Los Voladores At Six Flags Over Texas

A show which has thrilled thousands from throughout the world—Los Voladores—is now at Six Flags Over Texas.

"Los Voladores—The Flying Indians Spectacular," was the feature of the Mexican government's entry in the 1964 New York World Fair. For years the show has been seen at the Palacio Tropical in Acapulco.

The best-known feature is the "flight" by four members of the troupe who spiral from the top of a 100-foot pole while grasping slender ropes.

The flight is the modern version of a 400-year-old game of the Totonacan Indians, who still live in the vicinity of Veracruz. The breathtaking descent of the flyers is preceded by a performance by the troupe's Chief who dances on a 12-inch platform, ten stories in the air with no protection whatsoever.

The flyers are brilliantly costumed to represent eagles and other birds. The costuming is based on the Indians' religious belief that the dead returned to earth in the form of birds.

To accommodate the new attraction, Six Flags' arena, on the west side of the huge theme park, has been completely redesigned. More than 2,000 persons can be seated in the shaded outdoor theatre for each performance. Los Voladores present four to five shows each day through Labor Day. The show is free to all guests who have bought Six Flags popular, one-price ticket.

FLYERS ARE INDIANS
The flyers are Totonacan Indians. About 13,000 members of the Totonacan tribe live in Papantla, Mexico, following the traditions that date back to Aztec times.

The Indians of Los Voladores have leased a home for their use during the Six Flags stay. Since American food tends to disagree with Totonacan digestion, they have brought their own cook to prepare their native dishes.

The flight of the Voladores from

the top of a 100-foot pole is based on a pre-Columbian rite designed to bring to the attention of the gods the fact that some rain was needed. The original ceremonial pole was a tall tree.

No nets or other modern safety devices are used. Except for the ropes tied loosely around their waists, the flyers have no protection whatsoever.

The flyers speak only their native Indian dialect. The Chief

has a very limited knowledge of Spanish.

The man who created the Flyers, the founder of Acapulco's world-famous Club de Ski.

The costumes worn by the Totonacs represent eagles and other birds familiar to the Vera Cruz area. All of the costumes are adapted from the originals by Julio Angel Miranda, who is well known in Mexico as a researcher and museum consultant.

Shirttail Sermon

"The Lord disciplines him whom he loves." Hebrews 12:6.
The question is sometimes asked, "How can a person call God a merciful Father and stern judge?"

The answer to this question is found in the word "Love." The father who loves seeks to teach. He seeks to teach through words of wisdom and also through active example. As he seeks to teach, he remembers that the child does not know a great many things and so his judgement is faulty. As a result, he will make many mistakes. When he makes these mistakes, due to ignorance, the father will not punish him excessively; his discipline will be tempered with mercy. If the child has learned his lesson, it will be well and good. If he has not, the discipline will be more severe each time that he does wrong.

The same thing is true of God. He seeks to teach us the good way of life. He uses the Bible, our parents, our Sunday School teachers, our public school teachers, our pastors, and more experienced people. As we learn God's will for us, we are bound to make mistakes. When we do, God understands, and imposes discipline upon us, but it is discipline tempered with mercy.

God becomes a stern judge when we deliberately disobey Him and do something that we know is wrong. It is then that we have no

excuse for our action. It is then that we pray, "Be merciful unto me, a sinner."

Love is the root of mercy and the beginning of discipline.

SCIENTISTS DEVELOP NON-ALLERGENIC BANDAGE

"When the bandage applied to a cut or scratch causes a bigger medical problem than the cut itself, it's time for science to step in with a solution," said William O. Elson, medical research director for the Kendall Company's Curity Division.

"In cases like this, the patients have an allergic reaction — not to the bandage itself, but to the resin used in the adhesive," the research scientist explained.

"No statistics are available concerning the percentage of people who suffer because of their allergies to one or more of the substances used in standard adhesives. But we do know it's needlessly high — for we have now created an adhesive which is hypo-allergic, meaning it is made of a non-allergic substance," Elson stated.

A Series of Improvements
The new adhesive was perfected by Curity scientists and researchers. It is made of a single substance, and is produced under controlled conditions. Allergic reactions to the new adhesive are almost non-existent.

The break-through against allergic reaction to bandages is the latest in a long series of bandage improvements by Curity scientists. An important development of a few years ago was the perforated "telfa," a plastic material used to prevent any part of a wound, or healing skin, from adhering to the bandage.

The telfa perforations permit exudates to flow through into a highly-absorbent gauze portion of the bandage; they also permit the free flow of air to the wound, while keeping out harmful bacteria. The ease with which telfa bandages can be removed caused the coining of the now-familiar word, "ouchless."

"The modern bandage is a far cry from those of only a few decades ago," said Elson. "Waterproofing, venting, sterilizing, and new materials have dramatically altered the bandage itself. Now, the use of hypo-allergic adhesive completes the job."
