> When the courthouse building was erected in the late twenties, an elevator shaft was built into the construction. Now, only the knocking out of wooden floors, ceilings and the actual installation of the elevator is required. Preliminary cost has been tentatively estimated at \$22.693. A small assessment will be added to the proposal to repaint interior walls at the courthouse and do maintenance work around the windows and doors, which are said to be in need of attention.

> Members of the court pointed out Monday that no surplus is available from the courthouse permanent improvement fund with which to finance the elevator without a small bond election. however, they reminded that the entire courthouse bond would be

Proponents of the elevator say that elderly people have found it very difficult to climb the stairs to transact business on the second and third floors of the courthouse building and that a small levy to be retired in 10 or 12 years would be only a service to which they are justly entitled. No additional employee to operate the lift would be required. It would be of the automatic opration type, and at busy times and for those unfamiliar with the mechanism would be operated by the courthouse custodian.

Proponents also point out that with evaluations now at the highest level in the county's history, approximately 60 percent of the cost of the elevator would be borne by the petroleum and railroad industries.

Commissioners Ponder Merging Callahan County Voting Boxes

Do the people of Callahan County favor consolidation of voting boxes?

That question is being asked by members of the Commissioners Court, who say at times they have been approached on the matter by various citizens. They also point out, however, that read by Rev. Devers. Attendants there have been expressions favoring the status quo.

If consolidation of voting pre cincts should be adopted, only six boxes would be retained. They would be: Baird, Cross Plains, Clyde, Putnam, Eula and Denton-Oplin. Belle Plain would be merged with the Denton-Oplin. set-up. Cottonwood would go to Cross Plains, Admiral and Erath would be tied-in with Putnam. Dudley would be consoli dated with Denton-Oplin, Atwell would be transferred to Cross Plains, Lanham would go to Clyde, Rowden would probably be split between Cross Plains and Denton-Oplin, Hart would Mr. and Mrs. Guy Nutt, Ann be merged with Putnam. Baird would be the only one of the six remaining precincts with which

It would have to be determined at which place voters in the proposed Denton-Oplin precinct would ballot. At present Denton has 57 paid poll tax holders and Oplin 62.

Proponents of the proposition have pointed out that consolidation of the boxes would result in savings for candidates. Opponents of the plan cite the fact that consolidation would mean the loss of the last vestige of community prestige to the nine abandoned boxes and result in no appreciable savings. As for the financial relief of candidates, they point out this was taken care of in the extension of terms

from two to four years. Members of the Commissioners Court plan no action whatsoever in the matter until people from all sections of the county have had ample opportunity to express preferences in the matter.

"We want only to carry out wishes of the people in the mat-ter", said a spokesman of the group to this newspaper yesterthere would be no consolidation. day.

Farmers Now Under Social Security **Expert Explains**

A large number of farmers are concerned about the self-employment tax law, according to Howard O. Nichols, Administrative Officer in Charge of the Abilene office told this newspaper Monday. Amendments to the Social Security law made farmers subject to self-employ-ment tax during 1955 for the first time. Nichols has set out the five most common questions asked by farmers and their answers for the information of farmers in this area.

1. Is self-employment optional or mandatory for farmers?

No. If the farmer had net earnings from self-employment of \$400 or more last year and did not receive any wages subject to the social security taxes on employees of if such wages were less than: 4,200, he must pay self-employn ent tax for last

2. What form coes the farmer need to fill out in order to pay

his self-employment tax?

He will use Schedule F listing all farm income and deductions along with his ncome tax return, Form 1040

3. Can a farm owe self-employment tax ar d not owe any

Yes. His net income from farm operations is \$400 or more and the total amoun t of his exempan his net intions is more th come, then he would be required to pay self-employment tax but would owe no ncome tax. 4. What is the self-employment

rate for farmers If, in the taxable year, he re-

ceives no wages subject to social security taxes and his self-employment net earnings from farming for the year are at least \$400 and no more than \$4,200, the entire amount is subject to the 3%.

5. Are farm rents, as such, subject to self-employment tax? No. If the landowner rents his land receiving a crop share or the proceeds the reof, under the ordinary crop-staring arrange- Reynolds and Sterling Reynolds ment, he is considered to be receiving rentals from real estate, and such rentals are excluded from net earnings for self-employment.

grace period before I could pay my last GI insurance premium to VA. But I forgot to sign my check. By the time another check reaches VA, my grace period will have expired. Am I out of luck? Has my insurance lapsed?

A-No. So long as you have sufficient funds in your bank to cover the check, VA will not consider your policy to have lapsed. Instead, VA will notify you of your error, and will give you 31 days from the date of notification to send in another check, paying all premiums through the current month.

Q-A couple of years ago I bought a house with a GI loan. The County has notified me that it is condemning my property because it wants to build a highway across my land. Will I be able to have my GI loan rights restored so that I can buy anoth-

for public use. However, VA must be relieved from liability on the old guaranty. Q-How do I compute the

amount of schooling I can get under the Korean GI Bill? I entered service in 1953 and I was just discharged.

A-Multiply your length of active service by one and onehalf. That will be your entitlement, except that it may not exceed 36 months of training.

Q-I am a disabled veteran in training under Public Law 16. Recently I have been bothered by a non-service connected ailment. Could I receive outpatient treatment from VA for this con-


