Friday, March 15, 1991, began as any other day for Mr. Kinley V. Wynn of Turkey. After visiting friends at the local coffee shop, he went to the Post Office to get his daily mail. An ordinary day, for an ordinary man? Not hardly, on either account!

Mr. Wynn, after 46 years, received the distinguished Bronze Star Medal for his patriot duty while serving in the United States Army, during World War II. He entered his call of duty on February 6, 1942, and served 3 years, 3 months, and 26 days, with Company K 19th Infantry

Cited on his Honorable Discharge, he was decorated with Asiatic Pacific Campaign, two (2) Bronze Stars; Philippine Liberation, two (2) Bronze Stars, and the Good Conduct Medal. The belated (5th)


