> domestic problems press upon us for solution, but no effective solution is offered for the alleviation or correction of domestic ills, nor is encouragement given for invigorating international policies, which will reopen world markets for our surplus products, tend to promote economic stability or encourage peace and tranquility between nations.

"The most affirmative part of the president's message is the recommendation of tax reduction. The whole country favors tax reduction. The democratic party has stood consistently for it since the signing of the armistice, and should co-operate without regard to partisan considerations, in any effort to ease the tax burden. This effort should be directed not alone to a reduction in a gross sum of taxation, but to an equitable distribution of the burden. The president's endorsement of the proposal to put a lighter tax on earned incomes, namely those produced by the sweat of the brow and the toil of the brain, than upon unearned incomes, namely those which come from investments, is commendable.





#### GOOD ROADS AND GOOD BUSINESS.

Road figures show that there are now more miles of good wagon and automobile roads in the United States than there are of railroads, although America's railroad system has by far the greatest network of steam transportation lines existing anywhere.

This represents for the most part a development of the last few years. Road construction is still going ahead rapidly. Before long it may double the railroad mileage, which practically came to a standstill twenty or thirty years

Another interesting point of comparison is that the present average cost of paved highways, \$25,000 a mile, is just about what the railroads cost. Money, of course, was worth more then, and the railroads would cost more to build now. Yet the time is evidently not far distant when our paved highways will represent a greater investment than our railroads.

There is doubt in some minds as to whether this latest burst of road-building is not being overdone. That hardly seems possible, for the new roads are generally used to capacity soon after they are opened, and there is an incessant demand for more.

Wherever they are built wisely, by good engineers, without graft or extravagance, to supply an existing need, there can be no question that the roads will more than pay for themselves in improved traffic facilities, lowered costs of transportation and increased property values.

#### TWO BILLIONS TO VETERANS.

The first official compilation ever made by the United States government as to the amount of money actually spent on World war veterans, both disabled and ablebodied, has recently been made public. Contrary to the general impression that very little has been done for these men and women so far, the authoritative figures show that \$2,112,293,644.19 has been expended.

This sum includes all moneys actually paid out by the government for the benefit of World war veterans and their families. It does not include in any item any money paid by veterans themselves for such purposes. Neither does that sum include compensation paid soldiers during service, the cost of their upkeep, or the \$60 bonus paid them in February, 1920.

It is thus found that money paid by taxpayers for veterans represents altogether a sum equal to almost half the total appropriations of the government for all purposes for either of the fiscal years 1922 and 1923. Estimated expenditures for the benefit of veterans for the present fiscal year, 1924, represent 12.78 per cent of the total expenses of the government for the year.

#### THE WORKER WHO GETS AHEAD.

#### TO ALL HUNTERS.

I want to call your attention to a Low facts about our game laws. The open season for killing quail is from December 1 to January 31; open season on doves, September 1 to Debember 15; open season on ducks, October 16 to January 15.

The bag limit on quail is 15 in one Tay; doves the same; the bag limit aducks is 25 in any one day. I also want to call your attention to the bollowing law as passed at the reguand called session of the 36th legislature and reads as follows:

"It shall be unlawful for any citien of this state to hunt outside of the county of his residence with a gun without first having procured from the Game, Fish and Oyster Commissioner or one of his deputies or from the county clerk of the county in which he resides a license to hunt and for which he shall pay to the officer from whom he secures a license the sum of two (\$2.00) dollars, fifteen cents of which amount shall be retained by said officer as his fee for collecting.

that when one is breeding for standard points and egg production at the same time, progress must be relatively slower than where only a single objective is sought. That perhaps is the crux of the whole breeding situation; some breeders are wont to develop one line to the total exclusion of the other. In this connection, two important things must always be kept in mind. First, since separate breeds and varieties long since have received recognition, all poultry breeders should exercise reasonable efforts to maintain breed and variety characteristics. Second, since the continued expansion of the poultry industry depends in a very large measure upon the productive capacity of the birds kept, standardbred breeders naturally should be expected to give some consideration to economic qualities.

The chief difference between the practice of soe standardbred breeders and some utility breeders is largely a matter of degree. The object in view should determine the method of procedure in breeding operations. If the breeder wishes to develop Silkies, Frizzles, or certain varieties of Games, for instance, to the highest possible state of perfection in respect to body type and feathering characteristics, he is certainly justified in may please his fancy. In fact, breed ing for fancy points has done much to stimulate interest in the science and art of breeding. On the other hand, if the strictly commercial poultryman is interested exclusively in egg production he may be justified

He decided he had better buy some more cockerels and be sure and have enough for next spring. How foolish it would have been to worry about his competition.

Didn't Hurt Business I know of a livestock breeder who sold four females of his breed to a beginner who had decided to enter the business on a large scale. The seller said, "I presume he will simply shower this section with surplus breeding stock and make a big cut in our sales." He actually worried about the competition of this new breeder. Later I saw the seller of the foundation stock and he said, "Yes, Bill had a good article in the paper a couple of years ago telling bout what he was going to do. But this year he had a sale and dispersed all of the stock. Our sales have been larger than usual. We cannot fill our orders. I guess it was no

Helped Advertise

When my neighbors began buying oultry of the same breed I raise, my ocal business increased because they needed more cockerels. Frequently they raised too few pullets and wanted more. They soon bought hatching eggs and chicks. They helped me advertise because they talked to their friends about the same breed of poultry that I raised.
