Mr. Klas tal Service—in its first year of re-organization — required \$1.3 billion in a direct Congressional appropriation, down 34.8% from a high of \$2.08 billion in 1971.

"We have pursued two major goals: Improve the quality and re-liability of mail services and re-duce costs," Mr. Klassen said in submitting the first annual report to the Board of Governors since

July 1, 1971, with a mandate to be self-sustaining by 1984. Revenues totaled \$7.8 billion in

Fiscal Year 1972, up 18.3% from 1971 while operating expenses amounted to \$9.5 billion, up 6.3%. al revenues, fees and income for the first year of the U. S. Postal Service provided 84% of total costs.
