Briscoe County Home Demonstration Agent HOW'S THE HUMIDITY IN YOUR HOME?

Just by heating your home in the winter, you may be creating air conditions drier than the desert. And, according to W. S. Allen, Extension Agricultural En-gineer at Texas A&M University, ead to respiratory problems, high neating bills, and extreme drying of furniture and floors.

When humidity is low—and it an drop as low as five or ten percent in your home—the mois-ture on your skin evaporates ra-pidly and you feel chilly. So you turn up the heat and the air gets even drier. To solve this low humidity prob-

Allen suggests these several

In homes with hot air heating systems, an automatic humidifier unit can be fitted into the furnace air ducts. These units must be cleaned occasionally and hard water can be a problem in some areas, but the result is better

Where there is no hot air system, free - standing humidifier units can be purchased. Some of improved units now can put out by moisture without heat by means of a centrifugal atomizing unit.

The engineer also suggests another less formal and more old-fashioned method of humidifying a house. It's a steaming tea kettle. Not only does it add considerable amounts of moisture to the air, but it's particularly good, he adds, when your family is suffering from colds.

SOAKING LAUNDRY-A TERRIFIC OLD IDEA

Consumers are being bombard-d with so-called washday mir-cles — laundry products supercharged with enzymes.

Research proves enzyme products get rid of many stubborn stains, but the housewife may be satile and economical. able to achieve the same results at half the cost.

The idea of soaking clothes be-fore laundering to make your wash significantly cleaner is not

Presoaking with detergent does a good job on most of the stains as does enzyme presoaks, tests have shown. .

In the tests there was some very slight difference between the en-zyme products and a detergent in their performance on blood and gravy stains, with the enzymes do-ing slightly better. But all three removed egg stains completely in 30 minutes of soaking and spa-

ghetti sauce overnight.

She suggests that housewives first try presoaking in a solution made up of whatever laundry detergent they now use. It may perform surprisingly well —and at half the cost of an enzyme present

DRIED SKIM MILK WILL WHIP

A dried skim milk which can be whipped into a low-calorie dessert topping has been developed by U. S. Department of Agricul-tural scientists. The mixture needs no refrigeration or precooling of utensils, reports Extension Foods and Nutrition specialists. The ex-perimental product can be stored without refrigeration. Skim milk which has been homogenized be-fore drying and reconstituted with one part powder to two parts waer will produce a foam if whipped or three minutes.

GRAPEFRUIT

Much of the grapefruit, the red meated variety, now available is from the Rio Grande Valley. t is classed as seedless, although the fruit may have a few seeds. Grapefruit is a bonus fruit: low

To shop for grapefruit, select firm, well-shaped fruit that it heavy for its size. Heavy fruit is usually thin-skinned and juicy.

Thick skinned and pufry grape fruit usually is less juicy. A slight ly pointed stem end on a grape fruit indicates thick skin.

Skin blemishes and discolora-tion on the outer skin do not af-fect eating quality.

Grapefruit is commonly sold by size such as 96's, 80's, 40's, 23's or 36's. The number refers to the number of fruit packed in the box


