Quitaque Chamber Sets Bass Tourney

The Quitaque Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring their second bass tournament of the year at Lake Theo in Caprock Canyons State Park on Saturday, June 6, 1987. Entries must be paid by Thursday June 4. All entrants must sign in at the boat ramp before starting, starting time being 6:30 a.m. Mandatory weigh-ins will be at 9:00, 12:00 and 4:30. The lunch break will be from 12:00 to 1:00.

Other rules are; any size boat is permissible, only one pole at a time using artificial bait only, no trolling is allowed. Only live bass at least 12 inches long will be weighed and no more than five fish.

Five places will be paid with first place paying \$200.00 (heaviest individual stringer).

This is the second of five tournaments to be held this year. June 27, will be the next tournament date followed by July 25th, and August 22, plus an invitational

tournament on September 19th.

To qualify for the invitational, you must have fished four out of five tournaments or be one of the top total weights for the previous five tournaments.

Cemetery Fence Committee Tries To Secure More Land

A called meeting of the Sesquicentennial Cemetery Fence committee and the Cemetery officials met in a joint meeting Monday afternoon at 4 p.m. at the Senior Citizens Room at the Bob Wills Center to coordinate information and make plans for beginning the building of the Dreamland Cemetery fence.

The hold up had been trying to secure more land for the east side of the cemetery. This part of the cemetery is across Farm to Market Road. The Cemetery committee has been trying to get title and arrange to purchase more land on the north side of the east part of the Cemetery which has been agreed on by the owner, Foxall and Deaver of Memphis, but they requested that they cannot have possession of the land until this fall's crop is harvested.

Physician Advises Action To Take After Snakebite

The number of individuals bitten by poisonous snakes in the U.S. is estimated to be about 8,000 per year, with a relatively large number occurring in Texas. Factors affecting severity of snake bite are:

(1) the age, size, and health of the patient. Envenomation in children is serious since a relatively large dose of poison is injected into a small victim.

(2) location of bite extremities are less dangerous than those of the trunk, face or directly into a blood vessel. A direct strike is

more dangerous than a scratch. Even a thin layer of clothing may afford great protection.

(3) size of the snake, the extent of its anger, and the condition of the fangs, and venom glands are important.

(4) the presence of various bacteria in the mouth of the snake which can cause infection at the site, and

(5) exercise or exertion such as running after the bite. This speeds systemic absorption of toxin.

If bitten, identify the snake. Then determine if envenomation has occurred. Venom may not necessarily have been injected with the bite. With rattlesnake bites, pain, swelling, and ecchymosis occurring

immediately after the bite or systemic symptoms such as perioral tingling, facial fasciculations, nausea, or hypotension, occurring within 15 - 30 minutes indicate a severe bite with envenomation.

The best management is to transport the patient to the nearest hospital. Do not use a tourniquet, do not apply ice; do not incise or apply suction to the wound. These are skills that should be carried out only by medical personnel.

Do keep the bitten part immobilized at the level of the heart and avoid exertion. Both the Turkey and Quitaque Ambulances have antivenom toxin in the ambulances for use if necessary while transporting the patient.

"Fifty Years Ago"

Back in the 1920's and 30's the Turkey Fireboys had to pay dues each month in order to be a member of the Fire Department, and if a Fireman missed paying his dues for four months he would be dismissed from the Department, he could also be dismissed for saying cuss words during the regular meetings, but not without a fair trial. One fireboy would act as defense lawyer and another as prosecutor. He would usually get a warning and not a dismissal. During those years most of the firemen worked within three or four city blocks of the fire station and would run up through the alleys to the station. The first one there would drive the trucks and the second one would turn the siren. The ones that came in cars would always be the last one there.

Once a year one of two firemen would attend the short course down at A&M University and as many as four or five would go to the conventions.

There were two passenger trains through Turkey each day. The Fort Worth and Denver Railroad Company would give each fireboy a round trip free pass. And the City of Turkey would pay the other expenses.

Sanderson, Ft. Stockton and Pecos are also on the trail. Mrs. Robertson used to live at Pecos and gave some other interesting facts about that region where cantaloupe is grown, and sometimes four bales of cotton to the acre, under irrigation.
