

Cisco ISD administering Credit Exam for Acceleration on December 2-4, 2008. Parents are asked to register for the Fall administration by Friday, October 17. Parents of elementary students should contact Kathy Conring, counselor; parents of junior high students should contact Kelly Jo West; and parents of high school students should contact Erin Schaefer, counselor. Testing must be requested in advance and must be requested by the announced deadline to facilitate the tests. ordering of tests.

Acceleration is a program that allows students to accelerate their learning and their pace in school by permitting students

who have had no prior formal instruction in a subject or subjects to test out of the course or grade. Elementary students must take tests in language arts, math, science, and social studies at the grade level they are attempting to skip. They must score ninety percent on each of the four tests in order to advance to the next grade. Junior high and high school students must take exams for the each semester of the course out of which they are trying to test. They too must score ninety percent on each of the

Anyone ever having lived on a Flatwood peanut farm back in the fortys probably like me remembers the blowing sand in the winter and those bad dust storms that would occasionally blow in from west Texas.

We had a well but no electricity because the power company said it was too far to run a line down the road to our house. We had kerosene lamps for night to see by and took our baths in a wash tub usually on the back porch but when it was cold mama would heat water on the wood stove in the kitchen and pour a kettle full at the time to heat the bath water. We did have a modern contraption called a aeromotor which

The highlight of my spring was waiting for the mail man. We had our mailbox out by the road and every morning I would go out beside the road and wait for his arrival. His name was Fred Davenport and he was my hero because he was the fellow that brought the mail order baby chickens.

Our house was as far as Mr. Fred went because the old lane was so sandy he couldn't turn around so he would drive down there and back up to our neighbors and turn around. Mr. Fred must have liked kids because he always had the time to talk to me a bit and tell me stories.

It was after World War II and he had a brand new Ford car. He always wore a tie, a little

business hat, and a white shirt.

I can still see him in my mind coming down the road with all the seed catalogs and other things that where so important to our way of life at the time.

I of course read a lot of that material in the little house out behind our house. May be that's why we called that place our outhouse. Life was simpler then somehow. No television or radio. Less distractions than now. It didn,t take near as much to be entertained.


People still had time to visit and going to town on a Saturday afternoon was a big deal.

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

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

This comedy/drama is rated PG-13. It will be of particular interest to persons who have followed the career of famous chef Julia Child.







Farm Service Agency Clarifies Livestock **Eligibility Program Requirements**

Emphasis On Insurance Requirements

(College Station) -- Sept.18, 2009 - Juan M. Garcia, Executive Director of USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) in Texas, announced earlier this week that Texas FSA offices statewide are now accepting applications for benefits under the provisions of the Emergency Assistance for Livestock, Honeybees, and Farm-Raised Fish Program (ELAP) and the Livestock Forage Disaster Program (LFP) as outlined in the 2008 Farm Bill. For both programs, producers must have suffered losses that occurred on or after January 1, 2008, and before October 1, 2011.

In order for an LFP or ELAP applicant to qualify for program benefits, the applicant must have purchased insurance coverage through FSA's Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) or the Pasture, Rangeland and Forage Insurance (PRF-RI) program offered through the Risk Management Agency (RMA).

FSA offered producers the opportunity to "buy-in" eligibility for 2008 program benefits for LFP subject to a September 16, 2008 deadline. Deadlines for buy-in for 2008 ELAP benefits were September 16, 2008 and May 18, 2009; and purchase of 2009 crop year NAP coverage for native and improved pasture for grazing had to be completed by December 1, 2008.

"Since the passage of the 2008 Farm Bill in June of 2008, the Agency publicized program 'buy-in' and NAP coverage deadlines and offered deadline extensions in order to insure all producers had ample opportunity to meet program eligibility requirements," said Garcia.

Producers who meet the requirements of a socially disadvantaged, limited resource, or beginning farmers or ranchers, as defined in the Food, Agriculture, Conservation,

Trade Act of 1990, Section 2501 (e) (7 U.S.C. 2279(e)), do not have to meet this Risk Management Purchase Requirement (RMPR) and, therefore, are not required to have paid the buy-in fee.

Garcia stressed that FSA will consider granting equitable relief to producers who did not meet RMPR provisions; rendering them ineligible for livestock disaster program benefits.

"For certain extenuating circumstances, FSA has the authority to grant equitable relief to producers who made a good faith effort to comply with RMPR provisions," said Garcia "All requests for equitable relief will be considered on a case-bycase basis but producers must understand that relief is not guaranteed."

LFP provides payments to eligible livestock producers that have suffered livestock grazing losses due to qualifying drought or fire. Fire losses apply only to federally managed rangeland. Eligible livestock under LFP include beef cattle, alpacas, buffalo, beefalo, dairy cattle, deer, elk, emus, equine, goats, llamas, poultry, reindeer, sheep and swine. For losses due to drought, qualifying drought ratings are determined using the U.S. Drought Monitor located at http://www.drought.unl.edu/ dm monitor.html.

ELAP provides emergency assistance to eligible producers of livestock, honeybees and farm-raised fish that have losses due to disease, adverse weather or other conditions, including losses due to blizzards and wildfires. ELAP assistance is for losses not covered under other Supplemental Agricultural

Disaster Assistance programs established by the 2008 Farm Bill, specifically LFP, the Livestock Indemnity Program (LIP) and the Supplemental Revenue Assistance Payments

Program (SURE). LFP and ELAP program applicants should note that in addition to risk management provisions, certain payment limitation and adjusted gross income eligibility requirements must be met in order to qualify for livestock disaster program benefits.

Because the Criminal District Attorney's Office had enhanced the first degree felony charge with his prior convictions, Hunter had faced a minimum sentence of 15 years.

The case stemmed from a May 17, 2005 stop on Interstate 20 by DPS Troopers on routine patrol. The Troopers had spotted Hunter's vehicle with what appeared to be illegal window tint. When the Troopers turned around on him, Hunter's vehicle exited abruptly off of the Interstate and headed for the gas pumps at the Red Star Truck Stop. Due to Hunter's evasive driving and nervousness at the scene, the Troopers suspected that criminal activity was occurring. During a patdown search for the Trooper's safety, it was discovered that Hunter's passenger had approximately 122 grams of cocaine in his pocket. A set of electronic scales used for weighing narcotics was found in the driver side door of Hunter's vehicle and Hunter had \$4,400 in drug proceeds on his person. During closing arguments, Criminal District Attorney Russ Thomason argued that the cash in Hunter's pockets and the electronic scales tied him directly to the narcotics in his passenger's pockets.

Russell Wilson II of Dallas represented Hunter at trial with Thomason prosecuting. The Honorable Judge Steven R. Herod presided during the trial.
