HEART ATTACK CLAIMS LIFE OF M. L. "SLOCUM" ROBERSON

M. L. Roberson, a life-long resident of Quitaque, died suddenly at 5:15 p. m. Wednesday, Apr. 23 of a heart attack. He was in the yard of his neighbor, Mrs. J. W. Ewing, and was talking with her and James Brunson when death came.

Funeral services will be held at 3:00 p. m. Friday at the United Methodist Church, of which he was a member, and a Steward for many years. The Rev. Al Jennings, a former pastor of Vega, pastor Jim Williams, and Earl Cantwell, minister of the Rock Creek Church of Christ will officiate. Burial will be in Rest Haven Cemetery by Quitaque Funeral Home.

Slocum, as he was affectionately known by everyone, was owner of Roberson Dry Goods. He was born September 30, 1915, at Quitaque and had lived here all of his life. He was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Roberson.

He was married to Miss Yolana Knox on December 15, 1935 at Quitaque.

M. L. Roberson was a very active and vital part of the local community life, serving in all its phases. In addition to his long service as a steward in the church, Slocum, served as a School Trustee, was a former mayor of Quitaque, and had served as a member of the City Council for 24 years, having been reelected to another term on the Council a couple of weeks ago. He was also Secretary-Treasurer of the Lions Club.

He spent 2½ years in the Navy during World War II.

Marion Louis Roberson was 53 years, 6 months and 29 days of age.

He is survived by his wife, Yolana, of the home; one sister, Minnie Mae of Quitaque; and his stepmother, Mrs. W. C. Roberson, of Wellington.

On April 30, 1969, the Quitaque P-TA is sponsoring a Pre-school Clinic for children who will start to school in September, 1969. This is a very important day for both parent and child because it helps each to become familiar with school activities. Also at this time school officials and teachers are given an opportunity to become familiar with the pre-schoolers and their parents.

The schedule for the day is:
 9:45-10:20 Assemble in the lunch room for refreshments.
 10:20-10:40 Recess with First Grade. Mrs. Wise meets with mothers.
 10:40-11:30 Pre-schoolers meet First Grade.
 11:30-12:20 Lunch
 12:20-1:00 Pre-schoolers meet in lunchroom.
 1:00-1:05 Assemble for bus ride to Turkey for eye, ear and teeth examination. Mothers are encouraged to go. If you cannot attend, your child will be cared for.

A form will be furnished each family in order that you may furnish a record of your child's immunizations and a record of any diseases such as mumps, measles, chicken pox, etc. You are asked to complete the form and turn it in when you arrive.

The school will provide the meal for the child. The cost of your meal will be 60 cents.

Pretty Pimientos Molded in Salad



Molded salads are always nice. For this one the ingredients are colorful and tasty—bright big pieces of pimiento highlight the two shades of green of the avocado and artichoke hearts, and what could be more fetching than crunchily little raw cauliflower "fans"?

Pimiento Molded Salad

1 jar or can (7 oz.) whole pimientos, drained
 1/2 small head (about) cauliflower
 1 ripe avocado
 1 package (10 oz.) frozen artichoke hearts, cooked as directed on package
 1 cup bottled French or Italian dressing
 2 envelopes unflavored gelatin
 1/4 cup wine vinegar
 1 can (12 1/2 oz.) consommé madrilene
 Boiling water
 1 tablespoon capers
 1 teaspoon instant minced onion
 To prepare: tear pimientos into large pieces; break cauliflower into flowerlets, then slice into "fans." Peel avocado and cut into slices or cubes. Cook artichokes as directed on package. Place all vegetables together in a bowl; sprinkle with salt and pepper and add dressing. Lightly toss vegetables to mix and distribute dressing. Let stand at room temperature while preparing gelatin base.
 Soften gelatin in vinegar. Heat consommé, then add boiling water to make 5 cups of liquid. Stir in gelatin until dissolved. Stir in capers and onion. Chill gelatin mixture until it is very thick and syrupy.
 Drain vegetables, reserving marinade, and fold into gelatin; spoon into 2-quart mold rinsed in cold water. Chill until firm. Unmold on greens and garnish with a few reserved avocado slices and artichoke hearts. 6-8 servings.

Heeding Better Than Speeding for Label Reading

Have you joined America's popular new educational trend... speed reading?

Whether or not you decide to increase your ability to read fast, keep in mind there are times when reading accurately is more important than reading speedily.

One such time is when you read the label on a medicine container, says the Council on Family Health. Taking or giving medicine is so important to the health and safety of you and your family that you should understand the directions you are reading, and then double check yourself.

If you want to measure how well you understand what you read, test yourself by reading a medicine label in your home, says the Council, a non-profit organization sponsored as a public service by leading members of the drug industry.

Did you note the amount of medicine to be taken? Does the dosage vary for adults and children? How often should the medicine be taken?

If a liquid, should you shake the container well before pouring? Is it for external or internal use?

Does the label state the purpose of the medicine?

Are there instructions for proper storage... such as "Keep in a cool place." Should you take the medicine before or after eating?

Are there cautions as to certain activities that should be curtailed or discontinued while



taking the medicine?

Not all medicine labels contain all of the information listed above, but all information on each label is important.

Heeding rather than speeding is the watchword when reading directions for the use of medicine, says the Council on Family Health.
