In a real courtroom it's true that attorneys protest against what's being done or said, as a means of assuring a fair trial. and the judge must allow or disallow each objection. The principals in the real courtroom are just pacticing common sense when they follow the "rules of evidence" in placing facts before the judge and jury. If there's to be a fair trial and a just verdict, there must be true facts. Evidence in the courtroom may take several forms, but two are most common. Answers to questions from a witness under oath are the best-known type of evidence. Exhibits -- written records, letters. "the murder weapon." and other physical objects

having to do with the case -are the next most common. "Depositions" or written statements. from a witness who for some reason is unable to appear personally in court are sometimes admitted as evidence in certain






