CPR Participants Get Ready To Sow Seed

Farmers who have placed their land in the Conservation Reserve Program have been busy trying to beat the June 1st deadline for sowing native grass. Killing of litter crops has also kept everyone busy.

Before sowing grass farmers should look closely at their cover crop and their seedbed. Our dry weather has left us with some very hard, dry, and cracked soil surfaces. These conditions have left a very poor seedbed to plant into. This is especially true in fields that were heavily grazed. Most grass drills are designed for planting into firm seedbeds, but not into the hard baked soils surfaces we are seeing. In many cases, the drill disks will not even take the ground

or stir up any loose soil to cover the seed. In one field we looked at, even a heavy coultter cart would not cut in to the soil. I would think twice before trying to drill into these conditions. Grass seed is too expensive to risk doing it twice. In several fields, the roughness of the soil surface left by cattle grazing has made it almost impossible to pull a drill through. Due to expensive damage this has caused to several drills and the poor seedbed, we now recommend these fields be plowed and planted to a sorghum litter crop.

Killing of wheat for a dead litter crop should be done before the wheat makes a hard seed. This can be done by spraying with Roundup or

Paraquat, or by mowing or shredding. One unique idea we heard was using a combine to clip the green heads off. This can be done a lot faster than shredding and it leaves more of the stalk standing for protection. Remember that this wheat cannot be harvested for grain so this should be done before the wheat makes a hard seed. Also, the combine should be set to allow all of the clipped heads to pass through without thrashing out the grain.

Most of all, we need a rain! A good slow soaking rain would compensate for a lot of poor seedbeds and cover crops and make us all look good. When it's all said and done, the advice we give you is simply to help you improve the odds of getting a good stand of grass. Now all we need it for Mother Nature to do her part.

"HORSEBACK"

Back in the early Model "T" days a horse and saddle ment just as much to a boy as a car does now, and very few people owned a car. Most families had from one to three good saddle horses with a good saddle to go with each horse. As there were no paved roads and the county roads were not kept in very good condition. It was easy to saddle up your horse and strike out across county to see your neighbor or round up the other stock. Your saddle horse was much like the Model "T", you had to furnish plenty of fuel in the form of maize-corn and all kinds of fodder. Then after a good brush down with a brush made for the purpose, and a good curry comb job the horse would be ready to carry you to school and be tied up to a hitching post all day with out any feed or water. But after you got home from school the first thing to do would be to care for the horse and saddle. There were also hitching racks and posts in front of the churches. Some of the saddle horses also made good buggy horses and this way you could take your best girlfriend to church with you.

A good saddle horse usually had several gaits such as walk, lope, trot, pace, single foot, and fox trot. But for a good cow horse used only to work cows it only needed to walk, trot and lope, and out smart the cow. When you saddled up in the morning and started to mount you weren't always sure of staying on for sometimes you horse would pitch and you had to be a pretty good rider to stay aboard.

Now its much better this day in time to go out and get into a good automobile, pull out on a super highway and go any where you wish. But sixty years ago the old saddle and horse was "O.K."

Local Men To Ride In Memorial Trailride

Two Quitaque men, Leroy Hamilton and Ronnie Chestnut will be riding in The Panhandle Heritage Memorial Trailride sponsored by the Randall County Sheriff's Posse. This will be Leroy's fourth time to ride and Ronnie's second. "Fish" Wilson will be along and play the role of chaperone.

The trailride begins on the north rim and down into Palo Duro Canyon and is only accessible to members of the trailride. The early morning breakfast to get the riders ready is set at the Figure 3 Ranch southwest of Claude. The trail descends about 600 feet to the canyon floor below where the Quahadi Comanches made their home and also where Charles Goodnight established the famed JA Ranch over one hundred years ago.

The lunch stop for the first day will be where the trail

intersects State Highway 207 about 17 miles south of Claude. This is the only access to a public road the rest of the day. A chuckwagon style Barbeque dinner will be served to all riders at the overnight campsite at Coon Creek.

The second day will find the riders making their way due south to the Caprock Canyons State Park in Quitaque. A brief stint down the right-of-way of State Highway 256 and another short stretch of country road, the trail will enter through the back door of the Park.

The final three miles of the trail are the most spectacular as single-file riders make their way to the horse unloading area in the Park.

Riders should arrive at this area approximately 6:00 p.m. Come out and see how the riders fared on a 2 day trail ride through some pretty but rough country.

Social Security

Everyone who works in Social Security - covered employment - and that means almost everyone - should keep his or her records up to date. This means reporting changes in circumstances that could affect the person's eligibility for, or the amount of, Social Security payments. Among the changes that should be reported is a change in name.

Many newly-married women continue to use their maiden names at their places of employment. A woman who intends to use her married name, however, should report the change to any Social Security office and apply for a new social security card. The new card with the same number but a new name is usually issued within two weeks.

To effect a change in name, a newly married woman can use the original or a certified copy of her marriage certificate, showing both her old and new names. If she is foreign born, she will also need proof of United States citizenship or current alien status.

Social Security makes no charge for a name to be changed on its records. Some firms advertise that they will provide this service for a fee; however Social Security offers this service, as it does all other services, free of charge.

The process can be started simply by phoning the Social Security office, our telephone number is 293-9623, or you may drop by at 1401-B West 5th if you need any further information.

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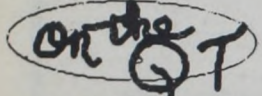
