WORK TO BEGIN ON THE MACKEY TELEPHONE AND TELEGRAPH SYSTEM

Mackey Telephone Line To Be
Built From Ft. Worth to
Abilene at Once

COME THRU CROSS PLAINS

Will Build Down Proposed Texas
Central Right-of-way from
Abilene to DeLeon

The following telegram was received in this city yesterday by Mr. Gus Klotz, general manager of the Independent Telephone and Telegraph company:
Dallas, Texas, Nov. 4, 1911

Gus Klotz, Abilene, Texas:
"Mackey people will commence building westward immediately."
LYMAN KLOTZ"

This telegram confirms the article appearing in these columns a day or so ago and insures Abilene another telephone line in competition with the Western Union.

Mr. Lyman E. Klotz, secretary and treasurer of the Independent Telephone & Telegraph company, went from here to Dallas to confer with Mr. Conger, Texas manager for the Mackey's Postal Telegraph and Cable Co. of the U. S. and after conferring sent the above telegram.

This telephone insures the early building of this line into Abilene and all West Texas, paralleling the Western Union over the T & P. territory.

As stated before their offices in this city will be the first floor of the local Independent Telephone and Telegraph company.

In the meantime the Independent got busy and began at once to string heavy six copper wire cables to DeLeon, going over the proposed right-of-way of the Texas Central Railway and will also complete a line from Ballenger to Paint Rock, thus connecting with the San Angelo Independent exchange and affording Abilene connection with San Antonio and other Southwest Texas Points.—Abilene News.

This new line will pass through Cross Plains, and will give us much better service to distant points than we are now getting over the Southwestern.

WANTS INCORPORATION.

In my opinion incorporation means much for any town, and at this particular time it certainly means much for Cross Plains.

No City or town ever accomplished much until it was incorporated there can be no such thing as sanitary regulation without incorporation [look at our present sanitary condition] it is very discouraging for one citizen to take a pride in his home, his streets, and his alleys, when possibly at the same time his next door neighbor tries to see how filthy he can be. There are other matters of public interest and usefulness such as well graded streets, public water troughs, fire fighting apparatus etc, that are in common to us all, but they cannot be maintained with out incorporation, as these things like all other necessities cost money and the expense of maintaining them should be borne by all according to our tax values. There is possible in Cross Plains to day between \$75,000.00 and \$1000,000.00 of property the owners of which are nonresidents, who contribute not one penny to the advancement of the town, and when the "Hat is passed around" they are of course "conspicuous by their absence". It has been said by some very conservative people that we are not ready yet, "wait until the town grows" now it is a pity that these same self conservative people did not come to some of the men who have invested thousands of dollars in Cross Plains in buildings and Merchandise, and have said to them "Don't do it now" we are to young wait until the town grows.

The Split Log Drag In Grand Old Texas

THE proper maintenance of a public highway is as important as its construction. It costs a few thousand dollars per mile to build macadam highways but by the intelligent use of a split log drag, dirt roads can be kept in good condition at a nominal expense. The drag can be built for five dollars, and operated at a cost of from \$4.00 to \$6.00 per day. The road mileage which a split log drag can keep in proper condition varies according to the character of the road and the amount of rainfall, but the average mileage assigned a split log drag is 12 miles. The average cost of operating the drags, according to the Federal Agricultural estimate, is \$3.20 per mile.



There Are 656 Split Log Drags in Operation In Texas.

In some cases the drags are built and operated at the expense of the county; in others the county furnishes the drags and the farmers along the route operate them.

Every County May not be able to permanently improve its Public Highways, but every County can operate Split Log Drags.

The price of cotton is lower than it has been for some time, and the farmer is looking for some other sure crop. We believe the peanut is the one regular yearly profit producer. It isn't bothered with insects like cotton, and will grow abundantly, especially in the sandy land of the Cross Plains country. The nuts sell at from 60c to 90c per bushel and the vines find a ready market at \$12.00 per ton. Diversify. Plant more peanuts, sow more alfalfa, raise more hogs and let the cotton speculators go to the duce. Then you will get more for what cotton you do raise than you are getting now for twice the amount.

THEY TO HOLD COTTON

Port Worth, Nov. 1.—F. M. McCormick, vice president of the farmers union of Texas, while in the city Wednesday from his home in Texarkana, expressed confidence in the ability of the union farmers operating through the plan recommended by the national and state presidents, to hold enough cotton off the market to force the price considerably above what it is at present.

"In a number of counties where I have lectured, recommending this plan, the farmers, merchants and the bankers have adopted it with beneficial results," Mr. McCormick declared, "and I am glad to see the number of counties in which this cooperation is being adopted increasing

The plan is for a farmer to take his cotton to town, store it in a warehouse and insure it, and then go and have a confidential talk with his merchant and banker; tell them that the cotton is too low to get its real worth at this time, and ask their cooperation to hold the cotton until the price becomes remunerative. There is no merchant who knows his business or banker who is wide-awake, that will force a farmer to throw his cotton on the market at an unfair price. The trouble has been that nobody cared enough about cotton producers to help them along, but conditions are changing.
