How to Store Dry Foods

COFFEE or jam jars with screw tops and pint or quart caps make handy receptacles which to store rice, cereals, spaghetti and other dry foods in the board and pantry space which could not otherwise be used.



Fasten the jar tops, with nails or screws, to a permanent support on the bottom of a wooden shelf. Then when the jar has been filled, it can be screwed into place, hanging from the bottom of the shelf. Large jars can be placed at the back and a row of small jars for spices and condiments can make up a front row. This way handy to get at and keep in order.



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

Cisco's Homecoming Event On July 3, 4 & 5

Cisco, our neighboring city to the Northeast, will celebrate its second homecoming event, July 3, 4 and 5, with a lasting revue and Gilbert Varieties show on July 4 at eight o'clock in the evening. Young women of surrounding towns will enter the revue and evening-gowned variety party as contestants. Judges whose identity will remain unknown. Cross Plains has been invited to enter a contestant.

Whooping Cough Thought To Be At Alltime High Now

A statement released today by Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, indicates that the incidence of whooping cough in Texas is at present almost three times as high as the seven year median. "Prevention and control of whooping cough, especially among infants and small children, may be accomplished through use of approved vaccine and convalescent serum," Dr. Cox asserted, "and it is important that such measures be taken to protect them. Neglecting to do so, and allowing the young child to suffer an attack of this disease, may seriously impair his future health. The infectious agent or germ of whooping cough, is transmitted by droplets expelled in coughing, sneezing, or speaking." Dr. Cox said. "The discharges from the nose and throat are dangerous to susceptible persons. The best for early recognition and careful isolation of whooping cough is obvious."

The first sign of this disease is usually a dry cough, which persists day and night and tends to become increasingly worse. The disease is fully developed when vomiting of food and whooping accompany the paroxysm of cough. Dr. Cox stresses the fact that children who have whooping cough should not attend school and should be isolated so that they will not come in contact with other children until three weeks after the appearance of typical signs of the disease.


Junkana and Sonny Boy Graves are visiting their grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. McGlothlin, of Baird this week.



CLOSED SHOP OUTLAWED IN 16 STATES



Houston, Texas.—The shaded states in the above map have either adopted or submitted constitutional amendments or enacted statutes prohibiting the closed shop. Sixteen, or one-third of all the states, have taken such action. They are Arizona, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Iowa, Maine, Nebraska, Nevada, New Mexico, North Carolina, North Dakota, Ohio, South Dakota, Tennessee, Texas and Virginia. The Taft-Hartley Bill recently passed by Congress contained a provision outlawing the closed shop.

According to a report sent out from Washington we find that 23 Texas counties are listed among the 100 leading peanut growing counties in the United States.

Comanche county was given as Texas' leading peanut county in 1946. Last year Comanche county had 98,825 acres in peanuts followed by Eastland county with 50,000 acres.

These two counties are well adapted to the cultivation and production of the peanut and we are glad to see them ranking high in the industry.

The Agriculture Department has announced that it will purchase 13,000,000 pounds of lard for shipment to Germany. They said this purchase should have very little effect on our domestic lard supply since the amount represents only about 10 per cent of current stock.

A report states that people frequently ask Gabriel Heister where he gets the inspirational stories which are dramatized Sunday nights on his radio program, "A Brighter Tomorrow." He makes no secrets of the source but explains that small-town newspapers are rich in stories with heart appeal.


