

State Rep. Phil Cates wants the federal revenue sharing funds into

Rep. Cates is co-sponsoring a House concurrent resolution which points out that the State Comp troller estimates federal revenue sharing to total \$316.2 million for the two years starting Sept. 1, 1973, but only \$148 million for the following two years.

"Therefore, if we place excessive trust in the future of revenue

sharing we will be shocked at a future date by the magnitude of state funding needed to replace the dwindling, or non-existant fed-eral revenue sharing funds to the maximum extent for non-recur-ring items, so that they will not be woven into the permanent pat-tern of state budgeting. Cates concluded that the state

should recommend no permanent programs to become dependent on federal dollars which cannot be counted on in the future.
