Funeral services for Bill Bogan, 24, of Lake Tanglewood, a former star athlete at Amavillo Tascosa High School, last year, were held at 2 p. m. Tuesday at Paramount Terrace Christian Church.

The former basketball and base, ball star died at 10.30 a. m. Sunday in High Plains Baptist Health as a result of complications from an injury he suffered Dec. 5 in a motocovele accident near the Canadian River breaks. The art world, given to talking of an artist's credits, usually steps aside out of respect when a man of impeccable background and ab-ility appears on the scene. Such a new face in the Panhandle art world is 62-year-old Otho Stubbs. for the past 60 years a resident of Turkey, Texas, where he farms his

for the past 60 years a resident of Turkey, Texas, where he farms his own land and paints the West he has known with color reality and flavor that draws rave attention.

Stubbs was born in Cranfill's Gan, Bosque County, Texas, of parents from Georgia and Mississippi. He is a direct descendant of George Stubbs, the famous English horse painter of the 17th Century. His parents moved to Turkey when he was two years old. He graduated from Turkey High School and was one of the first students to enroll at Texas Tech in 1925. A tubercular health factor caused him to move to New Mexico where he studied art at the Hill and Canyon School of Fine Arts at Santa Fe for two Fine Arts at Santa Fe for two years and spent six months studying with Emil Bistram in Taos. Then after surveying the results, he burned all of his work and started all over painting in the traditional manner.
