He went on to say, "We have had numerous complaints that this person is in the Turkey and Quitaque area and has been running various con-games on

Farley went on to say, "This con artist may tell you he can treat your trees for bugs. He will then return wanting more money, for work that he supposedly did while you were gone.

If anyone comes to your home wanting to do work in your yard or house make them give you their company name and phone number. If they tell you they are related to someone you know, call that person and ask them to be sure. Check it out thoroughly before you commit to letting the person do the work for you.

There have also been other reports that this con artist has been telling his victims that he has a truck load of VCR's, TV's or other merchandise but that his truck ran out of gas just outside of town. He will then ask you for money to buy gas and promise he will come back and give you a new VCR or TV for your help. Don't be taken in, once this con artist gets your money he will never be back. Tell him the local Sheriff's Department will be glad to help him and offer to make the

Remember, if anyone you do not know comes to your door trying to sell you something or wants money from you, for any reason, tell them no and call the Sheriff's office immediately at 806-259-2151. Remember if it sounds to good to be true, it probably is.

#### Honoring Those Who Served A Salute To Local WWII Veterans



Charles H. Hamner entered the U.S. Armed Forces on May 4, 1943 at Lubbock, Texas. He served with the 1250th Detachment, Military Police Company (AVN) as an Antiaircraft Gun-

Charles took an Air Crew Training Course and was also qualified as an Expert Rifleman in January 1944

He served in the overseas Theatres of Operation in Normandy, Northern France,

and Central Europe. Charles received the EAME Campaign Medal with 3 Bronze Stars; a Good Conduct Medal, a Victory Ribbon, and 3 Overseas Service Bars.

He was discharged from the Armed Forces on January 13, 1946 at Fort Sam Houston,



#### Major Willis B. Garner

Willis B. Garner entered the Armed Forces on November 5, 1942, at Ft. Polk, Louisiana. He was commissioned a 1st Lieutenant and was deployed from Ft. Polk on December 18, 1942, to the China, Burma, and India Theatres of Operation. He served under the direct com mand of General Joseph

Willis served in the Corps of Engineers supervising the building and maintenance of supply lines including the Stilwell Road, formerly known as the Ledo and Burma Roads. He rose to the rank of Major and was awarded numerous citations including the Bronze Star and the Asiatic-Pacific Theatre Ribbon.

He was discharged from the Armed Forces on February 24, 1945, at Ft. Bliss, Texas.





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

RMA Revises Rules For Non-Emerged Seed Lubbock based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. learned Friday, June 21 that USDA's Risk Management Agency had announced changes to new

rules deferring appraisals at least 15 days beyond the applicable late planting period in cases where spring-seed crops fail to emerge due to

drought conditions.

PCG worked closely with officials at RMA, the House Agriculture Committee and Texas Cooperative Extension and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station to provide RMA decision makers with the data

illustrating the need to revise the rules for non-emerged crops.

PCG would like to thank Dr. Randy Boman and Dr. John Gannaway
for their efforts to find and evaluate data requested by RMA during this

The announcement changes the current rule that says appraisals on spring seeded crops which fail to emerge due to insufficient soil moisture must be deferred for at least 15 days after the end of the applicable late

The revised rule reduces the deferral time to at least 5 days after the The revised rule reduces the deferral time to at least 5 days after the end of the applicable late planting period. Additional time may be added to the 5 day deferral period if the insurance provider believes a situation exists that necessitates a longer deferral period.

The announcement, published in FCIC Bulletin MGR-02-011, applies

only to Texas cotton acreage in counties with June 10 or earlier final

The bottom line for High Plains cotton growers is that in counties with final planting dates of June 5 or earlier a deferred appraisal will be allowed on cotton acreage with non-emerged seed beginning June 26, 2002. For counties with June 10 final planting dates deferred appraisals will be

#### 2001 Crop Production Numbers Finalized

The final tallies are complete and the numbers offer a vivid example of the areas potential as well as how quickly that potential can disappear according to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

Officially the High Plains produced 2,492,700 bales in 2001 from 2,421,100 harvested acres.

Total planting in the region were 3,681,800 with abandonment totaling 1,260,700 acres or 34 percent.

The 2001 crop marked the second straight year in which more than 1 million acres of cotton were lost prior to harvest.

All cotton yields ranged from a high of 1,009 pounds per acre in Parmer

County down to a slim 152 pounds per harvested acre average yield in

Howard county.

Compared to 2000, the High Plains averaged 104 pounds more lint per harvested acre with a weighted average yield of 494 pounds per harvested acre. Irrigated cotton production averaged a respectable 622 pounds across the board, 146 pounds more than the 2000 weighted average yield. Dryland yields improved slightly to 212 pounds per harvested acre,

30 pounds better than in 2000.

**Texas Country Cleanups** 

The members of the Small Business and Environmental Assistance The members of the Small Business and Environmental Assistance Division of the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC) would like to inform you of the Texas Country Cleanups in Texas. Texas Country Cleanup will offer used oil, oil filter, lead acid battery and empty plastic pesticide container recycling.

Empty plastic pesticide containers must be clean, triple-rinsed or high-pressure rinsed to be accepted. No hazardous waste will be accepted. Oil filters will not be accepted from oil change businesses and they will limit participants to two barrels each. Tires will not be accepted.

The collection this year will begin at 8 a.m. and end at 12 noon. Local

New Sorghums Thrive Under Typical U.S. Day Length

New sorghums that flourish under long day-length conditions are cur rently being studied. These plants result from a large-scale genetic program being coordinated by USDA scientists. This program is evaluating the sorghum's photoperiod sensitivity, which is the cycle of light and darkness the plant receives each day. Since daylight increases during the growing season, only sorghum that is insensitive to day length will reach full maturity and produce harvestable seeds. Scientists determined that more than 4,000 different types of seeds should be selected because they are less sensitive to day length. Their seeds are sent to cooperating private companies so that additional seeds can be produced from these plants. Distribution of these seeds allows plant breeders to incorporate new genetic biodiversity into crops. It also provides growers with cultivars that have desirable genetic traits for various growing conditions.

Watermelon Shows Its Lycopene Stripes

Can watermelon combat cancer and heart disease? Studies show that the vegetable has even more health benefits than previously known. Ly copene is a naturally occurring antioxidant found in the red pulp of wa termelons. It is known to combat heart disease, cancer, and other health problems. USDA scientists have found that lycopene levels in watermelons are similar to those in raw tomatoes. Scientists test bioavailability which tells how well the body digests, uses, and stores the lycopene. Raw tomato has low bioavailability, but this increases through heat processing products such as tomato juices and sauces. But, watermelons don't need to be heat-treated to increase the available lycopene. In fact, some barbeque sauces and other products have been made with the watermelon concentrate or extract. So, watermelons are good for you and without sacrificing variety in your diet.

In the past, links between healthy life-style, and dietary habits have been linked to preventing heart disease. Texas A&M graduate student Laura Bancroft's research has shown similar links may prevent cancer Two major contributing factors connected to various types of cancer are cigarette smoke and nutrition. The type of source of dietary fat is important as well. Bancroft used rat models to perform tests. One group was fed corn oil as its fat source for two weeks, while the other was given fish oil. Both were given drinking water containing a chemical which increases oxidant generation in the intestines. The fish oil was found to reduce oxidative DNA damage in the intestine and promoted the deletion of cells with DNA damage in the colon. In short, deep, cold-water fish such as salmon and mackerel should be increased in the diet. V egetable oils such as corn oil, sunflower seeds, cotton seed and soybeans should be decreased. Both of those help in preventing colon cancer


