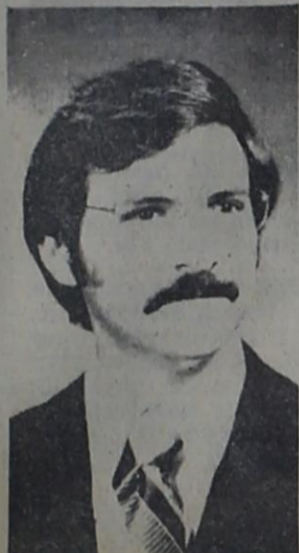

'Night Out' To Climax Family Emphasis Month

April's Family Emphasis Month in Cisco will be climaxed by a unique "Family Night Out" on Tuesday evening, April 29, at Cisco High School. The night's activities will begin with a Spaghetti Supper at 5:30, continuing with presentations by two well-known family speakers afterwards at 7:00.

Planners of the occasion have urged all persons in Cisco—young and old alike—who want to help promote better family life to attend.

The featured speakers will be Dr. Paul Faulkner and Dr. Tom Milholland, both outstanding lecturers who are well-known throughout the United States as experienced authorities on family life. The two have a combined total of 40 years of successful parenting and family living. Faulkner has spoken to literally hundreds of thousands of people on subjects relating to both marriage and family life and Milholland is also known for his unique ability to communicate effectively with parents, teen-agers, and younger children.

The two speakers both use a relaxed and informal style with frequent injections of humor, and they are happy to answer questions from the audience—either asked verbally or sent up in writing.

Family Night Out was originally planned by a committee of teachers and parents, coordinated through the Cisco High School

Home Economics Department, with the objective of meeting one of the basic needs of our community, which is to strengthen family ties and to create a better quality in the family life. The general theme will be "Family Success."

After a brief opening general assembly, one speaker will have a session with parents and the other will talk with the young people. Following a break, the speakers will exchange audiences.

The Home Economics Department will begin the evening with a real "bargain" spaghetti supper for only \$1.25 per person—75 cents for younger children. Serving will be from 5:30 to 6:30 in the CHS cafeteria.

Continuous variety entertainment will be on stage in the Cisco High Auditorium from 6:00 to 7:00, so any arriving early for the program or those missing the spaghetti supper can enjoy the talent show while waiting for the program to begin, a committee spokesperson said.

The program will begin promptly at 7:00 p.m.

"We feel extremely fortunate to have these two very outstanding authorities on family life to come and share their wisdom and experience with the families of Cisco," a Home Economics representative said, and she concluded, "They both have very heavy schedules and great demands on their

time. We just hope that many, many people who are interested in our community family life will respond by attending and lending their encouragement to this community-wide effort."

Fourth Cisco Blood Drive To Be On CJC Campus May 7

The fourth Bi-monthly Cisco Blood Drive will be held on Wednesday, May 7, on the Cisco Junior College campus, in the Student Union Building. A team of laboratory technicians from Mary Meek Blood Center of Abilene will be present from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

The Cisco Service Club and the Cisco Civic League began sponsorship of this joint project last September, in order to reduce a long-time, 900 unit debt. Since the first drive in September, nearly 200 units (pints) of blood have been collected. Cisco citizens cannot be commended enough for their outstanding support of this ever so important project.

Due to Federal Drug Administration legislation, there are no longer paid donors (except in special cases); therefore all blood donors must be solicited on a voluntary basis.

With a 60-unit goal set for each blood drive, this amount will insure Cisco of an adequate blood supply, and gradually and partially repay E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital's debt.

A blood insurance policy is available to interested blood donors. For a pint of blood given, that donor's immediate family will be assured of having blood available to them for one full year. That donated pint of blood, however, will not count toward credit for Cisco, yet, perhaps those interested donors might give again at a later date toward credit for Cisco.

Daylight Savings Time Becomes Effective At 2:00 A.M. Sunday, April 27.



Sunday is the day when we all lose an hour of sleep when the clocks of most of the nation are moved ahead one hour.

At 2 a.m. that day, time changes to 3 a.m., giving us a sunrise one hour later and one more hour of daylight at the end of the day.

Daylight-saving time will continue for the next six months until 2 a.m. Sunday, October 26, when the clocks will be moved back one hour and we all get to sleep one hour longer.

Arizona, Hawaii, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands and American Samoa are exempt from the changeover to daylight saving time.

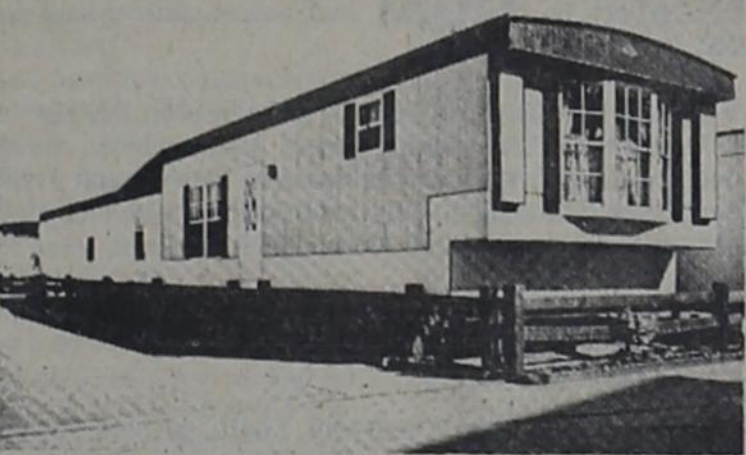

Wife Of Former Ciscoan Named Pampa Woman Of The Year 1980

(Editor's note: The following article is about Marge Penn of Pampa, daughter-in-law of Mrs. Rowena Penn of Cisco. Her husband, O.C. Penn, is a former Ciscoan. The article appeared in the Sunday, April 20, 1980, edition of Pampa News.)

Throughout the years, Pampa school's health coordinator Marge Penn has found she can't leave her job even when it's time to go home.

Her telephone never stops ringing...a worried mother checking to see what she should do with her child, a local doctor inquiring about some aspect of a student's injury or illness, a neighbor needing a little help with a problem...the list goes on.

Mrs. Penn's efforts in the public schools, in the community and throughout the county have resulted in her selection as 1980 Woman of the Year, an honor awarded by Pampa's six Beta Sigma Phi chapters.

Mrs. Penn, a registered nurse, was nominated for the annual award by several individuals and clubs. Members of the six Beta Sigma Phi chapters recently voted on the nominees and a special committee tallied the votes.

She will be honored Sunday afternoon at the annual Woman of the Year tea. Mrs. Penn is the 35th recipient of the award.

As health coordinator for Pampa High School, Pampa Middle School and Baker Elementary, Mrs. Penn has seen various changes - for the better - in school and city health systems.

"I remember the days here in Pampa when I was the only resource we had for these kids," says Mrs. Penn, a 20-year resident of Pampa. "There was no Plan A and there wasn't even an elementary counselor when I came to Pampa."

In 1960, when Mrs. Penn was working as Lefors, Grandview and Hopkins school nurse, there was no public health nurse on the county level. "Up until then what public health nursing that had been done had been done by school nurses," says Mrs. Penn, who adds that the county position was filled less than five years ago.

The honoree, who assumed her role with Pampa schools in 1966, has worked in various areas of community service as well as school nursing, something that comes naturally with her position.

"Parents ask the schools for all kinds of help," she explains. "I'm a source for whatever their needs might be. In the schools, we also have an opportunity to pick up on symptoms a child might be having - diabetes, epilepsy, and such - and refer them."

"My main job is to pick up on symptoms," explains the coordinator. "As a rule, we don't treat. We see that the child gets the right kind of treatment."

She's also responsible for keeping the records on about 2,400 students, students with psychological, emotional or medical problems.

"Each day is different," she says. "If it's during flu season, you have kids sick all day. If it's in the spring, you have accidents and injuries, when they're outside

a lot. Some days you spend taking a child to a specialist and some days, like today, you're in meetings all day."

The lengthy meetings are with counselors, teachers, parents, therapists, state and regional health officials and anyone else who might be involved in the care of a specific child.

"The whole point to all our testing is to do the followup, to see that the child is taken care of," explains Mrs. Penn. "So many of a child's learning disabilities are due to a health problem."

Mrs. Penn, who grew up in Wichita Falls, attended Midwestern University there. An older doctor, whom she respected a great deal, is probably the one who influenced her in the direction of nursing.

She graduated from Wichita General Hospital School of Nursing and studied pediatrics - her special love - and psychiatry at John Sealey in Galveston.

After that came 10 years of hospital nursing, a year as school nurse in Midland, and some private duty and office nursing. She served as director of nursing in Rankin and Spearman before coming to Pampa, where she set up the first in-service training program at Highland General.

With no public health nurse and limited state and federal programs, most of the county's indigent medical services were handled by the school nurses. The early '60s saw help from various organizations and medical personnel in the area, and resulted in the establishment of an immunization clinic for indigent schoolchildren, even before the state government required it.

"When 1970 came along and we had our state regulations, we set up mass clinics for the whole public," says Mrs. Penn, who adds that the service has been expanded in Gray County to include free monthly clinics for all children.

Until several years ago, mental health services in Pampa, and most other cities across the state, had little to offer until some interested volunteers decided to remedy the situation. Mrs. Penn and a number of other volunteers began to meet and formed the Suicide Prevention Crisis Intervention.

"That finally fell through," she says, "but out of that grew the realization of the need for counseling. The Family Service Center now does that."

Today, when a great deal of publicity is given to welfare, it is difficult to imagine a time without such programs. But in Mrs. Penn's first years in Pampa, there was only one county welfare worker to handle all the cases - child abuse, neglect, and such. Now there are several.

"A lot of programs have been state initiated, but our community has done so much to recognize the needs. All you have to do is let them know there is a need and they will respond," says the nurse.

Laws have been passed to aid the handicapped and to test school children and identify their problems, she explains, but Pampa pioneered a program for the deaf before regional and state programs were set up. "We already had our children identified, so we were ready to go with the new programs."

Planned parenthood is another area in which volunteers gave their efforts before a full-time program was established. Doctors volunteered weekly until a program with a regular practitioner was adopted.

Drug abuse is probably one area in which Pampa still needs to be served, with a need for more counseling, says Mrs. Penn, who's also been active in Red Cross, Gray County Cancer Society, the Heart Association and Altrusa Club of Pampa.

She's in the process of training Pampa teachers and students in first aid and cardio-pulmonary resuscitation short courses.

Has she become unsympathetic to the needs of people, after many years in the nursing profession?

"If I get to the point where I lose my feeling for people, I'll get out," she says firmly.

Many of us are now in the process of making up our minds about who to vote for in the May 3 primary elections. The races for State Senator, Representative, etc., are all very important. The contest that is perhaps more important than any of these is the one between Jim Hightower and incumbent commissioner Jim Nugent for a seat on the State Railroad Commission.

Why should the State Railroad Commission concern you? Because it is the commission that determines the price utility companies can charge you for gas and electricity services. It regulates gas and oil pipeline, bus and train rates and trucking permits in the state. It is one of the most powerful positions in the state and directly affects you.

Nugent, the present commissioner, has received all but a fraction of his campaign contributions from the companies and corporations (the major oil companies for the most part) he is supposed to be regulating. Jim Hightower has refused any contributions from the companies he will be charged with regulating. This is because Jim Hightower believes that a publicly elected office holder should have obligations to no one except the voters. He can't see how a person can take almost all his campaign money from someone he will deal with if elected and not show favoritism on the job - a job that determines the bills we pay.

When you go to the polls May 3rd consider the difference between Hightower and Nugent - If you're an oil company executive or a utility company share holder you'll probably want to vote for Nugent. But if you're a bill payer for natural gas, electricity or gasoline vote for Jim Hightower.

Vote and ask your friends to vote for a voice on the Railroad Commission for the people who pay the bills and not for the people who make all the money.

Home And Family, Important?

CHS Speech Students "Speak Out"

Cisco High School speech students "speak out" on the importance of education in the home. Since public schools cannot and should not be expected to accept all the responsibility for teaching young people such basic values as knowing right from wrong, sex education, pride and self-discipline. The parents must assume part of this responsibility. Following are comments made by speech students concerning several responsibilities of which home should assist in teaching:

COMMUNICATION IN THE HOME
Communication in the family is very important in order to have a closely-knit family. Families need to discuss their problems with each other instead of letting the problems build up inside. Young people need to be able to discuss their problems with their parents. If they are turned away, they may resolve their problems with the use of drugs, etc. For a family to communicate they must first be able to trust and love each other.

DISCIPLINE IN THE HOME
Discipline is the most important part of a child's education. Without discipline, the child is hindered in learning. However, parents should not be so "strict" with a child that he becomes afraid of them or develops a deep hatred toward them. The child should not be made to feel that he is always wrong or inferior, but at the same time he should be taught right from wrong. A child should never

be verbally abused by the parents.

A child should be taught to discipline himself and act as he thinks his parents would want him to act even when he is not in their presence.

DRUG EDUCATION IN THE HOME
Parents should have an open relationship with their children, and part of a good relationship is being able to communicate. One subject that should be discussed between parent and child is drug abuse. A parent should discuss drugs with their children. If a child is never told about drugs and the harm they cause, they may never know it is wrong to abuse them.

In order for a child to fully understand the term "drugs" and their functions, he has to first be told about them. The parents should take the first step in being willing to tell their children the harmful things drugs can do. A parent should tell their child that they will be there to answer questions about drugs if any should arise.

SEX EDUCATION IN THE HOME
Young people should be taught sex education at home and at school. Parents should discuss this subject with their children so that they will understand. One problem is that most parents were reared in an environment in which this subject was not discussed; therefore, it is sometimes difficult for parents to discuss sex with their children. For this reason, the schools should act as a backup for teaching sex education. Here the full facts

should be presented so that students are made aware of this subject in a wholesome and educational manner. **POSITIVE VS NEGATIVE ATTITUDE IN THE HOME**
It is important that parents teach optimism. Children should be taught to always look for the best in bad or frustrating situations thus creating a positive attitude toward life. In contrast, if a child is reared in a pessimistic environment he will develop a pessimistic attitude.

PRIDE IN THE HOME
Teaching children pride is an important duty of parents. If a child has no self-confidence he will consider himself inferior to others and will never be able to succeed in life as he should. Children should be taught that when they attempt to conquer a challenge they should give it their all. Pride comes through giving your all.

Another good Pecan Budding and Grafting School was conducted by the Eastland County Pecan Grower's Association Friday, April 18.

About 75 persons attended this, the 27th Annual School. Over 2000 people have been trained to bud and graft pecans during those years.

will be either May 14 or 15. Insects are beginning to cause problems around the home now. The elm leaf beetles are already damaging elm trees. They first eat the surface of the leaves leaving only the veins. The skeletonized leaves turn brown and eventually fall from the trees.

Although many insecticides will kill the beetles and larvae, the major problem is thorough coverage of infested trees. Trees often have to be sprayed several times because there are at least three or more generations of beetles in a year. High-pressure high-volume sprayers are necessary to completely cover the foliage. Sevin is most often used to control the elm leaf beetle.

Spring is the time when many homeowners discover they have termites. This is the time when winged forms appear and swarm. If winged termites are seen outdoors, usually there is no problem, since this is a natural occurrence. But, if they are found indoors, usually on a window sill, chances are good that an infestation has established in your home.

Quite often termites and certain ants swarm at the same time and it's important to be able to tell the difference between these two insects. Carpenter ants

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swarm in the springtime and can cause some structural damage to wood.

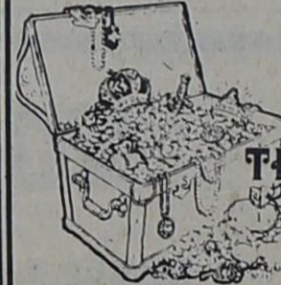
However, termites are much more destructive and require different control measures. Termites have a broad waist, ants have a narrow, constricted waist. Termites wings are the same size and shape, winged ants have a front and back pair of wings of different length and shape. Termites have straight antennae (feelers on their heads), ants have elbowed antennae.

Although a thorough inspection is best done by a professional, a homeowner can make a quick check for termite infestations. If termites or damage is found, contact a pest control company.

This is one insect pest that should not be handled by a "do-it-yourselfer." Pest control companies have the necessary equipment and experiences to effectively rid a home of termites.

Candidates Working Hard For Key May 3 Primary Date

Absentee Voting For May Election To End Tuesday

Eastland County's political pot is now into a fast boil as the last week before the Primary unfolds.

Absentee voting for the Saturday, May 3 Primary Election ends Tuesday, April 29, at 5 p.m. at the County Clerk's Office.

Polls will open at nine voting precincts on May 3 from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. for the Democrats, and at one voting site (Eastland) for the Republicans, for the party nominations.

Voters will have bonus-ballots with a Presidential Preference vote for the Democrats and a out-and-out primary vote for the Republicans.

The Democratic ballot has a number of contested races both locally and state-wide and interest is high.

Drawing the most local attention is the race for District Judge, 91st District Court. Four candidates seek the office.

Three are campaigning for sheriff in Eastland County and one County Commissioner post is in a contest. There is also a Gorman Constable race.

Statewide there are two railroad commission races, four posts for State Supreme Court seats; three State Criminal Appeals Court seats.

In a public forum before a goodly number Thursday evening a number of candidates appeared and presented their platforms and introduced themselves.

The event was sponsored by the Eastland Jaycees who will also operate an election return board on the square Primary Night. Jaycee V.P. Mark Pipkin presided and welcomed the group to the Eastland High School site.

First candidate to speak was Richard Robinson, a candidate for County Commissioner, Precinct One (Eastland) who said

that he would work for the best interest of all the people.

Sheriff Candidate Kenneth Eaves told his law enforcement experience and asked that voters check out the man before voting.

Deputy Gene Milligan spoke in behalf of Candidate John Morren, and stated that his recommendation of Mr. Morren rests and his record.

Judge Candidate Jim Wright told of the some 300 cases handled since he took office, and spoke measures to improve jury efficiency, as well as pre-trial hearing plans, and touched on probation ideas.

Judge Candidate Truman Kirk said that he has met about 95 per cent of the people, and pledges to work together for justice and asked to be remembered for first vote, and certainly for second round.

Judge Candidate Saul Pullman said that all candidates are qualified and that the role of judge is somewhat like a referee, and that he's a meter of people. The court should have dignity, equality, order, he said.

Candidate Bill B. Hart told of his 29 years of experience in law, and stated that he is running for the

judge's office because he is "jealous of the law and the court," and wants to see the court maintained on a sound and fair basis. He told of probation measures he would institute, and of practice of policing lawyers to have their respect.

Don Coan of Stephenville, spoke in behalf of his neighbor there, Bob Glasgow, who is seeking the Democratic nomination for State Senate, District 22, the seat held for a number of years by Tom Creighton who did not seek re-election.

"Glasgow is strong on law and order," Coan said of the Erath County prosecutor. He

will also hold the line on spending and represent the rural area well, he said. He's for sunset laws, teachers' pay increases and local option sales tax, and against a state income tax.

Jay Brummett, Republican candidate for the State Senate seat, said, "I'm qualified for the office because I'm a businessman and not a lawyer. I'm for a right-to-work constitutional amendment and would oppose a state income tax, and keep a balanced budget."

He spoke out for the wire-tapping referendum on the GOP ballot to help law enforcement officers curtail the serious drug traffic in Texas, and he explained the initiative and referendum measure which he said would, if passed, return the control of the legislature to the people.
