Station Shows Arrogance

Talk about arrogance.

Radio Station KORQ in Abilene demonstrated this character flaw to the highest degree last Thursday.

The station was bound and determined to give away some money, as most radio stations are wont to do, and couldn't figure out a way to do it.

Striving for maximum publicity, station moguls finally decided just to tell the masses to come to station headquarters at 2449 S. Treadaway and they would pass out nearly \$2,000.

The masses, as masses are wont to do, showed up some thousand strong and perpetrated a disturbance just short of a riot as they scrambled for envelopes containing small amounts of cash.

A few were slightly injured. Many came away empty-handed and most came away with their dignity in shambles.

One guy was quoted in *The Abilene Reporter-News* as being disappointed the envelope he got had only \$5 in it. But he said he'd do it again "if they would get the crazies out of the way." The saying comes to mind: Sleep with dogs and you come up with fleas.

But the arrogance of the radio station is the mean thing here:

"Well, guys, what are we going to do for kicks today?"

"Hey, I know. We've got all this surplus money, let's go out and throw it to the peons and watch them fight over it. That ought to be good for some laughs."

The audacity of it is immense, but the station first planned to hand out the cash at the intersection of Winters Freeway and Buffalo Gap Rd., the busiest intersection in town. The riot there would have made what actually happened look like a walk in the park. Thank goodness, Abilene's mayor, Dale Ferguson, saw the danger and advised the station to change locations.

But all this is just another indication of the attitude radio stations have toward their listeners.

The music they play is obviously aimed at someone with the mentality of a perverted 10-year-old.

But, the scary part is, a lot of people like it.

And, before anybody writes saying the reason I'm writing about the giveaway is that I was there, let me say I wasn't.

I wouldn't have been caught within 10 miles of the place. Besides, I didn't know about it. I haven't listened to KORQ since they quit playing easy-listening music.

Howard Book Author Honored

Novalyne Price Ellis, author of "One Who Walked Alone," was the honored guest of the Cross Plains Public Library Friday for a reception, autograph session, and dinner. Robert Howard, the now well-known author of "Conan," who lived in Cross Plains, is the subject of Mrs. Ellis' book.

The afternoon reception was like a homecoming reunion, with everyone anxiously anticipating Ellis' arrival. Her admirers ranged from students to friends to fans of her publication. She is a former speech and English teacher at Cross Plains High School (1934-37).

She was escorted by her son and wife, Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Ellis and son, of Metairie, Louisiana. Novalyne is from Lafayette, Louisiana.

As they entered the Library, Novalyne began embracing folks with familiar faces and recalling memories. She has a certain magnetism which drew old acquaintances to be with her.

"One Who Walked Alone" is the first book Mrs. Ellis has published. Over the years she has had articles and short stories published, and has written a speech textbook. She stated, "After coaching debate for so many years, I actually had to learn how to write all over."

She is presently in the process of having a second book published entitled "Whippoorwill Day." It is a collection of ghost tales and interesting stories which her grandmother used to tell.

She had discussed this book with Howard all these years ago, and he had suggested a definite ending for the book. Ellis said, "I tried several different endings, before admitting that he was indeed right."

Novalyne desired to meet Robert E. Howard to engage his help in becoming an author. Howard was selling at that time, but had not been recognized by the literary world. They were both aspiring young writers. Many years transpired before either reached his goal.

Ellis said she was not surprised at Bob's, as she referred to him, notoriety. She said he would have replied, "Well, they finally are appreciating me." She remarked that he would not have been comfortable with a large crowd of fans. "He would have really been noted for the novels he planned to write about Texas," she said.

She stated that she was shocked by his suicide and said, "Like all friends of suicide victims, you carry the feeling of guilt for years."

It was very obvious why Howard could relate to Novalyne, as she is open and honest, and very easy to converse with. She said their dates consisted of riding in the car all around the country and talking. Perhaps she is the only one who really knew his feelings.

Because of her understanding of Howard, she has spent much of her life finding talent in students that were "different" but had exceptional abilities.

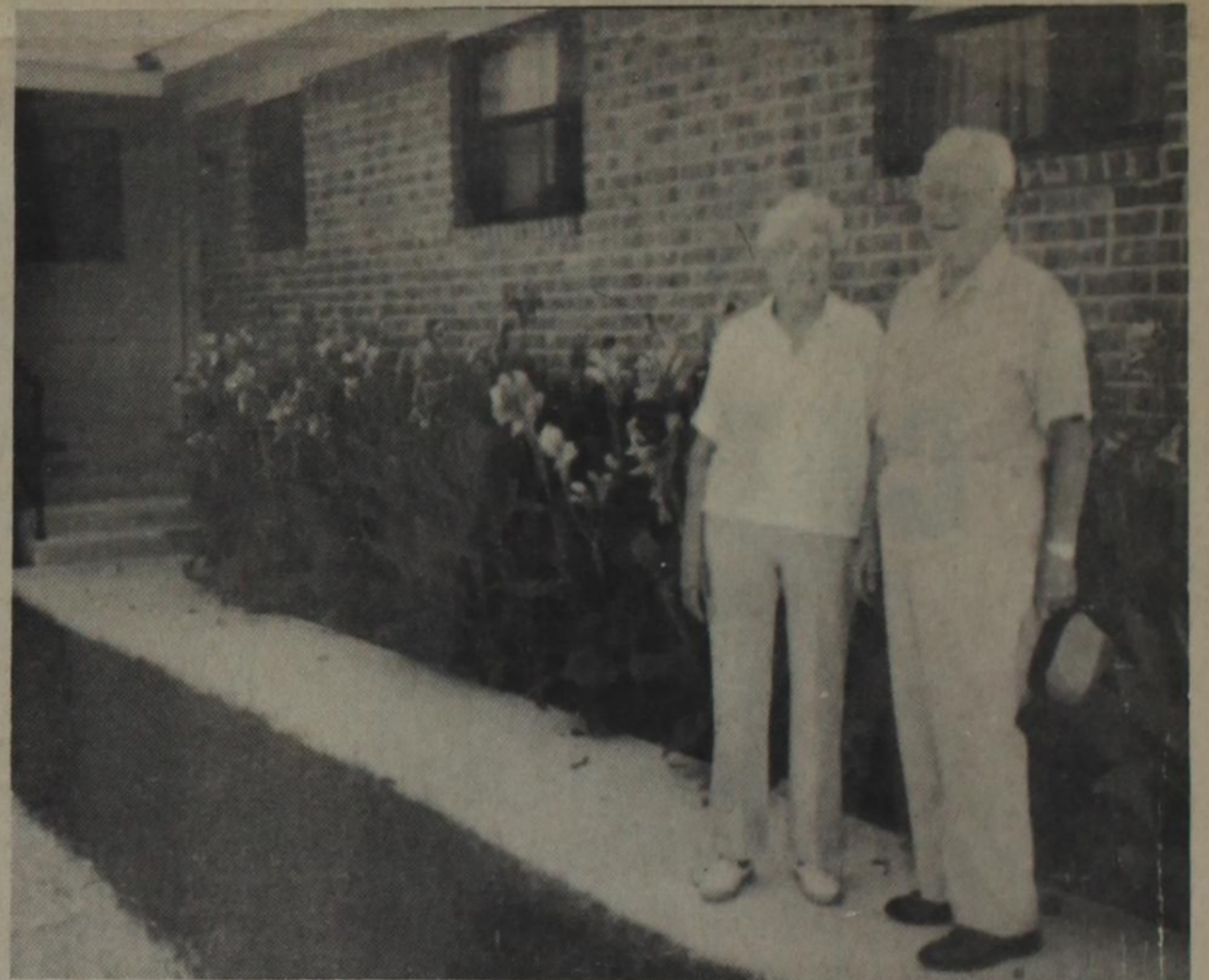
She was also presented a guest book with the names and addresses of those who attended both functions. Over sixty people were in attendance at each.

Fireworks Hard on Eyes

TEMPLE, TX — WARNING: Fourth of July Holiday fireworks are dangerous to your eyes. It is estimated that 4,000 people will suffer eye injuries, with 1,000 of these resulting in permanent vision loss, according to the American Academy of Ophthalmology.

"Bottle rockets are responsible for more than half of these injuries," says Richard D. Cunningham, M.D., Director of the Division of Ophthalmology at Scott and White in Temple, and professor at Texas A&M University College of Medicine.

Nationwide, more than half the states have adopted a model law which limits the use of fireworks to licensed displays or relatively safe fireworks such as sparklers. The three-state study indicated that there were ten times more fireworks injuries where no model law was in effect.

Some tips for avoiding eye injuries during 4th of July Holiday:

- *Always wear safety goggles or glasses when setting off fireworks.
- *Adults should be present to supervise children during the use of relatively safe fireworks such as sparklers.
- *Only adults should handle or ignite explosive fireworks.
- *Do not put firecrackers in a bottle or tin can, or under a clay pot. When such objects shatter, the fragments are often propelled into the eye, causing serious eye injury.
- In case of eye injury:
 - *Immediately rush child or adult to a hospital emergency room for treatment.
 - *Never press, rub, or touch the eye.

Local Man Gives Info On Shock for Snake Bite

Recently it has been proved that an unconventional method of electric shock prevents the usual severe reaction of snake bites and even bee stings. The treatment is highly successful in all poisonous insect bites.

A DC (direct current) produced from a generator or alternator of a gas engine should be used. The AC (alternating current) used in offices or homes would kill the victim.

A "stun gun" consisting of a nine-volt battery to deliver a DC pulse around 25 kilovolts, at less than one milliampere, has been developed. Still no explanation of why the shock treatment works has been derived.

It is still recommended that you recognize the snake and call ahead for the proper antivenin. Ice should not be used on the afflicted area. Also, it is no longer recommended to cut the bitten area to suck the poison out.

The shock treatment is really more appropriate if you should be many hours away from medical care, and the use of a motor vehicle to produce the shock would be timesaving and perhaps lifesaving.

Dan Childress of the Cottonwood Community brought this valuable information to the Review to inform everyone of the recent discovery.

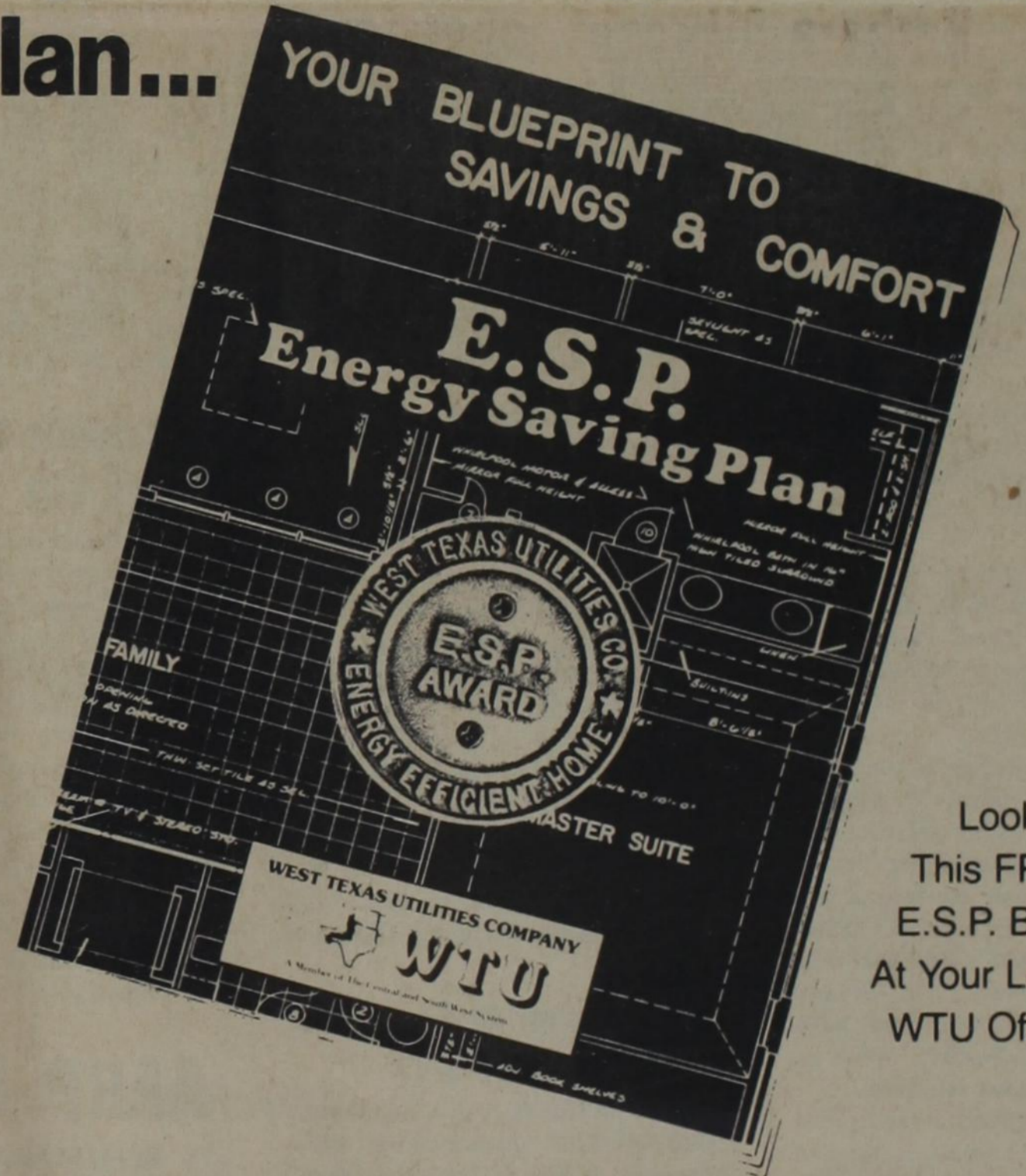

Her typing was awful. She often forgot to write down the appointments she scheduled and as a result I was overbooked much of the time. She stayed on the phone a lot talking to friends and I finally just told her I did not need her any more.

Today she filed for unemployment benefits. What can I expect?

—Dr. J.N.D. Amarillo

Dear Doctor: The Bad News is that it sounds like you have done everything wrong! You can probably expect the worst.

If you were never pleased with the employee's work, it will be hard to explain why you kept her on your payroll so long and then terminated her at your convenience.

Was she aware that you were displeased? Did you counsel her about the problems you mention? Is there any documentation in her personnel file to support your complaints and/or attempts to

correct the situation? Was she ever told that her job was in jeopardy?

You will be asked all of these questions and more because TEC must now rule on whether the termination was justified or not.

Keep in mind that this particular law was not written for employers. It was written to protect unemployed workers and the burden of proving misconduct falls squarely on an employer.

P.S. Inability is NOT misconduct.

Dear Commissioner: Can I fire someone for being drunk on the job?

—J. Daniels
Seguin, Texas

Dear Mr. Daniels: You certainly have the right to fire an employee who is drunk on the job. Be sure you know from PERSONAL OBSERVATION that the employee is drunk, or failing that, that you have some witness to the employee's actions. Most people are familiar with the behavioral effects of alcohol intoxication — alcohol smell, slurred speech, unsteady walk, etc. — and could testify to their observation of these effects.

Being drunk on the job is misconduct connected with the work, BUT THE EMPLOYER MUST BE PREPARED TO PROVE SUCH ALLEGATIONS.

Dear Commissioner Nabers: Under the new immigration law, do I have to check the status on everyone who works for me or just those people I hire in the future?

Brownsville, Texas

Dear Ms. Lien: You must verify status on any employee you have hired SINCE NOVEMBER 6, 1986. You DO NOT have to verify status on anyone hired PRIOR to that date.

You must complete an I-9 form on all employees hired since November 6, 1986 as well as EACH AND EVERY employee you hire from now on.

The Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) is mailing informational manuals as well as I-9 forms to all employer. You are free to photocopy these forms for your use. There is also a toll free number you can call to get information: 1-800-777-7000.

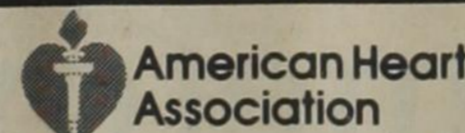
