

Candidates File For Place On Voters Ballot

The race for the upcoming city and school elections to be held Saturday, May 5, 1990 officially began last week, as the filing deadline drew to a close at 5 p.m. Wednesday. Candidates in Quitaque will not be opposed in the mayoral and councilperson's race, but the City of Turkey has two places where two residents are seeking the same office

Scott Johnson and Steve Farley have made their bid for the office of Mayor of the City of Turkey and Russell Yates is seeking to unseat incumbent Brian Wheeler as city councilman, place one. Rita Guest filed for re-election to place four and will be unopposed on the ballot. Current mayor, Hubert Price, did not seek re-election.

Elgin Conner is unopposed for re-election as mayor of Quitaque, and voters in Quitaque

will elect two new members to their city council. Danny Mayfield and Janice Henson will be unopposed in the May election. They will replace Warren Lee Merrell and Todd Washington, who chose not to seek re-election.

Valley School had four places to fill in the Board of Trustees race. Brent Guest and Gary Powell filed for re-election to their 3-year terms. Thelma Gafford, currently serving as president of the Board, did not seek re-election, citing other responsibilities as the reason. Gregg Ramsey will run unopposed for the 3-year term. Brian Wheeler made his bid for the unexpired two-year term vacated recently by Leck Fuston. Voters will go to the polls in the city and school elections on Saturday, May 5, 1990.

Carlye Fleming, Briscoe County Appraisal District Chief Appraiser, is presently working on the re-appraisal which is required every three years. The Host Mexican Dinner tax law requires her to visually inspect every building, house, barn, etc. in the county during a re-appraisal.

Mrs. Fleming has asked that citizens who see her white car driving through their property or stopping at their home not be alarmed.

"I am required to check every improvement in Briscoe County," she said, "but most of the time I don't even have to get out of the car. I don't want to scare anyone when I drive up, stop, and then drive on.

When the appraisal sheets and maps are verified, this will not be done again for three years.

Jim Robinson, executive director of the State Property Tax Board (SPTB), today reminded business owners that they must file property rendition forms with local appraisal district offices by April 2, 1990.

The legal deadline for rendi-tions is actually March 31, which falls on a Saturday this year. As a result, the 1990 deadline has been moved to the first working day after March 31. Property owners may receive a 30-day extension, but must file a writ ten request with the appraisal district by April 2, 1990.



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
