## Valley Thinclads Win Coaches' Track Meet

For the second time in as many years the Valley boys track team has won the 6-man Coaches Association State track meet at Howard Payne University in Brownwood.

On April 6, the team of Jason Smith, Kirk Garner, Ron Brittan, and Bubba Clardy won the 400 meter sprint relay with a time of :45.36. Valley holds the state record set last year at Stephenville. The next race entered was the 110 meter high hurdles which Garner brought in the gold with a first place winning time of :15.8.

In the 100 m dash Bubba Clardy came in second with a photo-finish losing first place by only inches. His time was :11.27.

Garner won the 300m hurdles comfortable margin with a time of :39.7, better than his last year's second place time of :40.3, but slightly less than his best time this year of :39.1.

In one of the most exciting races of the meet -- the 200 m dash, Clardy edged out the field to bring in a gold medal first with a time of :23.0.

Clay Merrell had a personal best in the 1600 meters with a time of 5:01.6 to finish 4th, and also ran in the very hard 3200 meter race.

Angie Pointer placed 2nd in the girls 300 m hurdles which was exceptional since she has just started running this event. Her time was :51.30.

Vera Pinkerton did not place in the discus but had a fine throw of 86'7".

On Friday just a day before the state meet, the boys and girls both entered the Double Mountain Relays held at Aspermont. At this meet, Jason Smith won the long jump with a leap of 19'6 and 1/2". Hattie Williams won the girls 3200 m run with a time of 16:09.50, lapping the

## Quitaque Public Library Soon To Be A Reality

Caprock Public Library was established by ordinance on Monday night, April 1, 1991. An Advisory Board consisting of five members was appointed. Funding for operating expenses will be provided by the City of Quitaque, Briscoe County and Valley School.

Caprock Public Library will be operating under the Texas Panhandle Library System

(TPLS). TPLS requirements include being open a minimum of 20 hours a week, employing a head librarian for not less than 20 hours a week and maintaining a minimum of 7500 volumes. The library will be given three years to reach the required volumes.

Caprock Public Library will be located in the vacated City Hall Building. Floor plans are presently being drawn up by the coordinator of TPLS in Amarillo. Plans are being discussed and fund-raisers to help reach these goals are being planned.

Contact has been made with the Amarillo Area Foundation for grant money to help aid a public library. Because of a July 31, 1991 grant deadline, local support is urgently needed. The Library Committee met Tuesday, 9, to appoint committees and discuss major future fund raisers. Now is the time to begin looking through your current collection for books to be donated to Caprock Public Library. A book collection will be held at a later date.

The Library Committee meets the second Tuesday of each month at 5:00 p.m. in the Community Center. Anyone interested in this endeavor is encouraged to attend.

**Clara M. Daniel**

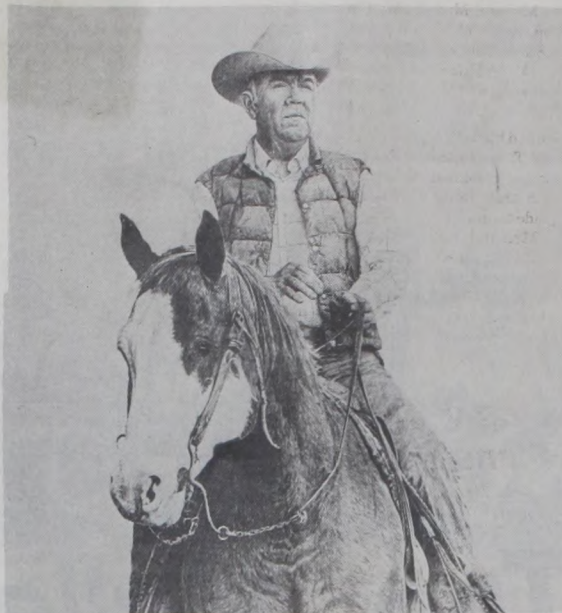

At 47 Bennett has tried many types of work, truck driver, rodeo, ranch hand in three different states, 4-H Extension Agent in Oklahoma, truck driver, farm hand, pesticide applicator, and a commissioned officer of the U.S. Army.

Bennett explains that he feels that his varied life style has brought him to where he is today, an artist who portrays the cowboy as he is at home on the range or on the back of a bronc or going about his many daily duties.

## Be Aware: Tornado Season

Although tornadoes, severe thunderstorms and floods can strike virtually any part of Texas at any time, spring seems to bring an increase in violent weather.

You can take precautions to assist yourself and your family in the event of a tornado.

Periodically hold a tornado drill so that family members know what to do and where to go if the national weather service issues a tornado warning. The safest part of a house during a tornado traditionally is the basement, but be aware of the potential for flooding if there is heavy rain in the area. Interior bathrooms, hallways and closets on the ground floor also offer protection from tornado winds. Avoid windows and outside walls. Take along blankets or sleeping bags to protect yourself from falling debris and shattering glass, which are frequently cause of death and injury during a tornado.

Make certain you have a portable radio and several flashlights (and fresh batteries for both) as well as bottled water, extra prescription medications and a first aid kit in your shelter area.

Remember, if a tornado strikes, electricity, gas, water and sewer service may be disrupted for several days.

Mobil homes and automobiles are dangerous places to be during a tornado. If you live in a mobile home, make sure all family members know where the nearest substantial shelter is. If you are in your mobile home or car and can't get to a better shelter: go outside, lie down in the nearest ravine, ditch or culvert and cover your head with your hands. Be aware of the possibility of flooding in low-lying areas. Do not hide under your mobile home or car because both can easily be picked up and carried away by a tornado.

Your local (city or county) emergency management office can provide you with additional information on severe weather precautions. The Governor's Division of Emergency Management, the National Weather Service, the Texas Insurance Advisory Association and the Federal Emergency Management Agency are sources of information and publications.

## Brush Management Symposium Slated

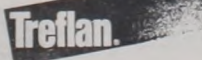

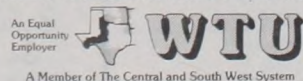
