Plainview Man Found Dead Near Turkey

A Plainview man, Stanley Donahue Stanford, 29 was found dead under his car on highway 70 two miles east of Turkey at 8:45 a.m. Monday, June 10, 1991. Local reports are that Stanford was working on his car around 7:30 a.m. The Texas Highway Department stopped to assist. Mr. Stanford said he would have it fixed soon, so the highway department boys went on to work. He was later found by law enforcement officers. Justice of the Peace Byron Young ruled death from an apparent heart attack. The body was taken to Wood-Dunning Funeral Home in Plainview. An autopsy has been ordered.

Landfills Running Over Recycling Vital To America's Future

Concern over disposal of solid waste has increased tremendously in the past few years. America has always been known as the "Land of Plenty." Where there is plenty, there is plenty left over that must be discarded. America generates more trash than any other nation in the world. Eighty percent of this trash is placed in a landfill and buried; but the landfills are becoming full. America generates about 160 million tons of residential and commercial solid waste annually. This is almost double the amount produced in 1965. At the present rate, we will generate close to 200 million tons of solid waste each year by the year 2000. Landfills are manmade pits where solid waste is disposed of and covered daily with a layer of soil, then finally covered with top soil and seeded to prevent erosion. Even this has proven to be the least expensive way to dispose of solid waste, the problems created by landfills have proven to be expensive. These problems include: ground water pollution through percolation, surface water pollution by drainage, the creation and emission of explosive gases (methane) by decaying matter, and the promotion of disease carrying populations (rodents and flies). During the last 20 years, the number of landfills in the United States has dropped from 30,000 to 6,000. By 1995, 2400, of these 6000 landfills will be closed. Increased urbanization, rising cost of land, more stringent state and federal regulations, and the NIMBY (Not-In-My-Back-Yard) syndrome, have combined to make sites for landfills increasingly hard to find. Disposal of solid waste in the future will include a balanced approach consisting of waste reduction through return for deposit containers, bulk packaging, recycling, and composting; clean-air incinerators; and waste-to-energy plants.

A Stroll Down Memory Lane

Flomot, located in northwest Motley County, has its share of historical data when celebrating the centennial anniversary of Motley County. Lets take a stroll down memory lane in Flomot. The Flomot Post Office, taking its name from the first few letters of Floyd County and Motley county, was officially established in January 2, 1902. The town of Flomot began to settle rapidly. Men filed on tracts of land, built dugouts and brought their families to the new homesteads. Ebb Hewitt built the first house in Flomot in 1902. This landmark, which has been vacant for many years, was torn down in 1984. In the "roaring twenties," over forty families lived in Flomot and in 1991, fifteen families live within the city limits. Prior to the town of Flomot, William (Bill) Gilpin in 1892 had a store and short-lived post office and a school was built four miles west of where Flomot is located today. (Continued On Page 4)

LAWN AND GARDEN TIPS

Battling Elm Leaf Beetles

If you or your neighbors have problems with elm leaf beetles, it's time to let these pests know they are barking up the wrong tree.

This highly destructive beetle is found in nearly every area of the U.S. in which elm trees grow. During the spring, adults emerge from their winter resting places and fly to trees where they lay bright orange egg clusters on the underside of leaves. The eggs hatch into larvae that feed on the leaves as they mature. After becoming adults the beetles reinfest the host tree or another elm tree in the vicinity.

Adult elm leaf beetles are about 6 mm long, and have yellow bodies with a black stripe running along the margin of each wing and down the center of their back. Trees that are infested with the beetles often suffer heavy defoliation and may become more vulnerable to other insect pests and diseases.

• The average American discards about five pounds of trash each day. (1,250,000,000 pounds daily)

• The annual nationwide clean-up costs for litter exceed \$1,000,000,000 per year.

• Processing recycled aluminum uses only 4 percent of the energy to smelt virgin ore.

• Americans discard approximately 350 million gallons of motor oil annually. If this oil were recovered and refined, we would reduce petroleum imports by 25.5 million barrels of oil each year.

• About half of the nation's paper, 8 percent of the steel, 75 percent of the glass, 40 percent of the aluminum and 30 percent of the total plastics output are used and used solely to wrap and decorate consumer products. • Recycling a four-foot high stack of telephone directories saves a 35 foot ten-year-old tree.

• Americans recycle 25 percent of the paper and paperboard products they use. The United States uses approximately 17.5 million tons of this recycled paper annually and exports approximately 3.75 million tons. Recycled paper exported by the United States accounts for more than \$400,000,000 annually in trade to foreign countries.

In the sparsely populated community of Flomot today, it is hard to comprehend there was a booming real estate development during the 1920's and 1930's.

One of the buildings still standing in Flomot today, near the town section was the Leonard Crowell Mercantile Store built in 1911. The original building was much larger. Mr. Crowell sold dry goods, groceries, hardware, plumbing merchandise, lumber and stocked coffins. He had a soda fountain and the International dealership. This was a busy location for many years in Flomot.

Another building still standing, located east of the intersection in Flomot, was once a Hardware Store built by Jim Williams in 1924. He was a John Deere dealer. These buildings are now used for storing gin equipment and feed supplies.

The first building of worship in Flomot was the Methodist Church, erected in 1907. It too, is now vacant as the church had its final services, March 3, 1991.

Two churches in Flomot still have worship services. The members of the First Baptist Church organized August 1914. They built a church in 1917 on land donated by Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Clements. The first church services in the present building were held September 1, 1957. The Church of Christ was organized in 1925. The church building was built in 1928.

Ebb Hewitt had the first gin in Flomot, June 11, 1887. The Lee Gin is at this location today. Through the years, owners of gins at this site were G. T. Meese, H. S. "Putt" Gilbert, Joe Degan, J. N. Fletcher and the Coop Gin. There was a Campbell Gin and "Putt" Gilbert purchased this gin when the Campbell family moved in the '30's. Mr. Gilbert was operating two gins during the '30's. This gin building was lost in a fire.

Tom and Myra Spears moved their gin from Four Corners, east of Whiteflat, to Flomot in 1937. It had been a continuous business in Flomot. H. G. Hunter bought the gin in 1961 when Mr. and Mrs. Spears

PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION AUGUST 10, 1991

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 42 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the newly created county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation a percentage of the market value of the residence homestead of a married or unmarried adult. The percentage exempted could not exceed 20% of such market value, and the amount exempted could not be less than \$5,000. The amendment would also authorize county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation not less than \$3,000 of the market value of the residence homestead of a disabled person or a person sixty-five years of age or older. Finally, the amendment would authorize elections in county education districts for the taxation of certain tangible personal property exempted from ad valorem taxation by the legislature.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow the voters of a county education district to adopt certain exemptions from the district's ad valorem taxation for residence homesteads and to provide for the taxation of certain tangible personal property."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to pass general laws authorizing Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board or its successor to issue and sell up to \$300 million of general obligation bonds to finance educational loans to students. The maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by the bonds would be set by law. The amendment would also authorize the legislature to provide for the investment of bond proceeds and to establish an interest and sinking fund to pay the bonds and provide for the investment of such fund. Bonds authorized under this amendment would be paid from the first money coming into the treasury in each fiscal year that is not otherwise appropriated by the constitution, less any amount in an interest and sinking fund established at the end of the preceding year that is pledged to the payment of the bonds or interest.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds to provide educational loans to students."

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moved to Matador. Rex Johnson was the owner from 1973 to 1979. Linda and Donnie Turner made a business transaction for the gin in 1979 and are the present day managers of the Turner Gin.

The Community Center building in Flomot is the former school building. Club meetings, family reunions, luncheons, volleyball tournaments and the school homecomings are held here. In 1922, the old school building was torn down. When Roxie Turner accidentally fell off the stairway platform, plunging to the ground in 1921, it clinched the decision to replace the school. Volunteers tore down the building and a new school made an appearance in Flomot. Fairmont merged with Flomot Schools in 1935. The

White Star and Folley Schools consolidated with Flomot in 1939. A Flomot Golden Glove Tournament in 1939 drew over a 100 boaters from 36 schools! A school building of concrete tile was constructed in the growing settlement. John E. Simpson was postmaster, December 1914; Sam Tibbets December 1916 and Edward A. Madhead, November 1917.

The first teacher, a Mrs. Bridges, boarded with the Van Martin family for the winter term. In October 1893, Henry S. Bishop, a twenty year old teacher, earned \$25 a month and free board in a half-dugout with William J. Whitworth. School trustees were Whitworth and Wood Martin. Students attending were

Jerome, Alice, Oscar and Sid Bass; Sid and George Lesley; Hezlie, Bron and Claud Martin; Fleming and Minnie Tibb; Raymond, Estell and Willie Trimble; Lee and John Gilpin and Zula, Minnie and Avery Martin.

Mrs. Finis Bourland, nee Elma Garrison was the entire school faculty in 1906, teaching eight grades. She had forty students including Robert Martin, Luther, Lizzie and Tom Turner; Wade, Abe, Mary and Van Martin; Gabe Garrison and Susie Hudson. Other teachers were Mrs. S.A. Tibbets (1914-1934); Sam Tibbets (1914-1916, 1934); Mrs. Odie Crowell and Neva Groves (1914-1916).

The Cumberland Presbyterian Church members met along the banks of the Alamosa Creek under branches of a huge cottonwood tree in 1893. Wood M. Matting and Wade A. Martin were elected elders. In 1903, Cumberland Presbyterian members voted to join the North-west Texas Conference of the Methodist Church. October 7, 1907, four acres of land were deeded to the Methodist Church by I.E. and Katie Martin.

Gilpin was elected county judge in 1894, so the postal service was then transferred to the White Star community where Martha E. Pitts posted the mail. That service lasted until 1898 when the service was transferred to Whiteflat. Tradition states that the dugout of Nelson R. Welch at the foot of the Quitauque Peaks on Robert Creek, which was in Floyd County near the Motley County line, became the mail drop. The Welches moved into a new frame house in the new town of Flomot and operated the post office from there until January 1903.

In 1903, Ebb Hewitt opened a store, known as Hewitt Dry Goods, Groceries and Hardware. his wife, Carrie Hewitt dispensed the mail 1905. The Flomot Schools closed their doors permanently in 1974 and consolidated with the Motley County Schools.

The Post Office in Flomot was a benefiting factor in the establishment of the town of Flomot. Today, it is located east of the town intersection. Mrs. Ruth Lee contracted the Postal Service, August 1990. W. B. Gates was Flomot postmaster, 1919-1937; Wanda Grace Tanner, 1937-1946; Mrs. Bernice Bond, 1946-1982; and Leon Cloyd, 1983-1988.

Summer Season, Vacation Safety

The Summer season is rapidly approaching and now that school is out, most Texans will be planning for vacations. The Texas Department of Public Safety wants to remind us that thousands of tourists will be coming to Texas for their vacations, according to Major V. J. Cawthon, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

He stated, "With all of the additional traffic that will be on the streets and highways and the warmer weather this means additional traffic in and around the recreational areas, this will mean more alcohol consumption and of course more accidents."

Major Cawthon said, "With the use of a little courtesy and obeying those little traffic laws, large accidents can be avoided."

A person needs to have the family vehicle checked to make sure it is in good condition before they start out on vacation. Remember, to take at least a 15 minute break after every two hours of driving, avoid drinking alcoholic beverages and don't forget to buckle up the safety belt.

Major Cawthon emphasized the need to reduce our speed in the residential neighborhoods because of children, who are now out of school for the summer. Don't forget to use our safety helmet when riding a motorcycle, whether it's on public streets or private property.

Helping Mother Nature Control Grasshoppers

A biological agent to combat grasshoppers, popular with organic growers, is converting conventional farmers. Nosema Locustae, a tiny spore, starts a lethal infection which spreads, providing long-term control. It's this long-term effect that's attractive. Because the EPA no longer allows chemicals to persist after application, chemicals are now short-term control agents. Since grasshoppers can take six weeks to hatch, and they migrate, controlling them with modern chemicals may require expensive repeat treatments. Another attractive feature of Nosema is that it only kills grasshoppers and field crickets. It doesn't harm the 250 natural predators of grasshoppers which are important to long-term control.

Nosema Locustae is applied to young grasshoppers, since it works slower than chemicals. After infection, half die in two to three weeks and a high percentage of the remainder are infected. These only eat 1/4 as much, doing little damage.

Treating younger grasshoppers kills more, sooner, but you don't want them all to die-infected survivors are needed to spread the infection by newcomers cannibalizing them. Nosema users accept these lethargic, spore-burdened grasshoppers as part of the cost-effective, long-term control. Also, if any survive to adulthood, they lay few eggs and the egg pools contain Nosema which continues the infection the next year.

The USDA demonstrated Nosema Locustae effectiveness in 20 years of research, and has approved it for grasshopper control. Similar study by others in the US and elsewhere has confirmed USDA findings.
