600 to 1,000 eggs. To eliminate flies, the breeding places must be destroyed. Manure piles, garbage, and other organic

moisture, and food necessary for the propagation of the fly. Flies should be kept from contact with food or drink or utensils in which such food and drink are prepared and served. Likewise, they should be kept from access to privy vaults where they pick up the infections, which they later spread to humans

and by unwashed hands and uten-

See that your windows, doors, as. and porches are screened so that the stray fly from some careless neighbor will not molest your family. See that your grocer keeps meat, vegetables, and fruit screened from flies.

The use of DDT and other sprays for the control of all larvae have come into wide usage. However, their use should be, after all trash and breeding places have been eliminated. Otherwise, spraying will give only temporary relief and a false sense of security.
