Loboes Hoping To Get Back On Winning Track Against Jim Ned

Cisco High School's Lobo Varsity is hoping to get back on a winning track this week as they travel to Tuscola where they will take on the Jim Ned Indians. Kick-off will be at 7:30 p.m.

There will be no Junior High or Junior Varsity football games played this week, since Jim Ned does not have enough players to field the teams.

Cisco's Junior Varsity players will suit up with the Varsity on Friday night as they did last week against Eastland.

Following a sound defeat by the Eastland Mavericks last week, the Loboes are now 2-6 for the season and 1-4 in district play. Eastland is 7-1 for the season and 5-0 in district.

This week's opponents for Cisco, the Jim Ned Indians, are 0-8 for the season. They have not won a game all year.

Cisco Head Coach Doyle Walker said Jim Ned has had a lot of problems this year. They started out with "some 40 players and are now down to 19." He said they have had discipline problems with some of their players, as well as injuries during the season.

Coach Walker said the players Jim Ned has left are "pretty good kids" who will not give up and will play the best game they can.

Cisco needs to win its next two games, if at all possible, according to Coach Walker. Cisco only has two more games in the season— Jim Ned and Baird.

Except for the five starters who have been out the past games, Cisco is expected to be ready to play. Coach Walker said Robert Rains' shoulder was still bothering him last Friday and he was pulled from the game, rather than take a chance on hurting it worse. Roy Boykin suffered a deep calf bruise, but both players were expected back in this week's line-up.

A number of Junior Varsity players saw action last week against Eastland. They included Larry Fields, Mark McGinness, Kody Wallace, Phillip Shackelford, Hugh Baggett, Dout Witt, and William James.

Coach Walker said Eastland had Cisco outmaneuvered in last week's game, but he feels that if the Loboes had not suffered so many injuries this season, Eastland "could not have walked all over us." He said the Mavericks definitely have a good team this year.

Double Parking To Be Addressed

Double parking at Primary School has been causing a considerable traffic problem and city police will begin issuing traffic violation tickets to offenders. Chief Billy Rains reported Monday. The congestion occurs in the afternoons shortly before classes dismiss, he added.

"We will probably issue one warning ticket before a violation ticket is given," Mr. Rains said. "Cooperation to eliminate this problem will be appreciated."

In last week's game, Cisco suffered a 54-to-0 defeat by Eastland in District 10-AA action in Cisco's Chesley Field.

The Mavericks rolled up 430 yards total offense, while Cisco only managed 85 yards total. The Mavericks rushed 48 times for 280 yards and passed for 150. Cisco rushed 38 times for 85 yards and did not complete one pass.

Eastland scored one touchdown in the first quarter, five touchdowns in the second quarter, and one in each of the remaining two quarters. Cisco did not get inside Eastland's 20-yard line the entire game.

The Maverick's first score was on a 4 yard run by Scott Payne. Glenn Nevill kicked the extra point for a 7-to-0 score with 6:07 left in the first quarter.

In the second quarter, Quarterback Jason Rattan scored on a 48-yard run and Nevill's kick failed on the conversion play, leaving the score 13-to-0 with 11:48 in the second quarter.

Clyde Wilson scored on a one-yard run and the extra point run by Rattan was good, for a score of 21-to-0 with 7:05 left in the quarter.

One minute and one second later, Eastland's Payne scored on a 27-yard return of a pass interception. Nevill's kick was good for a 28-to-0 score with 6:04 left in the second quarter. Wilson scored again on a seven-yard run and Nevill's kick was good, for a 35-to-0 score with 3:41 left in the quarter. John Collins added the final first half touchdown on a one-yard run. Nevill's kick failed for a half-time score of 41-to-0 with 50 seconds left.

In the third quarter, Eastland quarterback Glenn Nevill completed a pass to Tim Sedillo for a seven-yard pass play touchdown. Nevill's kick was good, making the score 48-to-0 with 3:06 left in the third quarter.

Eastland's final score was on a 29-yard run by Nevill in the fourth quarter. His extra point kick was no good, leaving the score at 54-to-0 with 10:33 left in the game.

Cisco's rushers in the game were Roy Boykin with 8 carries for 22 yards; Steve Abbott, 5 carries for 2 yards; Brian Wagon, 12 carries for 26 yards; Ronnie Scheuren, 5 carries for 3 yards; Larry Fields, 2 carries for 5 yards; Jerrod Jeffcoat, 5 carries for

22 yards; and Bill White, 1 carry for 5 yards.

Eastland's rushers were Jason Rattan with 6 carries for 86 yards; Clyde Wilson, 17 carries for 105 yards; Tracy Fullen, 7 carries for 11 yards; John Collins, 7 carries for 16 yards; Glenn Nevill, 1 carry for 29 yards; Scott Payne, 5 carries for 10 yards; Ken Petty, 4 carries for 22 yards; and Troy Snow, 1 carry for 1 yard.

Cisco quarterback Jerrod Jeffcoat had no completions out of 9 attempts. He was intercepted three times by Eastland.

Eastland's Jason Rattan completed 5 of 8 passes for 72 yards and Glenn Nevill completed 3 of 8 passes for 78 yards. Scott Payne had no completions out of one attempt.

Receivers for Eastland were Ken Petty with 2 receptions for 47 yards; Steve Broyles, 1 reception for 34 yards; Troy Washington, 1 reception for 3 yards; Glenn Nevill, 2 receptions for 22 yards; Jeff Baird, 1 reception for 37 yards; and Tim Sedillo, 1 reception for 7 yards.

CJC Wranglers To Host Kilgore J.C.

The Cisco Junior College Wranglers, who are scheduled to host the Kilgore JC Rangers here Saturday night, ran into a good football team and experienced some bad breaks at Corsicana last Saturday night and lost a Texas JC Athletic Conference football game by a score of 27-to-24.

The Wranglers had a 10-to-7 half-time lead and saw the point leadership move from one team to the other three times before the final whistle. The Cisco team scored first when they kicked off, held, and then drove

to Navarro's 30 for Raymon Hernandez to kick a field goal.

Navarro took the next kickoff and stalled. They punted and Cisco fumbled the ball on their 16. On an end sweep, Navarro scored and kicked the goal.

Late in the third quarter, Navarro attempted a field goal and Darrell Landry, sophomore defensive back from New Orleans, blocked the kick and Clayton Hatton, sophomore defensive back from Killeen, scooped up the ball and ran 80 yards for a touchdown. Hernandez converted.

Early in the third, Navarro took the ball over to climax an 80-yard drive and kicked goal for a 14-10 lead. Moments later, Cisco QB Mark Filling hit End Phillip Walton for a 75-yard scoring play and Hernandez kicked goal to give Cisco a 17-14 lead.

Navarro came back with an 80-yard drive to score again for a 21-17 lead. The Wranglers then began a drive that ended with a score when Running Back David Smith caught a 20-yard pass from Filling. Hernandez added the extra point and Cisco went ahead again, 24-21.

Late in the game, Navarro got the ball and two plays covered 78 yards for a score, giving the Corsicana team a 27-24 lead that stood up. Cisco was moving the ball when an interception stopped their final effort.

The Wranglers had over 300 yards passing but were limited to only 25 yards rushing by a strong Navarro defense.

John Mathews, sophomore linebacker from Abilene Cooper, played an outstanding game for the CJC defense.

"Navarro was well prepared and they whipped us," Coach Rick Frazier of the Wranglers said. "You can't take anything away from them."

Cisco had a few injuries. David Smith needed 16 stitches to close wounds on a hand after a tackler stepped on him. Tackle Lineal Overshaw to Tyler had a knee injury, and Defensive End Mike Johnson of Pahoee, Fla., and an ankle sprain.

Coach Frazier said the three regular starters were "probable" for the Kilgore game here this week.

Cisco is among the conference's strongest teams.

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Commissioners Court Discussed Important Matters

The Eastland Commissioners Court held a regular meeting in the Courtroom on Monday, Oct. 28. Commissioners present were Richard Robinson, Pct. 1, L.T. Owen, Pct. 3, and C.B. Dill, Pct. 4. County Judge Scott Bailey presided. Mrs. Jack Blackwell, wife of Comm. Blackwell of Pct. 2 sat in as an observer. A number of County officials and other citizens also attended.

Important topics were discussed, including the State's phasing out of a County Agent position, County contracts on rural firefighting, County taxes, and the duties of Constables.

County Tax Collector Nancy Trout, along with chief appraiser Steve Thomas of the County Tax Appraisal office came before the Commissioners to request that the 3 percent discount on current taxes be extended through November.

This is because the Tax Statement mailings have been delayed, and will not be received in time for most citizens to take advantage of the October rates.

Commissioners agreed to extend the 3 percent deduction through November.

Mrs. Trout also requested an outside audit of her books, due to the theft of a former employee. This theft and the altering of books to cover it allegedly occurred between Aug. 1984 and March 27, 1985. The former employee has been sentenced and has made restitution.

Commissioners agreed that an extensive inquiry into the Tax Office was appropriate. They asked Mrs. Trout to contact Smith, Verette and Parker and find out the cost of an audit. She will report this to the next meeting of the Court.

A lengthy discussion was held on firefighting contracts.

Mike Moore, Cisco City Manager, represented the City of Cisco. Colin Campbell spoke for Carbon, Constable Gene Hicks and Comm. L.T. Owen spoke for Rising Star, and a delegation was present from Gorman.

Carbon, Gorman and Rising Star indicated that they

wanted no basic change in the current rural firefighting arrangements. Ranger Firefighters had communicated no requests to the Court, so it appeared that the only towns making a request for County liability for rural firefighting were Cisco and Eastland.

Comm. Richard Robinson stated that the County In-

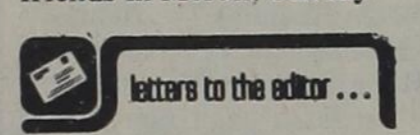

The elimination of the County Agent's position held by Faith Ballard, he said, will affect many young people throughout the County.

Little cited how this office was first established in 1936, and how Agents have worked with 4-H members since. There are now 314 members in the program, and the quality of their training is high. Miss Ballard has worked long hours, he said, and has related well to young people. They have many awards on a County, District and even a State level.

"These young people will not become a burden to our County - they are our future leaders."

"I am asking for help to reinstate this position, so that this work may continue."

Commissioners and Judge Bailey expressed a willingness to help in any way possible. As a first step the Commissioners requested that the Judge draft a letter to people who might have some bearing on the situation.

Three County Constables then appeared before the Court to discuss the duties of their offices. Each stated that they were serving all the papers in their Precincts which they were given to serve, and did not like the way they had been characterized before the Court.

The first to speak was Jesse Brown of Ranger, who was accompanied by Justice of the Peace Luther Maxwell of Ranger. Constable Brown stated that he was serving all the papers given to him, and also driving around his

Precinct to check on things. He remarked that in the past he had gone to the Sheriff's Office in Eastland to pick up papers, but he was not going anymore. This was due to the expense of the trips and other matters.

He, with Constables Gene Hicks of Rising Star and Teddy Parrish of Cisco, explained that they could not make these trips back and forth on their \$50 per month car allowance.

They also expressed dissatisfaction at the Sheriff signing papers before they are served by the Constable.

Constable Dewey Keesee of Gorman, although not present, sent word through Comm. L.T. Owen that he would help anytime he was asked, but he would not run up to the Sheriff's office.

Constable Teddy J. Parrish of Pct. 4, Cisco, said that he was a Certified Peace Officer and took his job seriously. He reported that

he has served all papers from Judge Heyser's office, but hasn't had many given to him from anywhere else. While under treatment for snakebite Constable Bill Hunter handled two of his papers, he said.

"If they will send us the papers we will serve the papers," he concluded.

All the Constables requested a raise in their car allowances. Judge Bailey, at the meeting ended, stated that he felt some changes would come in the future to the Constable's offices.

"Either these law enforcement positions will become full time, and elevated to full pay and full status - or the communities they serve will see them phased out of existence," he predicted.

The Court dismissed at noon, resuming with an Executive Session in the afternoon. The next meeting will be Tuesday, Nov. 12, following the Veteran's Day Holiday.

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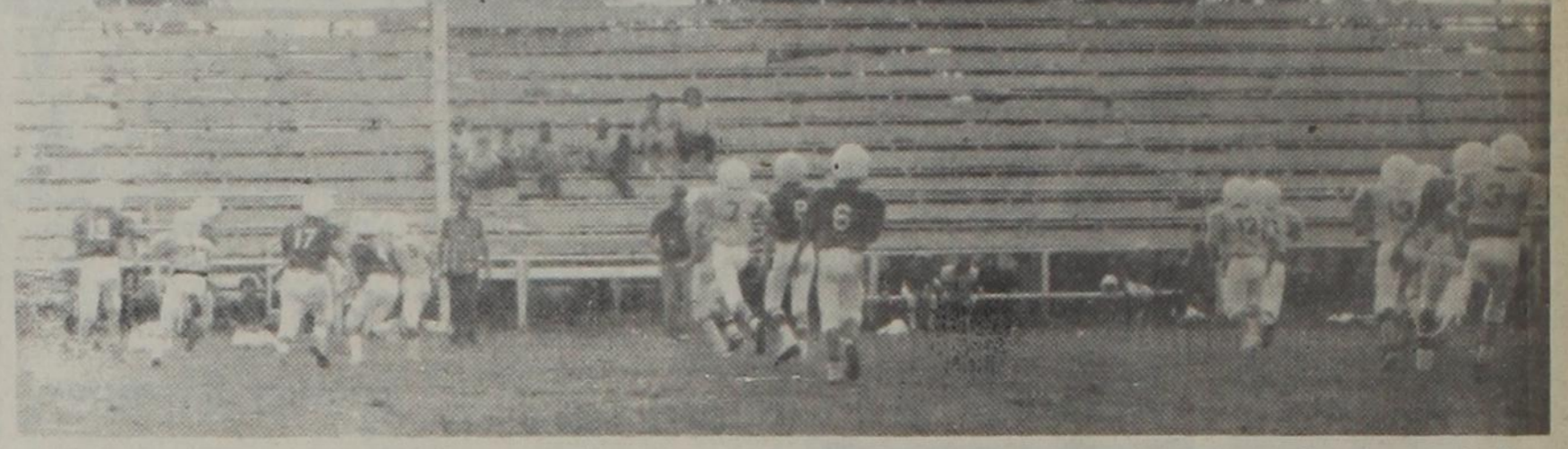

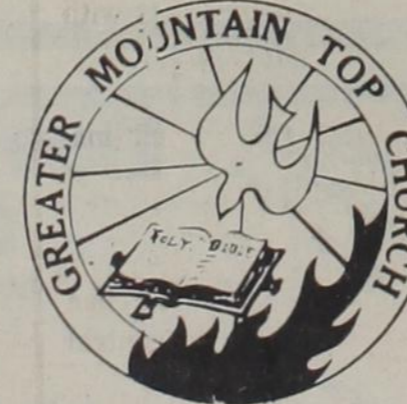

Voter Turnout Is Key To Passing Water Amendments

These days, many elections are decided by a small minority of eligible voters. This may be the case on November 5 when 14 Constitutional Amendments are voted on by Texans statewide, and water issues extremely important to the state are addressed.

Constitutional Amendment No. 1 would provide for the issuance of \$980 million in bonds for water development, transportation, wastewater treatment,

water quality, flood control and water supply projects. Amendment No. 2 authorizes the sale of \$200 million in state bonds to provide low interest loans for farmers in upgrading their irrigation efficiency.

In a similar election in 1968, when a constitutional amendment concerning state water issues appeared on the ballot, the measure was defeated statewide by a small margin of approximately 5,000 votes. During

that particular election, West Texans voted in favor of the issue by a large majority, but the voter turnout was only about 15 percent of the registered voters.

The 5,000 majority votes cast against the constitutional amendment in that 1968 election could have easily been offset if even one additional voter per precinct in West Texas had gone to the polls.

The provisions of Constitutional Amendments 1 and 2

are for all Texans. However, the West Texas Chamber of Commerce urges West Texans to lead the way in supporting these two extremely important water issues by going to the polls in record numbers to vote for Constitutional Amendments 1 and 2.

Eastland County Lawyers Urge Registered Voters To Vote

The Eastland County lawyers urge all registered voters in Eastland County to vote against Proposed Constitutional Amendment No. 13 on November 5, 1985. This amendment, if passed, would create a Judicial Districting Board. The board would be responsible for redistricting the District Courts and Court of Appeals according to population. This amendment allows rural counties to be combined into one judicial district so that they would share one district judge. The amendment also encourages rural counties to be combined with urban counties, thus decreasing the number of judges in rural counties and increasing the number of judges serving urban counties.

The Eastland County Bar Association strongly feels this amendment is not in the best interests of the judicial system of the State of Texas, of Eastland County or any rural county. At present, the 91st District County serves only Eastland County. Should the court's district be expanded to include other counties, there would be an increase in the court's volume and a blockage of cases would be created.

The Eastland County Bar Association met Friday, October 25, 1985, and

unanimously adopted the following resolution:

A RESOLUTION OF THE EASTLAND COUNTY BAR ASSOCIATION TO OPPOSE THE ADOPTION OF THE PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER 13 CONCERNING REAPPORTIONMENT AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 5, 1985.

WHEREAS, the 69th Legislature of the State of Texas, Regular Session of 1985, has passed S.J.R. 14 concerning creation of the Judicial Districts Board and Judicial Reapportionment and has submitted the same to the voters of the State of Texas as Proposition 13 at the General Election on November 5, 1985; and,

WHEREAS, the Eastland County Bar Association at a duly assembled meeting with a quorum being present has duly considered, deliberated and discussed the above referred to proposed constitutional amendment concerning creation of a Judicial Districts Board and Reapportionment of the Courts of the State of Texas and it is the opinion of the said Bar Association that:

1. The proposed constitutional amendment will result in the loss of the 91st District Court serving only Eastland County.
2. The proposed constitutional amendment will likely result in the District Court of Eastland County, Texas, being consolidated with District Courts in other rural and metropolitan counties so as to encompass 90,000 or more people to be served by the designated district court.
3. The proposed constitutional amendment will

create an undesirable backlog of cases which will result in an unreasonable delay in the trial of civil and criminal cases in Eastland County and throughout the state.

4. The proposed constitutional amendment will result in the reapportionment of the district courts even ten (10) years thereby weakening the judicial system as a whole throughout the State of Texas and more particularly the rural areas;

5. The proposed constitutional amendment is detrimental, harmful and certainly not in the best interest of the judicial system of the State of Texas and more particularly the rural areas of the state such as Eastland County, Texas.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE EASTLAND COUNTY BAR ASSOCIATION:

SECTION 1: That the Eastland County Bar Association recommends and urges the citizens of Eastland County to actively OPPOSE the constitutional amendment proposal number 13 concerning the creation of the Judicial

Districts Board and Judicial Reapportionment on the ballot for November 5, 1985, and vote AGAINST the said proposition.

SECTION 2: That this resolution takes effect immediately from and after its adoption.

AARP Tax Aid Program Provides Free Counseling

The American Association of Retired Persons tax-aid program provides, in cooperation with the IRS a free income tax counseling service for the older person. The tax aid program is designed to help the older taxpayer understand the various forms and take advantage of special provisions in the tax laws for the retirement income. AARP counselors are trained by the IRS to help prepare returns for taxpayers. The mainstay of the Tax-Aide program is the individual volunteer counselor who has undergone tax training through the IRS.

The AARP Tax-Aide program is now recruiting volunteers to serve as income tax counselors for the 1985 tax season. Persons volunteering to serve as counselors should have a sincere interest in serving older adults and have a good knowledge of tax matters, according to Walter Knowlden, coordinator for the Eastland and Callahan County programs. They should also be willing to participate in an internal revenue service training course and agree to devote at least four hours a week to providing tax counseling.

Volunteer counselors do not have to be members of AARP. Mr. Knowlden

pointed out that volunteers should be older persons since a unique tax-aid feature is emphasis on peer-group assistance. However, persons of any age are welcome.

"Some of our best counselors are retired professionals," Mr. Knowlden said. "Since the training course emphasizes tax benefits for older adults and not general tax preparation, those volunteers who are already familiar with taxes have a head start and usually make better counselors."

Mr. Knowlden explained that the IRS does not consider volunteer tax counselors such as those involved in Tax-Aide as "Professional return preparers."

"Since our customers don't charge a fee for their services," he said, "The IRS does not require them to sign returns or hold them responsible for underpayment of taxes on returns they assist with."

The IRS Training course for volunteers will be held in Cisco in January, 1986. The local tax-aid program will offer assistance to older residents at a convenient location from February 1 to April 15, 1986.

"We've found that our counselors enjoy their activities so much that most of them come back year after year," Mr. Knowlden said, "But we can always use additional volunteers, especially this year since we're trying to open more counseling sites and reach additional Eastland County older residents with information on the new tax changes."
