day and doesn't catch enough, he can buy some to cook at his campfire or to take home with him. There's no reason why any fisherman should be embarrassed to go home from a day of fishing at Lake Theo! Come out and try your luck; you might catch one of the tagged fish and win a prize!"

### Purcell Asks Farm Loan Price Increase

U. S. Representative Graham Purcell (D-Tex) today called for action by the Senate Agriculture Committee on a bill to increase commodity loans by 25% on wheat and feed grains. The bill had originally cleared the Livestock and Grains Subcommittee, headed by Purcell, and passed the House of Representatives by a close vote immediately prior to the Christmas recess.

Following Secretary of Agriculture Earl Butz as a witness before the Committee, Purcell submitted a statement denouncing the plight of the grain farmer at the hands of the Nixon Administration.

In speaking of House passage of the bill, he said, "I had the bill taken up before (my) Subcommittee for two simple reasons—low farm income and a rapidly increasing lack of faith by the American farmer that he is anything other than a second class citizen in the eyes of the Federal Government. Under the stewardship of this Administration, and its set-aside program, farm income has dropped to the lowest point since the depression.

"Perhaps all the failures do not belong to the Administration," Purcell continued. "The corn

blight, for example, was more a function of a higher authority than of Secretary Hardin. However, the attitude of this Administration, which sees farmers as nothing more than another group to be appeased by a circus on the White House lawn, is not."

The Northwest Texas Congressman called for immediate enactment of the legislation and pledged his efforts of cooperation to insure quick Senate passage of the bill.
