Contract Made For Audit City Books

A recessed meeting of the City Commission was held Wednesday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock, with all commissioners present with the exception of Geo. D. Fee.

The main purpose of the meeting was to complete contract with representatives of Ernst & Ernst, auditors of national reputation, for a complete audit of the city's books. A contract was closed and the work starts immediately.

Several tax matters came up for discussion and were disposed of at the meeting.

The Commission raised the minimum water gallonage from 3,300 to 5,000 gallons. No lowering of the minimum rate was made.

Scott W. Key, attorney for the Humble Oil & Refining Co., and W. W. Wallace appeared before the commission to advise that suit would be filed against the city for the purpose of clearing their property here in respect to about \$5,000 delinquent taxes that were purported to be due by the Humble Oil & Refining Co.

Motion was made to reduce the salary of the two men employed at the cemetery, and an additional third man be employed to assist with the work there. Upon a vote Burnett and Clements voted for it, and Donovan and Elliott voted against it, causing a tie. Mayor Berry cast the deciding vote against, and the motion was lost.

The Commission recessed.

Methodist Conference Closes

The annual conference of the Cisco District of the M. E. Church South which has been in session at the First Methodist church here since Wednesday morning, came to a close yesterday afternoon. About 150 ministers and delegates from various parts of the district were in attendance. Among the visiting preachers was Dr. Umphrey Lee, a former pastor here, who preached Wednesday night. Delegates were elected Thursday morning to the annual Central Texas Conference, which convenes in Waco in November. One bit of good news which was reported at the conference was that the \$3,000 debt on the First Church property here, on which a concerted drive has been made the past few days, had been about raised. A number of the officials and members have been working faithfully on this, and it is due to their excellent work that the debt is to be met.

Will Have Poppy Sale

A "Poppy Sale" will be sponsored by the American Legion Auxiliary here Saturday, May 23. The poppies are sold for funds which go to disabled veterans. The Red Cross has been forced to withdraw the aid it has given the veteran hospitals heretofore by furnishing nurses, because of having so much of its funds used for drouth relief. 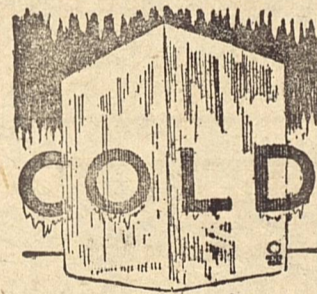
