## **Public Urged VOTE** In General Election

Some 1,500 Cisco precinct citizens are expected to turn out Tuesday, November 4, at the Laguna Hotel Corral Room to cast ballots in the general election, Presiding Judge J.V. Heyser reported Friday.

Voting will be from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. Mr. Heyser will have Tom Autrey as his assistant judge and some 20 workers will be on the job to issue ballots and to count the votes. The ballot covers everything from precinct to president.

Mr. Heyser reported that some 2,600 people are eligible to vote in the Cisco precinct and, he added, he would be delighted if all of them turned out. The usual rules and regulations will be enforced at the election place, Mr. Heyser said.

After what seems like an eternity of campaigning, voters will finally have their say, Tuesday, Nov. 4, on General Election Day.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. at nine voting sites in Eastland County.

Voters are reminded that regardless which primary they voted in earlier, they may mark their General Election ballot as they choose: straight party, and/or split ticket, voting for each office as they prefer.

Voting officials suggest that voters bring their voting registration certificate to the polls to speed up balloting.

Absentee voting ended Friday at 5 p.m., and a person had to be registered 30 days prior to the Nov. 4 date to be eligible to vote.

A Secretary of State official was in Eastland County recently to explain voting procedures.



Now that the cold weather has put an end to most vegetables in the home garden, it is time to do soe clean up to hold down future plant disease problems.

Full plowing can following this clean up. Deep burial of plant residues is one method of disease control that has been used successfully by peanut farmers for many


If you want to plant a cover crop in the garden this winter try cereal rye. It is the fastest growing, most cold-tolerant annual grass available. You can plant rve and have a thick mat of grass approximately 10 to 15 inches high by late winter. At this time, the grass should be shredded with a lawn mower and tilled into the soil so rotting occurs before spring planting. Shredding and tilling about one month before planting allows adequate decomposition.

There are many advantages of planting cereal rye. It adds the best organic matter available to the garden soil and adds green color during the winter. Rye serves as a "trap crop" for nematodes. Once nematodes enter the rye roots, they cannot escape and will perish. When rye decomposes it releases organic acids and reduce the alkalinity of the soil. This is another benefit to our Eastland County soils.

Plant the rye by seeding directly on top of the soil and raking in. Plant at the rate of one pound per 100 square



Eastland County has gained a Mississipian oil discovery well three miles southeast of Carbon.

The strike is Command Mergner Energy Corp., Fort Worth, No. 1 Nelson, spotting 1,622 feet frm the south and 1,635 feet from the east lines of Section 20, Block 2, H&TC Survey.

The well had a four hour potential of 71 barrels of 48 gravity oil, plus one barrel of water.

Flow was through a 16-64 inch choke and from perforation at 3,311 to 3,408 feet.

Operator set the 4½-inch casing at 3,340 feet, and the hole is bottomed at 3,494 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 2,080-1.

## City Council Hears Of Airport Progress

The City Council heard a progress report on improvements at the Cisco Municipal Airport, approved an ordinance to close an alley, heard a Cisco Public Library report and took care of other items at a semimonthly meeting Tuesday night at City Hall.

The Council hurried through a 15-item agenda so city officials and others attending the meeting could get home in time to hear the televsion debate of the presidential candidates.

City Manager R.J. Turpin told the Council that the new airport runway was virtually ready for the Bontke Bros. Construction Company to begin base work and that Texas Aeronautics Commission engineers have submitted to the city plans and specifications for paving that will follow the base

The project is being financed largely through city matching funds provided by use of city equipment and donated equipment and labor by the EnRe Corporation, Mr. Turpin said.

Speaking for a library delegation, Mrs. J.J. Porter gave the Council a report on library activities. She expressed the hope that the library would continue to be supported by the city. The 1980-81 budget provides the sum of \$900 for the library. The library is owned by the 20th Century Club and has grown with the years.

Minutes of the past three Council meetings were distributed to members of the body who approved them. Councilman Wm. J. (Bill) Eudy expressed the hope that in the future the official minutes would quote action and comment verbatim.

The Council amended minutes of the October 14th meeting to suspend action on West Texas Utilities Company's rate increase request for 120 days instead of 90 days. This is the maximum that suspension can be asked by the city and would give the Texas League of Municipalities more time to examine WTUC's request and prepare for a state hearing, City Attorney Bill Wright reported.

L.D. (Dick) Woolley, president of the First National Bank, appeared before the Council to report that the east-west alley be closed just south of the Laguna Hotel. He explained that the bank has options to buy all of the property in the block south of the Laguna and the vacant lots west of the hotel as a possible site for a new bank building. He added that announcement would be made soon. The Council passed an ordinance on first reading to close the alley.

Items 3, 4 and 5 were tabled until a full council could be present. Three and four were resolutions pertaining to signing city checks and the office of the mayor and council at city hall. Item five concerned the city's using the new Eastland County jail for its prisoners. This was held up to allow the city manager to obtain complete information.

Item 6-The Council approved the assignment of a signboard lease at the corner of Front Street and I-20 access road by Jammie Fry to Cisco Junior College. The contract provides for payment of \$25 per year to the ci-

Item 7-The city manager submitted a financial statement for the month of September that showed general fund gross revenues for the month of \$48,389 and gross expenditures of \$49,159. Water and sewer revenues, including cash of \$75,000 from a maturing certificate of deposit, totalled \$104,678 with expenditures amounting to \$22,854.

Items 8 and 9-These items concerned the sewage disposal plant water and no action was taken.

Item 10-Revenue sharing funds amounting to \$48,000 were due to be turned over to the city on Friday, Oct. 31, the city manager reported. The revenue fund situation for the coming year will not be known until a later date, it was noted.

Item 11-This concerned the airport, which is covered

Item 12--The Council reviewed the hospital insurance program for city employees. A rate increase will be effective with the new policy beginning Dec. 1.



On Tuesday, Oct. 14, I attended a city council meeting and came away deeply depressed over the mockery of justice and the rudeness of some of our councilmen. One of them even asked that the visitors from Abilene's TV station and the writers of the REPORTER NEWS stay out of Cisco's business. Had they not been conducting business that they were embarrassed about, or probably ashamed of, why should they have objected to publicity?

The TV and news media representatives did not leave although one of the reporters was never given a chair. He leaned against the wall and wrote on a clipboard the entire session.

On Wednesday, Oct. 15, his story appeared under the headline "Cisco Council Fires City Secretary by 5-1 Vote."

I do not know the young reporter, Mike O'Neal, but I take this way of commending him for his analysis of the situation and for giving Marilyn Smith, the fired one, the justice that I think she merits. Reporter O'Neal was perceptive enough to do this in a covert manner and stay within the journalistic bounds of impartial repor-

My teaching and writing have so filled my time that I have attended few council meetings. When I learned that a member of Cisco's Writers' Club, my esteemed neighbor, was on trial, I went to the council meeting to lend my moral support, fully aware that probably none of the visitors would have an opportunity to

I knew that Mrs. Smith

had stepped into the city

secretary's position "cold"

when the former city manager resigned and five city employees walked out in June. She was appointed acting city manager without a city secretary nor a private secretary as the new manager now has. With some help from former employees, Teena Campbell and Ramona Nichols, and the voluntary service of Joe Cooper, they got out all the water bills and payroll checks on time. Some of the city bills were late but they too were paid. Gradually, the acting manager Smith began bringing order out of the chaos, and filling the vacated places with new workers. She served in that triple capacity for two months. A new city manager, R.J. Turpin of Ranger was chosen on or about August 26. Although the city charter specifically states in Section 41..."the city manager when approved, need not be a resident of Cisco; however, during the tenure of his office, he shall reside within the city." But Mgr. Turpin still lives in Ranger with an unlisted telephone. I have no quarrel with Manager Tur pin over that minor issue fo I am aware that housing i Cisco is difficult to find.

I do have some other things concerning our nev city manager that I believ all Cisco should weigh heav ly. First, according to Mrs Smith's testimony, some tw weeks ago Mr. Turpin tolher to leave the work on he desk and begin getting ou tax statements. Tuesda night, he brought 5 or 6 le ters saying she wa negligent of duty in no answering the mail tha came to her desk. Most of them, from which Mr. Tur pin stumbingly read ex cerpts, were requests fo birth and death certificatesrequests which were not o an extremely urgent natur but should have been answered if Mrs. Smith had had the time. My goal in selecting the program is to make the Chorus responsive to the convention events. The Chorus will fit in and enhance the various moods of the convention activities."

The Chorus will be joined by the National FFA Band in parts of the convention program and will present special music recognizing the completion of FFA's 52nd year throughout.

Hallmark Cards, Inc., and Dr. Pepper will co-sponsor the National FFA Chorus. Through this sponsorship, Hallmark and Dr. Pepper will help provide for the operational and organization expenses of the Chorus while in Kansas City. Accompaniment for the

Chorus will be provided by Owen Robbins, currently working on the musical creative staff of the Kings Dominion Parks. Robbins worked for five years as both a student in the New Virginians program and as a staff assistant to Kingma at Virginia Tech. He was Assistant to the Director of Purdue Musical Organizations and has had extensive performing experience as an accompanist and musical arranger. "I am especially ex-

cited about working with Stan Kingma again," said Owen in a recent interview. "We were close friends and close in our musical ideas. We have had a lot of experience doing this kind of work while at VPI and it will be fun to be working together again."

As an experienced Choral Director and stage personality, Kingma has had extensive experience working with musical productions and with young people. While at Virginia Tech he was Director of the University's Choral Music Organizations, founded the 200 voice University Choir, directed the Varsity Glee Club, and founded the popular "New Virginians" entertainment troupe. In 1977 the New Virginians were featured entertainers appearing throughout the country on a three-month coast-to-coast tour. Kingma also recruited and directed the 250 piece "All Student Groups U.S.A." musical program which toured nine European countries in 1977.

Kingma is currently the Assistant to the President of Wheaton Industries in Millville, New Jersey, and since 1978 has been devoting the majority of his creative time to his business interests. He was asked why he was willing to direct the National FFA Chorus.

"I've always been excited by working with a quality group of young performers in a first-class environment. The youth of FFA and the fantastic National FFA Organization qualify on both points. My reason for being involved in musical production work for so many years is the tremendous thrill of sceing a young person open up and begin to realize his performing potential. My goal for the week will be to develop the finest chorus of young voices that is possible to attain with the talent available. Musical choruses are one of the few opportunities most of us have to participate in an emotional and exciting team devoted to achieving excellence. I really can't wait until Kansas City and the first rehearsal!"

Although the preparation for the Chorus requires many hours of hard work, the Chorus members will have an opportunity to relax at several special events planned for them.
