BURKETT PECAN HARVEST UNDERWAY IN LARGE AREA

BAIRD — The pecan harvest here is underway and from all reports the crops has been termed good in spite of a large amount of moisture the past few

weeks. The Burkett pecan seems to be the popular brand name here in the county and surrounding areas, so it seems appropriate to bring you up to date on this pecan and the man who propagated and preserved it for our use today.

The recognition is given J. H. Burkett, and the story has been told by his son, Omar Burkett and it is as follows:

"My brother and I were squirrel hunting one day along the banks of Battle Creek east of Putnam in Callahan County. We found a squirrel nest with paper shell pecans inside. We carried the pecans home and showed them to our father. He urged us to find the tree upon which these pecans had fallen."

Buds and grafts were taken from the located tree and placed on a smaller tree some distance to the north. The tree now stands tall, large and prosperous on the north of IH 20 near Putnam.

The parent tree has long since been destroyed, but the grafted tree and many others which make up large orchards still grow abundantly.

A suitable plaque has been placed at the site of the tree on IH 20 by the Callahan County Historical Survey Committee. The tree catches the attention of tourist that find their route along this interstate highway. The tree stands in the middle of a chain link fence that has been assembled for its protection.

BAIRD TELEPHONE CUSTOMERS TO GET DIRECT DIALING SOON

BAIRD — West Texas Telephone Company Business Manager, Harvey Womack reports that progress toward providing Baird customers with Direct Distance Dialing (DDD) service is still on schedule.

Womack explained that for customers with 1 and 2-party service the new DDD equipment will automatically record the number being called and the calling number, and will electronically time the direct dialed call from when the called number answers until the call is terminated. For multi-party customers, the operator will intervene briefly, after the call

is placed, to get the caller's telephone number.

If a customer reaches a wrong number when using DDD, he can avoid charges for the call by immediately reporting the error to the operator.

Womack said that the tentative date for the introduction of DDD service in Baird is Nov. 12, 1971.

BAIRD — The great Baird Bears roared to their seventh victory here Friday by plastering the Knox City Greyhounds 54-6. The Bears always show great strength in the first half of the ball game, but fairly dominate the remaining last half and usual pile up a large victory.

The Bears have scored 271 points this season and had only 32 points scored against them. The Bear had now tied the 1970 season scoring record of 271 points, with three games remaining to be played.

Brian Hughes started the Bears victory Friday night by recovering a fumble in the end zone. Jay Mike Reeves added it up to seven.

Quarterback Gary Goble ran in from 17 yards out bringing

the score to 13 for the Bears. Reeves again makes contact.

The Bears stand 7-0 in season play, 2-0 in district wins. The Bears travel to Wylie this Friday night for the third game in District play.

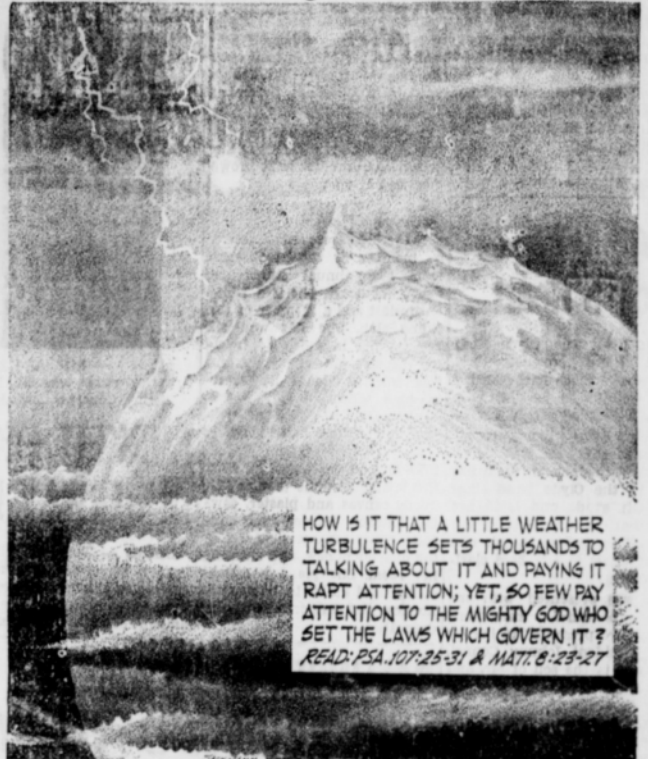

UNDERSTANDING THE SCRIPTURES

(continued from last week)

In Proverbs 2:1-9 the scriptures reveal that understanding God's way is the result of following certain rules.

In verse six we are told, "Out of his (i.e. God's) mouth cometh knowledge and understanding." Many do not understand the scriptures because they have their knowledge out of the mouth of men (preachers, priests, bishops, commentators, etc.) rather than out of the mouth of God. The first rule to a proper understanding of the Bible is a willingness to put away preconceived ideas as to what the word of God teaches or does not teach. Be willing to accept what the mouth of God has spoken regardless of what you have heard men say or teach. Man's thinking does not always jibe with the thinking of God (Isa. 55:8).

The second rule for a right understanding of God's word is given in this passage in Proverbs: Diligently seek for and desire understanding. Notwithstanding a person's statement that he is honest and sincere, if he has already decided to uphold what he has been taught or what he believes, he will not and cannot understand the scriptures. The passage says one must "cry after knowledge."

Third. One must diligently search for understanding. The passage says, "if thou seekest her as silver, and searchest for her as hid treasures." Understanding does not come to the one too lazy or too indifferent to diligently search it out. One does not accidentally stumble upon an understanding of the scriptures. He must seek it. But, he must know something about where to seek it! This does not mean that it is hard to find. It only means that one needs directions for finding it. This we will take up in the next article.

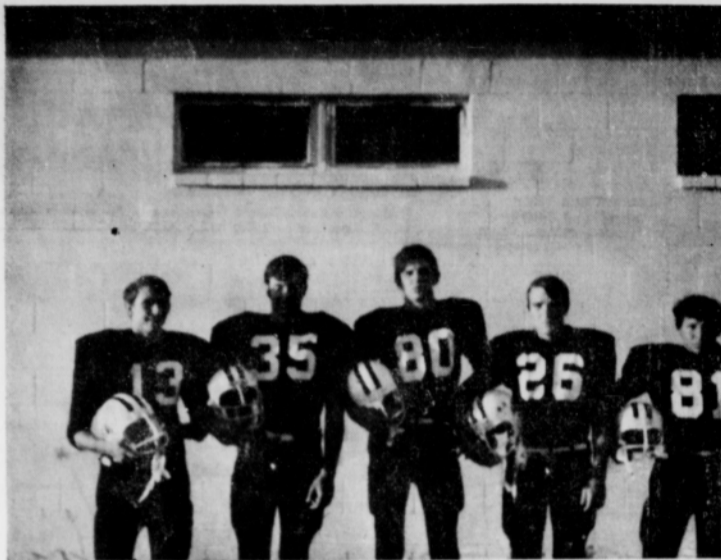

Chukar hunting is permitted far into the winter months where they are legal game. Texas has planted them, but they are not yet in shootable numbers.

Watch those little sandpiper birds along the water's edge. They are always tipping their heads or their tails and have the nickname of "teeter-tails."

Texas fishermen are learning to use poles like those in Florida for moving their boats over sand bars and through moss beds. These can be the kind that pole vaulters use, with a foot added at one end.

A snapping turtle feeds only under water and it cannot draw its head or tail into its shell.

Empty, quart-size ice cream containers, the round kind, if filled with water and placed in your deep freeze, can be used to cool your portable ice chests. Provides drinking water, too, when melted.

There is economy in buying chunk ice for your chest instead of the crushed variety. It costs much less and lasts a good deal longer.

If you want to add to lake-side beauty, take along a few

dime packages of flower seed when you go fishing. Strew them at good places along the banks of your favorite stream or lake.

When taking a camera into a boat, drop it into a plastic bag and put a rubber band around it. This gives the delicate mechanism of the camera protection against spray.

A small transistor radio is a handy item to keep in the tackle box if you are interested in getting the news while out fishing. Don't play it so loud as to disturb other fishermen.

Most public parks now have signs prohibiting dogs. If you are taking a long vacation trip, it might be best to board the pooch.

You can make cheap and effective fishing sinkers. Use spent .22 shells. Drop a small-size paper clip or a piece of bent wire into the shell. Then fill it with molten lead, solder or a mixture of water and pure cement.

AUSTIN — A new year-round voter registration law went into effect for Texans on October 1.

Predictions are that it will make significant changes in the political structure of the state. New rules governing the operation of political party conventions also will begin operating next year.

These major provisions in the new voter registration act are noted:

Voters can register at any time (except for a temporary cutoff 31 days before each election). Registration is good for three years, and is automatically renewed by participation in an election during that period. The old registration period, one of the shortest in the nation, was October 1-January 31.

Eighteen to 21 year olds may register and are eligible to vote in local, state and federal elections under a new U. S. constitutional amendment.

Roving or resident registration deputies may sign up voters anywhere - apartments, union halls, club rooms, dormitories, industrial plants, office buildings supermarkets or private residences. The law provides that "no voter registrar shall refuse to deputize a person." This is expected to increase sharply the use of deputies to round up voters.

Predictions range upwards of five million eligible voters in 1972, an increase of a million over 1970.

Voters must have resided in the state a year and in a county for six months to qualify for local election participation. Those who have lived in Texas more than 30 days but less than a year before the November 1972 general election can vote for presidential and vice presidential candidates under special residency registration with county clerks.

APPOINTMENTS — Gov. Preston Smith named former Sen. Dorsey Hardeman of San Angelo to membership on the Texas Water Rights Commission, a \$22,500 a year post. Hardeman will succeed Leslie Neal of San Antonio who resigned.

In other recent appointments, Smith picked: Jimmie Joe McCuan of Pasadena to the Industrial Accident Board.

Marshall Forby of Plainview and Richard S. Slocomb of Galena Park to the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System. He re-appointed Harvey Well of Corpus Christi, Newton Fresham of Houston, Jack Arthur of Stephenville and Wayne E. Thomas of Hereford (chairman).

Jimmy Powell of Ft. McKavett to the State Senior Colleges, Board of Regents.

C. C. Bentley Jr. of Abilene (reappointment) for a new term on the Finance Commission of

Texas, Building and Loan Section.

Doug Crouch to succeed Frank Coffey, who resigned, as Tarrant County (Fort Worth) district attorney.

Drs. Walter H. Fisher of Temple, Sterling H. Pruitt of Fort Worth and Harvey H. Kennedy of Longview to the State Board of Chiropractic Examiners.

John W. Cardwell, former Georgetown newspaperman was named deputy director of the Texas Office of Economic Opportunity.

Lawrence Miller Jr. of Dallas is new chairman of the Texas Real Estate Commission.

Joe Teller, Texas Water Quality Board deputy director, was selected for Water Pollution Control Federation of America executive committee.

STATE TO FIGHT FOR TREASURE — The state is prepared to go to the U. S. Supreme Court to get title to all artifacts recovered from Spanish galleons which sank off Padre Island more than 400 years ago.

Texas Antiquities Committee was told a decision is near by Brownsville federal court in a long legal dispute over the treasure. Platoro Ltd., a Gary, Ind., salvage firm, recovered the valuables in 1967 and proposes a 50-50 split with the state which demands the entire treasure.

Meanwhile, Committee learned an underwater archaeologist has agreed to help set up a program to recover artifacts from another ancient Spanish galleon near Padre Island next year.

COURTS SPEAK — The Supreme Court dismissed the appeal of relatives of Clyde Barrow who lost a suit against Warner Brother Studio claiming character defamation in the movie "Bonnie and Clyde."

In a pile of other decisions released after a summer recess, the High Court:

Set a November 17 review of a San Antonio district court ruling which the Alcoholic Beverage Commission maintains would rob it of its power to suspend dealers' licenses for violations.

Upheld an injunction against a Tarrant County dentist who allegedly claimed he could diagnose and treat cancer.

Said the Texas Railroad Commission has power to change natural gas prices covered by contracts between cities and pipeline companies when it finds a change is in the public interest. The case grew out of High Plains Natural Gas Company's efforts to get a price increase for gas sold to the city of Perryton.

Turned down city of Azle's appeal from the 1969 incorporation of Sanctuary in Parker County, holding Azle had not proved its jurisdiction over the property.

Booked November 3 hearing

of Denton County case in which a father sued his son who backed a car into him for negligence.

Held parents can collect damages for pre-natal injuries to an unborn child in an auto collision.

Scheduled a hearing on an appeal from granting of a charter to Modern Savings and Loan Association, Pasadena.

Court of Criminal Appeals reversed and sent back for a new trial the conviction and 100-year sentence of a Dallas man for robbery by assault.

AG OPINIONS — Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin held a new statute attempting to exempt churches and veterans organizations from lottery laws is unconstitutional.

In another recent opinion, Martin interpreted incidental expenses which the comptroller may pay state employees in connection with their travels as those "reasonably necessary to performance of official duties" while away from their desks. A \$35 a day limit is set for travel expenses outside state boundaries.

Special rangers hired by state organizations to promote cooperation with law enforcement agencies are peace officers and must meet minimum standards of selection and training established by Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Officer Standards and Education.
