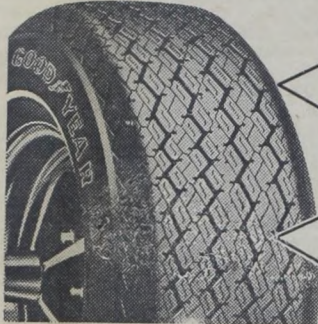

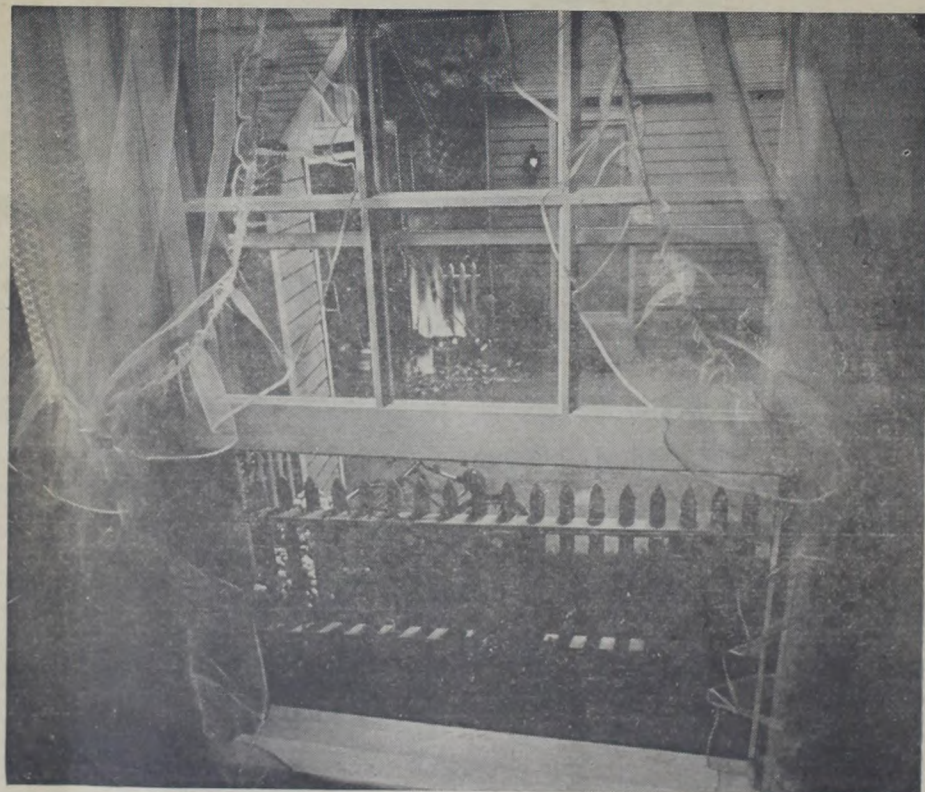

TURKEY SIXTH GRADER WINS HALL COUNTY SPELLING BEE

The Hall County Spelling Bee held in Memphis Junior High on March 30 named Jeff Crump, Sixth

Grader of Valley (Turkey-Quitaque School) the county champion. Jeff is the son of Mrs. Jacquelyn Crump, Turkey, Texas, teacher in the Valley School and formerly

Hall County visiting teacher. Jeff has been entering the County Bee for the last three years and this year hit "pay dirt." He was awarded a pen by the Amarillo Globe News and a gold fountain pen by the Hall County Society of Crippled Children. Mr. Ed Hutcherson is president and Marvin Duren is secretary - treasurer of the local chapter. Lester Campbell of Campbell Insurance Agency was the pronouncer of the words in the junior and senior bee. Mrs. Linda Estes and Mrs. L. A. Stillwell, former teachers in the Memphis School System, were the judges for the bee. Jon Etta Peery, Valley (Turkey - Quitaque School), another sixth grader, won second in the senior bee.

In the junior spelling bee Little Miss Jayne Eudy, age 10, grade 4 in the Valley School, won the bee. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jay Eudy, both teachers in the Valley School. Another youngster, Angela Eudy, age 9, grade 3, was runner-up in the junior bee. She also attends Valley School and is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ronnie Eudy of Turkey.

Jeff Crump will be one of the 46 area finalists in the 1973 silver anniversary spelling bee to be held in Amarillo April 23, 1973 at Stephen F. Austin Junior High at 1:30 p.m. The Amarillo Globe-News and West Texas State University, co-sponsors, will host the spelling bee champions and the junior bee champions at a lunch-

eon at the Amarillo Country Club beginning at 11:00 a.m. Busses will be available to transport all participants from the club to the school. Down front in the center section at the school auditorium, seats will be reserved for the junior champions. At intermission time in the spelling bee the juniors will be presented their silver lapel pins and trophies.

Jeff will be trying to become the 25th regional champion. Jana Davis, Memphis, won the regional spelling bee at Amarillo in 1972. She did not enter the county contest this year. CATES URGES STATE NOT TO PUT FEDERAL MONEY INTO PERMANENT PROGRAMS

State Rep. Phil Cates wants the State to go slow in putting any federal revenue sharing funds into supporting permanent state programs.

Rep. Cates is co-sponsoring a House concurrent resolution which points out that the State Comptroller estimates federal revenue sharing to total \$316.2 million for the two years starting Sept. 1, 1973, but only \$148 million for the following two years.

"Therefore, if we place excessive trust in the future of revenue sharing we will be shocked at a future date by the magnitude of state funding needed to replace the dwindling, or non-existent federal revenue sharing funds to the maximum extent for non-recurring items, so that they will not be woven into the permanent pattern of state budgeting.

Cates concluded that the state should recommend no permanent programs to become dependent on federal dollars which cannot be counted on in the future.

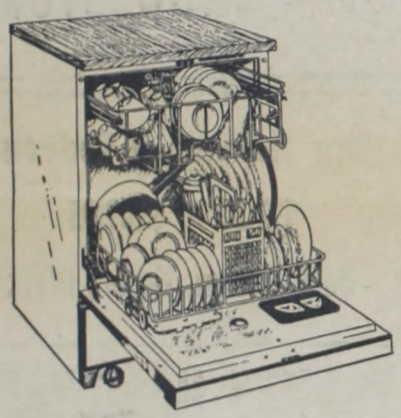
