CSWC Windbreak Tree Program Beginning Now

The Caprock Soil and Water Conservation District is taking orders for windbreak trees through March 1, 1988. Several evergreen tree species and various hardwood trees and shrubs are available

for purchase. Prices will vary from 50 cents to \$1.50 per bare-root tree, depending on species.

Windbreaks properly located and containing the right tree species, will provide wind and snow protection for farm

homesteads as well as livestock. One source stated that homestead windbreaks in the High Plains and Rolling Plains showed reduced heating costs as great as 15 percent.

Living windbreaks, or greenbelts, also provide nesting places for small insect-eating birds as well as food and cover for numerous High Plains game birds. Windbreaks for shelter or wildlife habitat are permitted under CRP contracts.

Advanced planning is very important for the successful establishment or renovation of shelterbelts. The installation of a drip irrigation system for windbreak establishment is highly recommended. We want to help make your tree planting a success. Technical assistance is available from the USDA Soil Conservation Service in planning and designing your windbreak, drip irrigation system, and windbreak management. Drip irrigation systems and information on installation is available through the Caprock Soil and Water Conservation District.

A limited number of wildlife seeding packets for quail/pheasant, deer, turkey and squirrel are also available for farmstead plantings.

Does Cotton Classing Need An Overhaul?

The USDA cotton classification system needs to be re-evaluated, said Dr. James Parker, director of Texas Tech University's Textile Research Center in Lubbock.

Dr. Parker believes cotton farmers unfairly take a price discount for a finefiber cotton that is in considerable demand for cotton-spinning companies.

But J. U. Dedear, area director of the USDA Cotton Classing Office in Waco,

believes prices farmers receive for cotton depend more on buyers than on cotton grades.

Dr. Parker said farmers take a discount on any cotton finer than 3.5 micronaire, a measure of fiber thickness.

As an example, he referred

to cotton classed as strict low middling light spotted, or 3.2 micronaire of fineness. This type of cotton is commonly produced in West Texas and is in considerable demand by spinners, especially those using new open-end spinning machines which require finer fibers for production of high-quality yarns, Dr. Parker said.

Mr. Dedear said about 85 percent of the cotton tested in Waco fell within the 3.5 percent to 4.9 percent micronaire range that is not discounted.

The office's top cotton-producing areas include the Brazos River bottom lands, Williamson county and the irrigated land of Batesville near Uvalde.

"If that cotton would not be discounted, that cotton wouldn't be in demand," Mr. Dedear said.

The cotton quality standards are reviewed during the Universal Standard Conference in Memphis, Tennessee, annually, Mr. Dedear said.

The USDA does not have a vote, but does make recommendations.

"It's very difficult to change a grade," Mr. Dedear said, "It has to be approved at a conference...Firms may want to do away with higher grades and producers may want to do away with lower grades."

Dr. Parker said that in a report from the spinners committee of the International Textile Manufacturers Federation, the committee recognized the need for a change in emphasis in cotton development from coarser to finer fibers, while maintaining finer maturity and strength.

earlier because it was considered inferior based on earlier spinning systems is now ideal for the high-tech machines, which are more rapid, easier to operate and require less labor," Mr. Parker said.

The farmers need price incentives based on a new classing system to produce the type of cotton that is in demand, he said.

The Textile Research Center is the most extensive non-corporate textile research facility in the country and does research for organizations such as Du-Pont, Continental Airlines, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration and numerous textile companies, he said.

Mr. Dedear estimated that the Waco cotton classing office would test 275,000 samples from cotton bales this year representing an area stretching to Uvalde in the west to Brazoria County on the Gulf Coast and north to McKinney.

"I anticipate more next year after talking to producers who were disappointed with grain," he said.

The office is at the peak of its testing season and had received more than 100,000 samples by last week, with an average of 8,000 samples daily. About 30 extra employees are hired during September and October to help test the recently harvested cotton for grade, color, staple length, uniformity of fiber and strength.

The USDA combined the Austin and Dallas cotton classing offices to form the Waco office four years ago, Mr. Dedear said. The Waco office covers the largest area in Texas, but not the largest volume.

The Altus, Oklahoma, office also tests some cotton from North Texas.

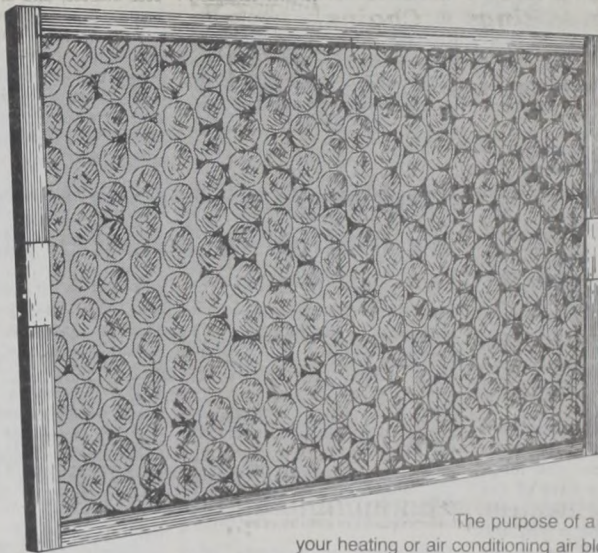

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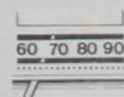

A clean filter, along with other conservation measures you can do at home, will help you save energy and money!

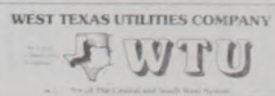
Set Thermostat at 68°

The Hall County Commissioners Court met Tuesday, Nov. 10, in regular November session, and among items of business handled was the canvassing of the election results of the amendment election.

Election returns were found to be in order by the Commissioners and the County Clerk was ordered to certify the returns and mail them to the Secretary of State.

Commissioners accepted the reports and approved the minutes of the October meeting.

An order was passed by the Court to renew the County Law enforcement Liability Insurance with National Casualty Co. for \$1 million coverage.

The Board voted to table the appointment of a Mental Health and Mental Retardation board member at the November meeting.

The Court accepted the architectural final plans for the Hall County Courthouse elevator as presented and await the approval of the Texas Historical Commission and General Services.

It was the unanimous order of the court to approve the General Telephone Company of the Southwest Notice of Proposed installation of facilities in Hall County, Texas, the exception that at the expense of the General Telephone Company the cable be buried in the center of the County Roads and maintained by the Telephone Company, location Turkey, Texas. Copies of ROW easements are filed in County Clerk's office.

Commissioners voted on nominees for the Hall County Tax Appraisal Board. When all the votes from the various taxing entities are counted, elected members of the Appraisal Board will be announced.

The Nuevo Study Club met Nov. 12th in the home of Mrs. Lurline Walker.

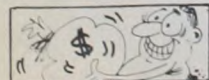
Mrs. Patterson, president, called the meeting to order. Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. Treasurer report showed a balance of \$323.54.

The Turkey Volunteer Fire Department will sponsor Toys For Christmas this holiday season. This has been a very successful project the past several years.

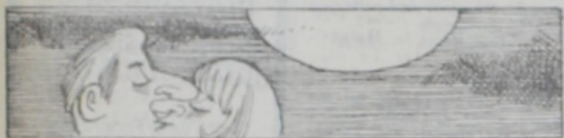
Each Christmas Santa has delivered a bag of candy, nuts, fruit and usually a toy to approximately 100 children.
