## Texas Department of Public Safety Issues Safety Warning

The Labor Day holiday will be the last holiday of the summer. While the motorists of Texas are making their plans for the holiday, the Texas Department of Public Safety is also making plans for Labor Day.

Major Vernon Cawthon, Regional Commander of the

Texas Department of Public Safety in Lubbock, stated, "The Labor Day weekend will run from 6:00 p.m., Friday, September 2nd until 11:59 p.m., Monday, September 5th. During that time all available Department of Public Safety troopers will be on duty. These troopers have

been instructed to be on the alert and direct their enforcement efforts toward those violators causing the most accidents -- speeders and those who drive while drinking. Troopers are also aware that traffic deaths are sharply higher at night. There are more fatal accidents at night than daytime even though there are fewer vehicles on the road at night."

For all you mesquite lovers/haters out there: The annual meeting of Los Amigos Del Mesquite will take place in Corpus Christi September 11-13 at the Hershey Hotel.

The organization is an international association of 300-plus ranchers, woodworkers, businessmen and scientists who have personal or business interests in the mesquite tree. Utilization of the wood for various products, managing mesquite lands for wood production and grazing purposes, and controlling mesquite on rangeland are some of the topics to be discussed. Technical presentations and demonstrations are also on the agenda. In addition, a trade and exhibit show of fine furniture, flooring, other beautiful woodwork and various mesquite products will take place.

Historically, the presence of mesquite on rangeland has been considered detrimental. Cost of mesquite clearing is high. Through utilization of the tree, a negative factor can be changed into an asset. The Corpus meeting will provide ranchers and landowners who have mesquite wood to sell an opportunity to meet with processors who are buying mesquite stumpage. It will provide the avenues for future sales.

The driver of the car was uninjured.

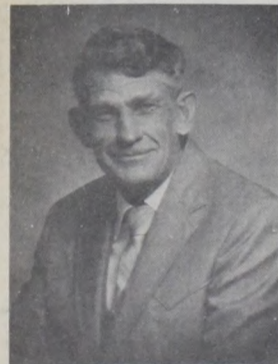
## Fleming Announces Sheriff Candidacy

Let's prevent tragedies, not have to mourn them.

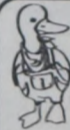

# Lines from Lynda

**'After-School Child Care'**  
At the end of the school day does your child walk home by himself and unlock the door to an empty house? Some 6 million children in the United States ages 6 to 14 do this each day. They are usually called "latchkey" children.

We have a number of families in the county where both parents work outside the home and children must be at home by themselves for at least a short portion of the day.

There is a current controversy in this country about the benefits or harm for youngsters who care for themselves after school. Some parents and professionals maintain that these children learn independence and important self-care skills. Others claim that self-care puts children at physical and psychological risk for having to take on adult responsibilities too soon.

Research shows both of these positions are probably true, depending upon several factors—location, child's age, and the degree of indirect supervision.

There is a clear consensus that children under age six should not be in self-care, just as there is general agreement that teenagers can be left alone. The age at which a child can be left alone is an individual decision for parents based on the level of maturity and sense of responsibility of each child.

Whether your child comes home by himself every day after school or whether he/she is seldom left alone, there are some basic guidelines for preparing your child to stay home without supervision.

Make sure you have talked with your child about handling emergencies. Children should know how to reach the local fire and ambulance service. They should have a fire extinguisher in the home and know how to use it.

Teach children about safety in food preparation if they are to prepare snacks or use electrical appliances. Prepare a first-aid kit for them and help them learn how to treat minor cuts, burns or scrapes.

Teach your child about answering the telephone and the door. Practice with him/her what to say so he will not let callers know they are home alone.

Give your child some responsibilities when they get home so they will not spend the entire time watching television or eating snacks. You may be able to expect some homework to be done by the time you get home. They can leave assignments they need help with until you arrive home.

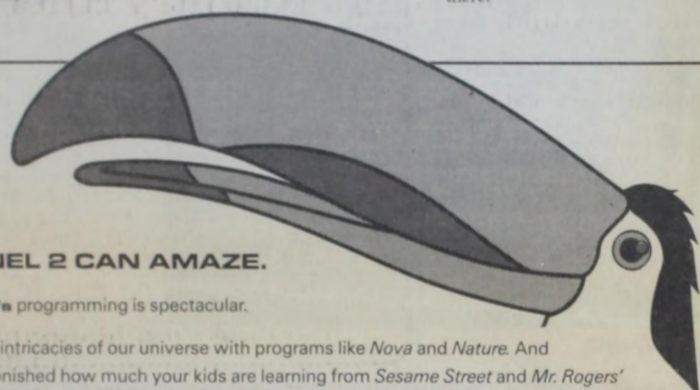

The class is a basic construction course appropriate for those with limited sewing experience. It is designed to assist families with developing clothing construction skills in order to help with the family clothing budget.

Six to eight meeting times are planned in order to complete a garment. Participants may make a garment of their choice which is appropriate to their level of sewing skills.

There is no cost for the class except for fabric and supplies. Participants do not need to have fabric and supplies by the first meeting since this meeting will cover necessary information pertaining to pattern and fabric selection and fitting.

The class is limited to 10 in order that each individual will have adequate personal assistance. Meeting dates will be determined by the participants at the first class.

Those interested in enrolling in this class are asked to contact the County Extension Office at 823-2131, Ext. 12. Participants must pre-register so the class limit can be maintained.
