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

HARPER VALLEY P-TA

Every year the membership committee chairman utters a prayer for the inspiration to present the PTA message so provocatively that everyone who hears it will hurry off to join the nearest local unit. This year the prayers were scarce-ly uttered when they were answered, although no one seemed to recognize the answer when it came.

Early in August the airwaves suddenly throbbed with the rhythm of the P-TA! True, it was not the P-TA as we know it, but the P-TA set to an irrestible beat, and beamed primarily to the young people of America. Almost every day the most popular country music song was a little ballad about a notorious mythical unit, the Harper Valley P-TA, which aired it's questionable business all over A-

When I first heard this sordid tale beat out over the air, country music style, I was shocked, then convulsed with laughter by its inongruity.

Many of you apparently reacted the same way, some of you wrote while still in a stage of shock before the laughter to inquire whe ther our exclusive right to the service mark of P-TA did not make this use of our name libel. We referred these questions to our legal counsel who answered with forthright wisdom: "It is apparently necessary to point out quite frequently that if we have a claim to xclusive ownership of P-TA, it is only in the sense that we may be able to prevent a non-affiliated or-ganization from passing itself off as a P-TA or preventing somebody from printing a magazine called the P-TA. It-does not, however, give us an exemption from being talked about, written about, and sung about, satirized, ridiculed, or otherwise abused, something which amounts to actionable libel or

The P-TA is a venerable American institution, and it is fair game for comment, favorable or unfavorable, to the same extent as polilicians or other persons and organi-

zations in the public eye who are subject to open attack. In the meantime I began tuning in my radio in my car and I was always impressed in hearing the P-TA sung about more often in one week than it has been in its entire 71 years of history. It was also talked about knowingly by disc jockeys, most of them, obviously not having given a thought to it since the days when they took the meeting notices home in their pockets from school.

One day as I listened again, marveling that the P - TA was where I had always thought it should be, number one on the Hit Parade, and regretting that the nessage I had in mind, the light dawned, and in a flash of clarity recognized as good a member ship message as I had ever heard. 
