Valley Rolls To Third Zone Title; **Plays For District Tonight**

The Valley Patriots rolled to their third consecutive Zone Championship here last Friday the previously unbeaten Motley County Matadors 48-14. The Patriots were ranked No. 2 in the state, according to the Harris Rating System, which ranked the Matadors No. 7. The Matadors dropped out of the top ten this

It has always been this reporter's wish to describe the Home-town Football Team with superlatives such as mighty, the greatest, super, awesome, and last Friday night, this Valley team fit all of these. The game, how-ever, started off on a bummer.

Motley County kicked off to the Patriots with McNary taking the kickoff and almost breaking it, finally stopped on the Matador 49. On the first play from scrimmage, McNary took a pitchout then tried a forward pass which was intercepted at mid-field and the Matadors were promptly in business. The Matadors, however, could not advance the ball and had to punt. The punt went straight up and only about 15 yards forward, and Valley was in

It took the Patriots 11 plays to cover 56 yards with Michael Dowd going the final five yards on a fourth down play. Dee Dowd then kicked the PAT and Valley led 7-0 with 5:34 left in the first

came late in the first period when quarterback Richey Fuston pitched to McNary who ran 10 yards for the touchdown. Dee Dowd again kicked the PAT, and the Patriots led 14-0.

Valley traveled 41 yards to score the third touchdown, with McNary going the final five yards. The extra point try was missed. With 2:40 left in the first half, the Patriots kicked off to the Matadors, then stopped them cold and took possession on their own 38 with 2:08 left to play. Ten plays later, Juice Williams drove in from one yard out as the half ended, and Dee Dowd kicked the extra point to make the score 27-0 at halftime.

Early in the third quarter, Val-ey fumbled the ball away to the Matadors at the Motley County 26 yard line. Then the Matadors completed a pass to the Valley 40 yard line, where Valley was assessed a 15-yard penalty, and the ball was placed at the Valley 29-yard line. IN MEMORY OF MRS. ROSE TURNER

The Valley Tribune received the Wayland Baptist College newspaper, "Footprints," for October and the following story about Mrs. Rose Turner was clip ped from it by your editors. Mrs. Turner, a wonderful lady, worked for the Tribune as Flomot cor-respondent when the newspaper first began.

"Mrs. Luther B. Turner (Rose V. Jones) EX '17, has a long association with Wayland. In a recent interview, she told of being at the ground breaking of Gates Hall when she was 10 years old. She started to the Wayland Academy in the third grade and went through the tenth grade. She attended classes in Matador Hall while Gates Hall was being built. Her family lived in Seth Ward. She sold the first yearbook (Tra-veler) ever sold on Wayland campus. Her father, Thornton Jones was one of the first trustees of Wayland. She told how Matador Hall was not completed until 1916 after the members at First Baptist Church, Matador, Texas, building, both inside and outside In the early years, Matador was the dormitory and classroom building. At one time the boys lived in the West second floor wing, in the West second floor wing, the girls in the East second floor wing, and the first floor was classroom space. The lobby served as the Assembly Hall and the Chapel. She told about an incident that created a lot of confusion before the third floor of Gates Hall was completed. After the player wire was put on ter the plaster wire was put on the walls and before the plaster could be put up, some of the boys caught several coyotes and penned them up in the wire oms. It took the workmen most of the day to get the coyotes so they could begin to plaster the walls. She also told of being at the ground breaking of McDon-Phone 423-1330 ald Hall, where she shoveled

three shovels of dirt. She said, "I thought I was about the biggest one there!" Rose also men-tioned that she taught a Sunday School class for a total of 55 years and was president of the WMU at Flomot Baptist Church in Flomot, Texas, for 35 years. Mrs. Turner died on August 27.'





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SOCIAL SECURITY

BRISCOE COUNTY JANICE ULMER

Remember my friend of last week's column?

He's the one who thinks Social Security is such a rip-off. He just knows he'll never get back what

he has put into the program.

He forgets about the financial protection his family had while his children were still dependent. Since he didn't die then or become disabled, he feels it had no real value for him.

Nor does he consider that he and/or his wife (who also works) might become eligible for disability benefits long before retire-

And there's no weight given to the fact that if he does reach re tirement age he can qualify for monthly payments as long as he lives, and for Medicare protection (an incalculable value) at

Just as importantly, he hasn't considered, either, what Social Security has done—and is doing

-for some other folks he loves.

For example, his father worked
only a short time under Social
Security before he retired in 1945. For the next 20 years, my friend's father and mother both received monthly payments from our program. The father died then, but the mother is still living, still getting that check every month, and has had thousands of dollars of hospital and doctor

bills paid by Medicare.

My friend has a sister with a chronic illness. She retired on disability in 1972 and has, since that time, received more than 100 monthly checks from Social

Security's disability program.

She, too, is covered by Medicare, and with her chronic prob-

lem has been hospitalized repeat-edly over the years.

And would you believe that another sister's husband was kil-led in an accident while their children were still quite young. His widow and children got checks from Social Security every month until the kids reached

age 18. One of them, a daughter, went on to college and remained eligible for monthly checks until she was 22.

How can you estimate Social Security's value to those related

families? It could be done, I'm sure, on a purely financial basis and, over all, they have got back far more than they and their employers have paid in FICA
