

THE lubrication system for the engine of the new Ford is as simple in principle as water running down-hill.

A gear pump in the hottom of the oil par raises the oil to the valve chamber reservoir. From here it flows on to the main crankshaft bearings and the front camshaft hearing. Overflow oil drops into the oil pan tray and runs into troughs through which the connecting rods pass.




