## VALLEY TRIBUNE ANNOUNCING SUBSCRIPTION PRICE INCREASE

Beginning March 1, subscription prices to The Valley Tribune will be increased 50 cents per year.

This is the first increase for The Tribune since its beginning in 1960, but due to rising costs of production, the publishers feel they must raise the prices. A rate increase for advertising will be announced soon.

Beginning the first of March subscriptions for Briscoe, Hall and adjoining counties will be \$3.00 per year, elsewhere, \$3.50 per year. Single copies will sell for 7 cents per copy.

Anyone who wishes to save the fifty cents by renewing or subscribing before March 1 is welcome to do so.

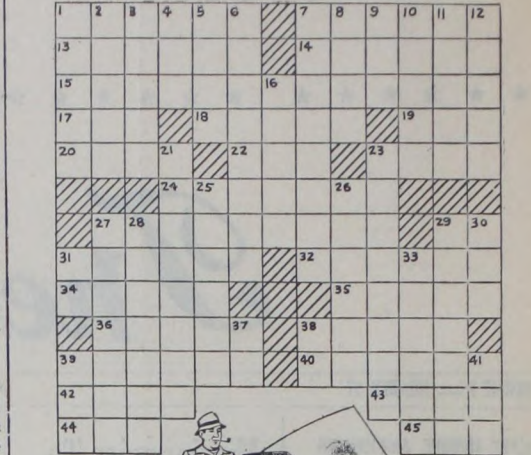

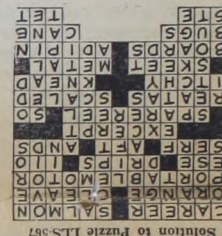

**COMMITTEE FORMED TO REPRESENT RURAL INTERESTS IN SCHOOL PROGRAM**

After a hundred years of fighting boll weevils year by year, man for man, at costs up to \$50 per acre per year, there is reason for the excitement in cotton circles as plans are laid for the first large-

scale trial run at his eradication. Such plans are developing in connection with the five year old High Plains Diapause Control Program. And while no miracles are expected in the beginning, this could be the biggest step yet toward ridding farmers of the cotton boll weevil, once and for all.

It is hoped that details of the attempt can be finalized at a meeting of entomologists and administrative people from the five participating agencies in College Station February 12 and 13.

Preliminary plans call for the use of two new weevil control techniques, sex traps and a systemic insecticide, to kill weevils as they emerge from hibernation. Both the new methods were successfully tested during the diapause program of 1968.

The area to be covered lies north of Highway 82 in Dickens, Motley, Briscoe and Hall counties. Involved will probably be from 40,000 to 50,000 acres of cotton in a strip about 60 miles long and 40 miles wide.

The diapause program carried out in this area for the past five years has reduced the hibernating weevil population to about 5 or 10 per cent of the numbers in comparable areas outside the control zone. And survey records have pinpointed the "hot spots" of weevil hibernation, which will permit strategic placement of sex traps and systemic-treated "trap plantings" in the eradication trial.

Taking part in the program on a dollar for dollar basis will be cotton producers in the 23-county High Plains area represented by Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., USDA's Plant Pest Control and Entomology Research divisions of the Agricultural Research Service, Cotton Producers Institute and the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Sex traps, or pheromone traps, baited with live weevils reared in USDA's Boll Weevil Laboratory at State College, Mississippi, and flown to the High Plains, will be placed along the periphery of known hibernation sites throughout the test area. Some of the traps will be "set" before cotton in commercial plantings is avail-

able to emerging weevils, probably in the latter part of April. They will be maintained through May and June and possibly the early part of July in the hopes of catching every weevil as he leaves his winter home.

More traps will be put out in the interior of the test zone later in the season to evaluate the effectiveness of the project.

Backing up the sex traps will be small trap plantings of cotton treated with a systemic insecticide called "Temik." These, too, will be strategically located near areas where records show weevils have traditionally hibernated.

Ed Dean, Field Service Director for PCG, which initiated the diapause program in 1956 and has served as coordinator since that time, says "In theory if the sex traps don't get the weevils as they emerge, Temik will."

But Dean points out that even with complete success in this trial run there are several hurdles to cross before such an eradication system could be widely used to eliminate the aerial sprayings used in the diapause control program.

"First, the use of live weevils in sex traps is both expensive and cumbersome. Second, Temik is not yet licensed for widespread use, and its current price would make it prohibitive even if it were licensed," he said.

So final eradication in all likelihood must await the day when scientists have successfully synthesized the sex attractant secreted by live weevils, and possibly a more economical systemic insecticide.


"Nevertheless," Dean went on, "researchers feel they are on the verge of both these discoveries, and this test will give us a running start at eradication when the stumbling blocks are removed."

The primary objective of the diapause program continues to be the prevention of westward weevil migration and the firm establishment of weevil populations in cotton areas on the High Plains and on into other western states.

"This eradication trial has two chances to be helpful in the accomplishment of this objective," Dean said. "If completely success-

ful, could eventually lead to movement of the control zone farther east and the elimination of the need to carry on an extensive spray program in the PCG area.

"And even if only partially successful, a further perfection of the techniques used might mean a more effective and economical means of stopping migration."

### COTTON TALKS

AUSTIN — A statewide committee to represent rural landowners and those who enjoy living in the country during the expected struggle over school district consolidation in the current session of the Texas Legislature was announced here Wednesday.

The group, known as "The Little Red School House Committee", is composed of a cross-section of farmers, ranchers and rural landowners from throughout the state. Charles Schreiner III a prominent rancher from Mountain Home, is chairman of the committee.

"We believe the forced consolidation of small school districts, as proposed in the report of the Governor's Committee on Public School Education, will go a long way toward destroying rural life as it is now enjoyed in Texas," Schreiner declared in a news conference at noon Wednesday.

Schreiner pointed out that the Governor's Committee recommends the forced consolidation of Texas' 1,218 school districts into a total of 353.

This would virtually wipe out 865 community centers, since most rural schools are the primary symbols of community identification," Schreiner said.

He refuted the claim that bigger school districts would automatically provide better education for students. "Mere bigness is not an absolute guarantee of excellence," he said.

"The Little Red School House Committee and all its members certainly want to provide the best education possible for the young people of our state," Schreiner said. "But we don't believe that this proposed forced consolidation program requiring the elimination of nearly 99 school districts in Texas is the answer."

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# Shirttail Sermon

The text is very short but meaningful: "He that is not with me is against me." It is found in Luke 11:23.

Jesus points out that there is no middle ground: one is either on

the side of Jesus or he is on the opposing side, the side of the devil. And also that one cannot be with Jesus part of the time and not with Him at other times. Surrounding circumstances make no differ-

ence in the final analysis. We cannot be with Jesus when in the company of Christians and not with Him at other times. We must be with Him all the time or be counted against Him. This is the decision that every man must make.

How does Jesus know who is with him? He knows by the acts of people. "Be not hearers of the word only, but be doers also." Those who hear His word and do what He tells them are the ones that are with Jesus. It is not enough to simply say, "Lord I am with you." We must say that and add, "What would You have me do?" It has often been said that actions speak louder than words. This is true in our relationship with Jesus.

How does Jesus know who is not with Him? He knows by the lack of Christian acts. It is not enough simply to stand before a group of people and say that we believe in Jesus. We must then give action to our words through acts of love and mercy and kindness.

The most important question that we can ask ourselves is: "Which side am I on?" Equally important

**ACCURATE RECORDS NEEDED TO BE KEPT ON FARM LABOR**

**COLLEGE STATION**—The minimum wage for hired farm workers went up from \$1.15 to \$1.30 per hour on February 1, 1969, according to James I. Mallett, farm management specialist of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Farm employers who used more than 500 man-days of farm labor in any calendar quarter of the preceding year and are required to pay the minimum wage during 1969. Immediate family members and hand harvest pieceworkers who commute from their own home and worked less than 13 weeks in the preceding calendar year are not included in the man-day count. In addition, man-days of agriculture workers employed by a bonafied contractor are not included in the man-day count. Mallett says.

A man-day, for determining the 500 man-day count, is any day an employee worked one hour or more. Each 7-day period during which an employee worked one

hour or more on one or more days is counted as one week for the 13-week test.

Certain employees are not covered by the minimum wage. These include immediate family members, hand harvest pieceworkers who commute daily and worked less than 13 weeks in agriculture during the previous year, migrant minors, 16 years old and under who do hand harvest piecework paid at the same rate as their parents on the same farm, and workers primarily engaged in the range production of livestock.

Accurate records are required by the Department of Labor for employers currently under the

minimum wage and those who could reasonably expect to be under the minimum wage in the future. Additional information and specific interpretation of the law are available from the Regional Director, Wage and Hour Public Contracts Division, U. S. Department of Labor, 411 N. Akard, Dallas, Texas, advises Mallett.

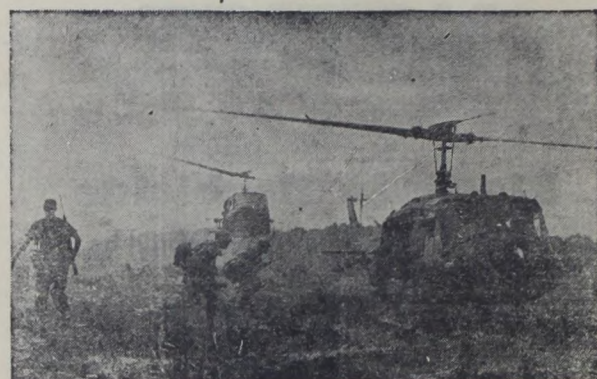
