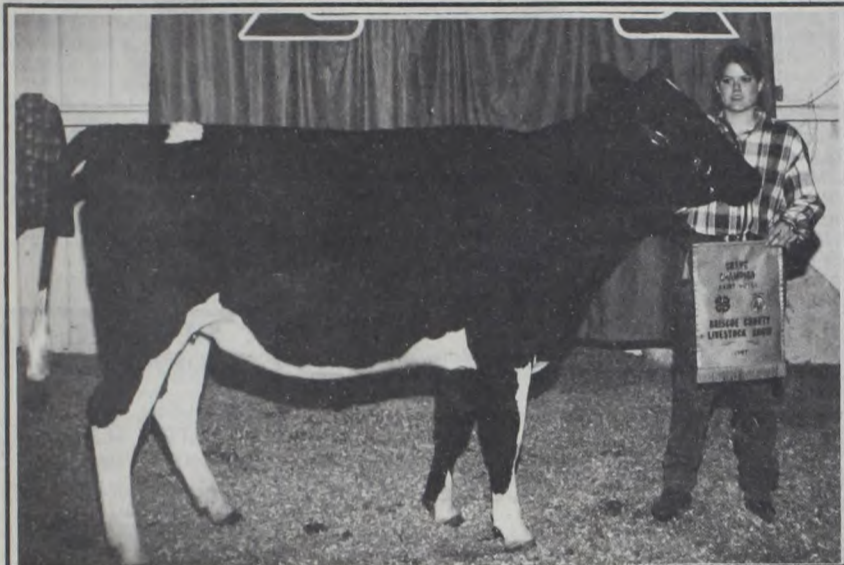

Briscoe County Holds Junior Livestock Show At Vance Price Memorial Center

The Briscoe County Livestock Show was held at the Vance Price Memorial Center on January 23-25, 1997. The 1997 show included 13 steer, 6 dairy heifer, 11 beef heifer, 11 lamb, 78 prospect hog and 96 market hog entries, that were exhibited by Valley FFA, Silvertown FFA and Briscoe County 4-H members from the Valley and Silvertown Schools. The show day ended with a premium sale that totaled

over \$45,230. With products, additions and premiums the grand total was \$50,000.

Judge Danny Preston of Tahoka named Zack Burson's Hamp Hog Grand Champion of the Prospect show. Zack Ramsey's 165 pound York Hog was named Reserve Grand Champion of the Prospect Show.

Zack Ramsey's 243 pound Duroc Hog which was named Breed Champion Duroc, was

selected as Grand champion of the Market Hog Show. Judge Danny Preston named Jenny Young's Cross Hog as Reserve Grand Champion of the market show.

Brandi Price's Bred Holstein Heifer was named Grand Champion of the 1997 Dairy Heifer Show. Brandi Price's Open Heifer was named Reserve Grand Heifer of the show.

Kenda Wood's Charolais Beef Heifer was named Grand Champion among the entries in the Beef Heifer Show. Jarret Pigg's Shorthorn Beef Heifer was named Reserve Grand Champion of the show. The judge for the Beef Heifer show as Sam Jackson of Texas Tech University.

B.J. Price's lamb was named Grand Champion of the Lamb Show. Tara Smith's lamb was named Reserve Grand Champion of the show.

Leland Wood's European Steer was named Grand Champion in the Steer Show. Monty Wood's European Steer was named Reserve Grand Champion of the show.

Bi-County Grain Sorghum and Corn Meeting In Turkey

Hall and Briscoe County Extension Offices will host a Grain Sorghum and Corn meeting in Turkey, Texas on Thursday, February 6th starting at 9 a.m. through noon at the Bob Wills Memorial Center. This meeting was developed and organized due to producer comments at the Tri-County Peanut Tour held annually in September.

Many producers are looking for ways to rotate production on peanut and cotton ground and milo or corn could be the answer. We will discuss fertility, water requirements, seed varieties, planting dates and weed control for milo and corn production. We will also discuss the new Crop Insurance options that should be available for cotton producers in our area. We will offer three CEU's for producers with private, non-commercial and commercial applicator licenses. Carson Insurance will host the noon meal and we look forward to your attendance.

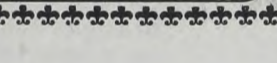

The Varsity has an overall record of 18-7. In District play Valley finished the first half in 2nd place with a 3-1 record. They are currently 1-0 in the second half.

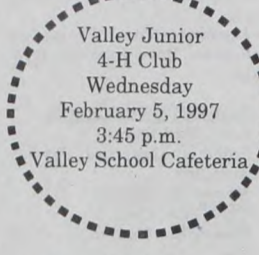
JV Basketball Results

Youth Sports Injuries

Sports may be hazardous to the health of our youth.

"Of the 30 million young people involved in organized sports, 10 percent of them will suffer a sports-related injury," said Dr. Albert Hergenroeder, head of adolescent and sports medicine at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

According to Hergenroeder, many new injuries occur as a result of past injuries that are not detected or properly rehabilitated. Athletes often suffer loss of strength, flexibility and endurance as a result of injuries that are ignored and not treated.

"The best way to prevent injuries is to rehabilitate old injuries," he said. "In addition, watch for the 'stars'. An athlete who is successful at a high level is more likely to return to competition before he is fully recovered."

Sports with the highest number of injuries include football, softball, gymnastics and girls' cross country running.

"Winterizing" For Exercise

'Tis the season to bundle up if you are headed outside to exercise.

"People can continue outdoor exercise during the winter months if they take precautions," said David Brennan, an exercise physiologist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

While outdoor exercisers in moderately warm climates may have to make only minor adjustments, people working out in cold-weather states need to make equipment and clothing changes to avoid hypothermia and falls on slippery terrain.

Brennan suggests the following: Dress in layers of clothing, using long-sleeved T-shirts and jackets. As your body warms up, you can shed a layer or two and still be comfortable.

Cover your head and ears. Heat easily escapes through the head if the head is not covered.

Wear athletic shoes with a jagged tread to get better traction on snow-covered roads and trails.

Drink plenty of water. Even in cold weather, the body can lose a lot of fluid through sweat.
